

D. H. WATZIG WINS VERDICT FOR \$772 ON PRUNE CONTRACT

A verdict for \$772.61, the full amount sued for, was returned in the case of D. H. Watzig against E. A. Jordan in the circuit court yesterday afternoon. The jury, after considering the evidence in the suit, which was an action to obtain money claimed for drying and hauling of prunes and sale of sprayer equipment, allowed the entire sum, rejecting the counter claim set up by the defendant, who alleged that Watzig had not filled his contract and had allowed a large amount of prunes to spoil.

The Watzig case was followed by a very short action brought by N. S. Jones against the Johnson Construction company. Mr. Jones brought suit for \$211.62 claimed to be due for repairs to a steam shovel. The defense introduced no witnesses and a directed verdict for the plaintiff was ordered by Judge Hamilton.

A non-suit was declared in the case of G. W. Rigby against Ellen Sayless Hamon, which was heard this morning. Rigby had a claim of \$700 for caring for his father-in-law, Mr. Hamon, during the illness preceding Mr. Hamon's death. Upon motion of the defense Judge Hamilton declared a non-suit on the grounds that there was no evidence of a contract between the parties for payment. The defendant, widow of Mr. Hamon, declared that her step-daughter, Mrs. Rigby and her husband, had voluntarily taken Mr. Hamon into their home and cared for him during his illness, and that there was no agreement made for payment for this service.

The case of L. G. Davis against Amos Smith and Percy Webb, an action growing out of an attachment served while Mr. Webb was acting as sheriff, was started this afternoon.

MEMORIAL PROGRAM HERE TO BE HELD AT THE ANTLERS

Because of the uncertainty of weather conditions for the Memorial day program Friday, it was definitely determined to conduct the services at the Antlers theatre.

The parade will be held as originally announced at 9 a. m., with the services at the bridge and at the Soldiers Home cemetery in charge of the W. B. C.

Attendance of all Roseburg residents, and particularly members of the several patriotic groups, is urged.

NEW SENIOR HIGH PRINCIPAL HERE

P. L. Jensen, of Junction City, who was recently elected principal of the senior high school, taking the place of B. E. Larson, who is resigning at the end of the present school year to complete his degree at Stanford University, spent the day in Roseburg. Mr. Jensen has finished his school work in Junction City, where he has been very successful, and is planning on moving to Roseburg in the near future. He will spend a few days with Mr. Larson in the senior high school, becoming acquainted with the members of the faculty and learning the system now in use there.

INTERCITY MEETING PLANNED BY ROTARY

Today's Rotary program, which was under the direction of the pep committee, started off with a real bang. Foster Butler fired a shot into the air with a genuine six-gun and the program began. Harry Booth told of the Spokane district conference which he and several other Rotarians attended. After quiet was restored, Floyd Groves gave his farewell to the club with a splendid talk.

A delegate to the Chicago international convention of Rotary will be elected at the next meeting. An intercity meeting of Rotary clubs will be held in Roseburg two weeks from this Thursday evening. Rotarians and their wives will gather here from all of southern Oregon. Frank Lamb, prominent Rotarian and former international president, will be the speaker of the evening.

TRUCK TAKES ROLL AT BOOMER HILL

A truck operated by the Grants Pasa Creamery was wrecked last yesterday evening on the highway near the intersection with the Boomer hill road. The truck skidded off the pavement and rolled down the river bank. The driver escaped with a few bruises.

LOON LAKE HIGHWAY WORK IS PLANNED

County Commissioners Huron Clough and Royce Busenbark went to Loon lake this morning to determine the road improvements to be made in that district this year. The old road through the valley is to be linked up with the new road recently built in from the Reedsport-Drain highway, necessitating a new grade of about three-quarters of a mile in length. The road through the valley is a plank road, still in fairly good condition.

of my administration when it is fully completed.

Speaking, aside from his statement about Sawyer and the Roosevelt highway, the governor said:

"Very often when the Roosevelt highway has been mentioned Sawyer has remarked, 'why the Roosevelt highway?' I believe the only completion of the Roosevelt highway will be one of Oregon's greatest assets. It will bring millions of dollars to the state and add greatly to new taxable property. The people of California will use Oregon as a winter playground. They will come here in droves. This is not particularly my reason for removing Sawyer, but I don't like the attitude of any man who takes such a position. The state has \$12,000,000 invested there and should utilize it."

