### KINK HAS ADDED GREAT STRENGTH

A simple looking little "kink" has added a tremendous amount of strength to the frames used in Dodge Brothers automobiles. ### OREGON THE BEAUTIFUL

After having brought sharply to their attention that an automobile tourist can cross Oregon from north to south and from east to west without once entering or seeing the huge forests that account for much of the state's wealth, citizens are now busily organizing a statewide "Save Oregon Scenery League."

The league will have for its purpose the setting aside of certain areas of forest land through which highways pass, as parks, to be left untouched, and further will publicize these areas so that visitors may be induced to drive through them.

Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism at the University of Oregon, is a leader in the movement, and has already made an extensive study of the scenic and recreational phases of the highway system. He pointed out the fact that unless specially directed, tourists may now drive through the state and miss the forests and that unless steps are taken immediately, in a short time all forests bordering on highways may be demolished.

The movement has the endorsement of H. B. Van Duzer and Judge Robert W. Sawyer, both members of the State Highway Commission; J. C. Ainsworth, president of the United States National bank of Portland, and many others.—News story from Eugene, Oregon, May 5, 1930.
