

HOOVER PUTS VETO ON SPANISH VETS' PENSION MEASURE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, May 28.—President Hoover today vetoed the senate bill establishing a new basis of pension for Spanish war veterans.
Asserting his belief in proper discharge of the national obligation to men who have served in war and become disabled and are in need, the chief executive in returning the bill to the senate said certain principles were included which he considered opposed to the interest both of the war veterans and of the public.
In the whole of our pension legislation over past years, the president said, we have excluded from such national award persons whose disabilities arise from "vicious habits."
He said the bill breaks down the exclusion and opens the door for claims of disability incurred at any time in the life of the pensioner arising from certain types of diseases, alcoholism, drug habits and the like.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—A special meeting of the senate pension committee was called late today to determine what action would be taken with regard to the veto by President Hoover of the Spanish war veterans' pension measure.
Senator Robinson, republican, Indiana, the sponsor of the legislation in the senate, was undetermined whether he would seek to pass the legislation over the veto.

OVER MILLION IN BAD MONEY SEIZED; THREE MEN NABBED

NEW YORK, May 28.—Expertly counterfeited \$10, \$20 and \$50 gold certificates, with a spurious value of more than a million dollars, were seized today with a large lithograph press by secret service operatives on an upper floor of a Brooklyn apartment house in Eighty-fifth street.
Three men, caught in the act of operating the press, were arrested; secret service men assigned to pursue a tip on the counterfeiters located the plant and watched the operations of the band from a room a block away.
Many sheets of counterfeit notes were still wet from the presses. Each sheet contained \$500 in bogus notes of all three denominations. The agents also found special paper sample for the printing of \$4,000, \$600 more in counterfeit money.
The press, Allan G. Straight, chief of the secret service said, weighed 3,500 pounds and occupied the entire side of a wall. It was one of the largest ever seized and experts will be called to dismantle it.
The three prisoners declined to talk.

TAR AND FEATHERS VICTIM ALLEGED TO BE HOME WRECKER

HAMMOND, La., May 28.—Isaac O. Starnes, one of five brothers under arrest here on charges of tarring and feathering Dr. Sedgie L. Newson, dentist, issued a statement today saying he participated in the attack because the dentist broke up his home.
"We don't deny we tarred and feathered him," said Starnes. "We'll tell why we did it. He broke up my home."
He said the dentist and his wife had admitted adulterous behavior. Dr. Newson last night denied any improper relations with any woman.
The five brothers, Isaac, Charles, Gordon, Henry and Newton Starnes, were at liberty on bail today after their arrest last night on affidavits charging assault.

LOSERS AT PRIMARY FILE EXPENSE BILLS

SALEM, Ore., May 28.—C. W. Laughlin, president of the Norblad for Governor club at Astoria, reported to the secretary of state today that the Astoria club spent \$192.13 in behalf of Governor Norblad in the recent primary campaign.
L. B. Sandblast of Portland spent in his campaign for the republican nomination for congress \$155.95, according to his statement. J. E. Bennett of Portland, in his effort to land the republican gubernatorial nomination, spent \$205.25, and A. C. Hough of Grants Pass, candidate for the democratic nomination for governor, \$496.59.
Walter M. Pierce, who defeated Oswald West for democratic national committeeman, was out no money at all, according to his statement.

SLAYER OF PEARL JACOBS WILL PLEAD INSANITY

Norblad Evasive

Today Governor Norblad reiterated his refusal to affirm, deny, or comment on the report that he intends to remove Judge Sawyer and replace him with Lynch. C. E. Gates, another highway commissioner, was in the city and conferred with the governor during the morning but no announcement was made as to the subject of their conversation.

The governor's announcement that he felt that Klamath and other southern Oregon counties should be represented on the game commission is construed to indicate the appointment of Harry Poole, Klamath Falls theatre man, on the commission if Lynch is transferred to the highway berth.

Eugene Backs Sawyer

EUGENE, Ore., May 28.—Vigorous protests from Lane county against any action which might remove Robert W. Sawyer, Bend, Ore., from the state highway commission were sent to Governor A. W. Norblad today.

Rumors were current in Eugene that Governor Norblad contemplated replacing Sawyer as state highway commissioner with an unannounced appointee.
Protests to Governor Norblad were signed by leading Eugene citizens including Roy Booth, president of the Chamber of Commerce; Frank Jenkins, editor of the Eugene Register; W. W. Tamm, managing editor of the Eugene Guard; A. C. Dixon, general manager of the Booth-Kelly company; Edward R. Morris, motor dealer; Earl Hill, representative-elect from western Lane county; J. C. Ponsler, Florence; Mrs. W. H. Maxham, president of the Caribon club; Mrs. A. G. Horton, president of the Federation of Women's clubs, and J. E. Turnbull.

Other Appointments
SALEM, Ore., May 28.—Elmer Barnhart of Independence, republican nominee for district attorney for Polk county, was today appointed by Governor Norblad to serve in that office for the unexpired term of W. W. Harcombe of Dallas, who has resigned, effective June 1. Upon being notified by Harcombe some time ago that he expected to resign Norblad announced he would appoint the republican nominee to succeed him.
The governor today re-appointed W. L. Thompson of Portland as a member of the state library board.

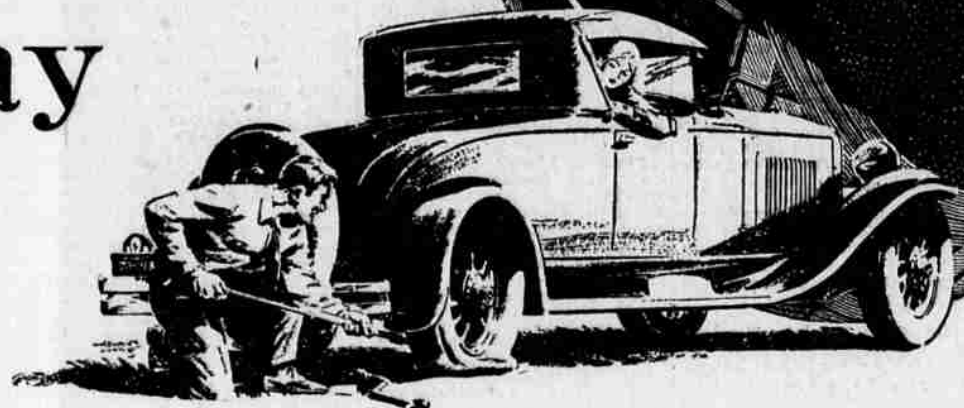
A report by Wilson, placed in the record, said in part:
