BANDON READY FOR OPENING OF A BIG SUMMER SEASON

Many Visitors at Beach for Past Week End—Good Weather for Picnics and Outings.

DREDGE AT WORK ON BANDON HARBOR

BANDON, May 29.—The usual expenditure yearly on the Bandon harbor is now being done. The U. S. dredge is working as

steadily as the weather will permit. The harbor is deepened every year after the winter's drift has made the channel quite shallow.

The north jetty is not very solid leaving large openings for drift sand to lodge on the bottom of the bar. It is generally conceded that if the jetty were repaired the harbor would be practically the same depth the year round. The money has been appropriated for this work but it will be a few years before actual work is begun.

A crew of five men is employed on the dredge which has been working on the harbor for the past five weeks. The dredge can not work every day because of the roughness of the bar. The dredging can only be done when the bar is smooth enough for the dredge to go over the bar to dump the load of sand. This also keeps the tug busy most of the time.