"I have no intention whatever of interfering with the state highway program," the governor continued. "I have never said a word that expressed such an intention, and I never will in the future. 'Lynch is one of the high type of Oregon business men. After he has been on the commission for a time I believe the people will be more satisfied with the change. Lynch is big enough to look after the road program for all the state, and he was one of the original road builders."

Poole Theatre Operator
The governor said that Lynch had submitted his resignation from the game commission to accept the highway commission post. He described Poole the new appointee to the game commission, as a man deeply interested in state game affairs, and said that his residence at Klamath Falls would make a satisfactory readjustment of the geographical location of the commission members. Poole owns a number of theaters in Klamath county. This change is the second in the game commission in two days. Yesterday the governor removed M. P. Corbett of McMinnville and appointed David Evans of Eugene.

North Open Enemy
The governor spoke frankly about the removal of W. C. North from the veterans' state aid commission.

"When I took office," he said, "North submitted his resignation, and I refused to accept it. In the campaign I think he went to an unbecoming extent in fighting me. He sent a letter about the state aid commission and signed one of the Corbett endorsements used for campaign advertising."

Norblad said that Halson, successor to North, is one of the most active American Legion members in the state. For some years he was auditor for Sabherne & Co. at Astoria and is now with the R. K. Booth Lumber & Supply company.

Van Duzer, Gates Safe
The changes announced today had been rumored for three or four days, and during that time the governor's office had received protests from several points, urging that Sawyer be retained.

The governor's announcement said no other changes in the state highway commission were contemplated. Both H. B. Van Duzer, chairman of the commission, and C. E. Gates, commissioner, were here yesterday conferring with the governor. After the meeting Norblad said both were invaluable to the commission.

In a statement made in Portland last night Van Duzer, the only democrat on the commission, said he wanted it to be definitely established that he is taking no part in the controversy and that it is his desire that politics be kept out of the commission.

Sawyer, publisher of the Bend Bulletin, and former county judge of Deschutes county, had until January to serve as highway commissioner. His tenure of office would have expired a few days after the term of Governor Norblad.

North, who was removed from the veterans' commission, was appointed by the late Governor Patterson to succeed W. C. Corbett. When Norblad succeeded to the governorship, North submitted his resignation, but Norblad re-

Unavailing Protest
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 29.—The Klamath Falls chamber of commerce followed the lead of the Eugene chamber of commerce today and wired Governor A. W. Norblad a vigorous protest against any action which might remove Robert W. Sawyer, of Bend, from the state highway commission.

The telegram was dispatched following receipt of a news item here which indicated Governor Norblad was contemplating the removal of Sawyer from the commission.

MILLION IN LOOT IN SAFETY BOXES

NEW YORK, May 28.—Robert Nelson, a ruddy little gray-haired man who described himself as a broker without an office, and in whose safe deposit boxes police found about \$1,000,000 worth of jewelry they claimed as stolen, was held in \$25,000 bail today for hearing next Wednesday.

The sheriff's charge against him was criminally receiving \$38,000 worth of gems from Louis J. Dawson of Hollywood, Fla.

Nelson was arrested last night after his deposit boxes, which he had taken in his wife's name, had been raided. The raid followed the arrest of four men and a woman and seizure of \$300,000 worth of allegedly stolen jewelry in the hotel commodore.

POET'S OLD HOME WILL BE LIBRARY

DENVER, Colo., May 29.—The old home of Eugene Field, author and poet, is to be moved to one of Denver's city parks this summer for use as a new branch of the public library.

A move by Joseph G. Brown, close friend of Field's, to have the home made a permanent public memorial to him fell a bit short of its goal, but Mrs. J. J. Brown, Denver society matron, purchased it at Brown's instance and offered it to the city.

The new branch probably will be known as the Eugene Field Memorial library, and one corner will be reserved for a collection of articles used by Field when he lived in Denver.

ZEPPELIN FAVORED BY CALM WEATHER

LONDON, May 29.—The master of the steamer Wokingham today radioed the Associated Press by way of Salina that he had sighted the Graf Zeppelin today, and exchanged radio messages.

The radio from the Wokingham added: "Fine calm weather. Zeppelin flying low toward northwest. Presume all well."

The position indicated by the steamer is 450 miles east of Cayenne, French Guiana, and 500 miles north of Para, Brazil, at the mouth of the Amazon.

