TODAY'S MARKETS

PORTLAND, May 28.—Despite the price reductions made Monday, the tone of the butter market continues weak with offerings large and demand light.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

Oregon is now entering its strawberry season in earnest, but Portland's supplies continue limited, due to active outside demand. Several truck shipments to Puget Sound points are being made daily. The market is about steady at \$3.00 per crate, with a few extra on the farmers' early market as high as \$3.75 for real fancy berries.

"Cantaloupes are more plentiful; Imperial valley markets are strong; though, and there are no price changes here."

"Asparagus was in only moderate supply. There is a wide range in quality ranging from one to \$1.00 per dozen bunches."

"Tomatoes are cheaper, especially for lower quality stock. Both re-packed tomatoes and original packs declined about 50c per lug."

"Potatoes, which were real active two weeks ago, is now very slow, and even though supplies are now light, there is little interest shown."

"Local pears are increasing in volume daily, but prices continue rather high, at 10c per lb."

POEM FOR THE DAY

A MONUMENT SUPREME

In the Black Hills of South Dakota, near the heart of the North American continent, a colossal memorial is taking shape under the hands of the sculptor, Gutzon Borglum. It is intended to tell the story of the founding, the extension and the preservation of the Union, and, as the sculptor has said, the completion of the dream of Columbus by the cutting of the Panama canal, which gave a western route to Asia. As the theme is heroic, so also are the material and the figures. A mountain of stone is to yield up the likenesses of Washington, of Jefferson, of Lincoln and of Roosevelt, and on its face is to be carved, in the scale of giants, a textual history.

The history is being written by former President Coolidge, who, in 1927, when spending his vacation in the Black Hills, dedicated the whole vast project, which is sanctioned by the state of South Dakota and by the national government. The words, not more than 500 in number, will fill a tablet eighty feet high and 120 feet long; and they are to be cut so deeply, the sculptor believes, that, unless some cosmic upheaval destroys Mount Rushmore, the inscription will be readable a million years hence.

Never before has sculpture been undertaken on so great a scale. The towering wall of the mountain on which the memorial is to be cut is 1,000 feet high, and the figures of the four presidents are to be depressed into the rock 23 feet. Their heads will measure fifty feet from chin to crown, it is said, and the figures themselves will tower 120 feet. The Colossus of Rhodes was 109 feet, and the Egyptian Sphinx is 66 feet high.—The New York Times, February 23, 1929.

OBITUARY

Sarah E. Westhimer was born May 12, 1845, in Montgomery county, Missouri, and passed away at her home in Yoncalla, April 28, 1930. She was the eldest daughter of John and Minerva Long, early pioneers of Yoncalla. They migrated from Tennessee in the year 1846 and she spent her entire life in and near Yoncalla. She was married to Louis Westhimer February 22, 1865, and was the mother of eight children, six of whom survive. They are Charles of Clarkston, Wash.; William, of Liberty, B. C.; John L., of Denver, Colo.; Ralph, of Reeds-

port; Mrs. Mary Richards and Mervyn Westhimer of Yoncalla. One brother, S. G. Long of Yakima, and eight grand children and two great-grandchildren also survive. She was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church and was honored and respected by those who have been associated with her. She was a kind and loving mother, good to her neighbors and all that knew her. Funeral services were held in the Methodist church at Yoncalla with Rev. K. K. Clark, the pastor, officiating. Interment was in the Yoncalla cemetery beside the grave of her husband who passed away in October 1905.

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
