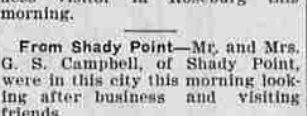

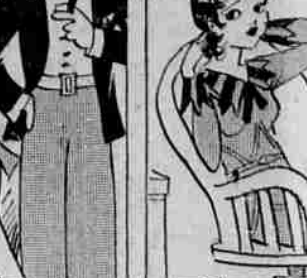

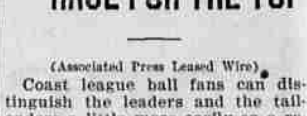

(Associated Press Leased Wire) Coast league ball fans can distinguish the leaders and the tail-enders a little more easily as a result of yesterday's games opening the week's series, but among the first few teams one's own preference is still about the only guide.

The Sacs, the Angels, and the Oaks, all winners in the day's contests, remain bunched within a half a game in the standings. The Seals, who are hard pressed to stay in the first division, ran into somewhat of a freak game and fared poorly. The San Francisco boys collected eighteen hits, off pitcher Frank Shellenback, of the Stars, and still lost to Hollywood, 11 to 6.

On June 15, 1881, he was united in marriage with Martha Melser and to this union two sons were born, Ernest W. and Charles Wesley, who are living in Red Wood Falls, Minn., and Nicollet, Minn., respectively.

Mrs. Currier died in 1907 and he was married again November 7, 1912, to Emma J. Stolt, who survives. They have been living in Sutherland for the past eight years. Mr. Currier had been ill for the past two and a half years. The body has been removed to the Douglas Funeral Home where preparations are being made for shipment to his old home in Nicollet, Minn.

IMPORT DUTY ON SALMON RESISTED

TWO KILLED, MANY INJURED IN FRESH BATTLE IN INDIA

(Associated Press Leased Wire) RANGOON, Burma, India, May 28.—Two persons were killed when the military police opened fire this evening on a party of Indian Moslems during a new flare-up of yesterday's disorders.

The Moslems held up a tram car and assaulted Burman passengers. As the military police appeared they were met with a volley of stones.

Many were injured on both sides.

The disorders followed a conflict which waged for many hours yesterday and caused several scores of lives and injury to more than 700 persons.

The Rangoon police this evening again opened fire on a band of Burmans who attacked residents in the neighborhood of the contagious diseases hospital. It was not known immediately if there were any casualties.

BOMBAY, May 28.—A government report today gave official confirmation that a dog was the innocent cause of the flare up in the Bhend bazaar which cost four lives and injury to 56 persons.

The statement said a police sergeant struck a Mohammedan he found beating a dog. The Mohammedan departed to return soon with a band of his co-religionists. He demanded his dog and was given it.

The Mohammedans then advanced to police headquarters where two more sergeants appeared, armed with revolvers. They held the Mohammedans at bay. When the attitude of the crowd grew more threatening the police fired a few shots. The crowd threw stones.

"Fear of the knife is responsible for his refusal to allow us to operate," Dr. L. L. Stanley, prison physician, explained, adding that "Northcott is a physical coward."

The condemned youth's mother, herself imprisoned for life for the same slayings, visited him yesterday and pleaded with him to submit to an operation.