PORTLAND COURT DROPS BABY CASE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29.—Judge Clarence Gilbert of the court of domestic relations today ruled that the court had no jurisdiction over the parentage of the so-called mysterious Schaefer baby which two women, Mrs. George F. Schaefer, Portland, and Miss Geraldine Watson, Los Angeles and Phoenix, Ariz., claimed as their own.

The judge declared the child a dependent and ordered the infant held in a public home here as a ward of the court. He said "in due time" the case would be given to California courts.

WASHINGTON LEADS OREGON COUNTIES IN BIBLICAL TEST

SALEM, Ore., May 29.—Washington county people are more interested in the Bible than those in any other county in the state, according to the number of high school students who took the Bible examinations May 2, conducted by the state educational department. A total of 33 Washington county students took the tests, 15 in Old Testament and 18 in New Testament.

Perfect grades, however, went to Polk and Multnomah counties. Leonard Fleischman and Twila Title of Monmouth high school and Evelyn Merrett and Evelyn Powar, both of Lincoln high school, Portland, each scored 100 per cent in Old Testament last January.

A total of 260 manuscripts were entered, of which 182 received passing grades and 78 failed. An even hundred took the Old Testament test and 160 the new. Most of the students tested were girls. The examinations were not compulsory and 33 schools offered them.

Although 15 less schools offered the tests than in January there were 117 more papers.

After Washington county the next highest in number taking the examinations was Polk with 30. Multnomah county was third with 26 while Linn and Coos had 19 each. Among the other counties Benton had six applicants, Clatsop 6, Josephine 1, Klamath 3, Lane 3, Marion 4, Wallowa 3. In some counties none took the examinations.

DR. H. T. KERR NEW PRESBYTERIAN HEAD

CINCINNATI, May 29.—The Rev. Hugh Thompson Kerr, Pittsburgh, late today was elected moderator of the Presbyterian church in the United States.

Dr. Kerr received 605 votes and his only opponent, the Rev. Henry B. Master, Philadelphia, obtained 303.

Mr. Kerr carried nineteen of the twenty-two voting sections.

465 DEMOCRATS FOR JOSEPH IN PRIMARY

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29.—Though they did not count towards his republican nomination as governor, Senator George W. Joseph received 465 democratic votes in Multnomah county, the official canvass revealed today.

many shots at a man who had started to flee at the sight of them. The man fell. The youths said his head was almost shot away.

They ran for a policeman. The runners picked up the body of their victim and dumped it into the automobile. They piled in themselves, and the car was set in motion.

Capone's Hand Suspected
One of the men, however, had not succeeded in getting inside the car when it started. He leaped to the running board just as a special policeman, pistol drawn, came running up. One of the youths cried, "Stop them!" and the officer grabbed the man and yanked him from the running board as the automobile sped away.

The man gave his name as Sam Hunt, 21 years old. In the alley was a golf bag containing a shotgun, and in Hunt's pocket was an automatic pistol. Hunt denied taking part in the shooting.

Detectives suggested that the indictment yesterday by a federal grand jury of Ralph Capone under the Jones law may have provided a motive for the gun attack, the victim possibly being someone believed to have given information involving Capone in liquor law violations.

Shotgun Events
As part of the day's activities, there will be a program of contests for devotees of shotgun pastime. Six regular events are scheduled. Four of them, at 16 yards, will be held under the jack-rabbit system. This requires each participant to pay for 25 clay targets. For each target broken he receives pro-rata money back. Money covering unbroken targets is distributed at the end of the match among the four contestants registering the highest scores.

There will also be two handicap events, based upon scores made in the four 16-yard events. Prize money will be distributed four ways.

In addition to these events there will be as many special events as the shooters desire. Two traps will be used for the scheduled events, and one for doubles and special events, to be arranged at the grounds.

ENGINEER, FIREMAN KILLED IN WRECK

FLINT, Mich., May 28.—The engineer and fireman of the Grand Trunk Inter-City Limited, bound from Montreal to Chicago, were killed and several passengers injured this afternoon when the train ran into an open switch at Helsay, five miles east of here. The train was believed to have been running at a speed of 50 miles an hour when Engineer Arthur Morden saw the open switch. He is believed to have thrown on his emergency brake and leaped from the cabin. He was caught in the wreckage and killed. Fireman Pierce's body was buried beneath the wreckage of the locomotive. The locomotive and eight cars turned over.
