DWIGHT MORROW LAUDS HOOVER FOR ACTION IN CRISIS

Says President Deserves Gratitude for Manner in Which Business Slump Was Met.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 29.—Speaking of the present economic period as a "time of serious emergency," Dwight W. Morrow, candidate for the republican nomination, lauded President Hoover today in a campaign address and expressed faith in the ability of the American people to wrest a prosperous tomorrow from the "bad times" of today.

He praised the president for his "constructive action," and said complete cure lay with business men themselves.

"After all is said and done," he declared, "the most effective cure for bad times rests with business men themselves. There is no substitute for individual initiative, for individual faith, for individual courage."

Recalling that it was President Hoover, then secretary of commerce, who advocated the conference on unemployment in 1921, Morrow said that "when the crash

in security values came last fall" Mr. Hoover was unusually well equipped to deal with the emergency.

"President Hoover," he said, "deserves and will receive the gratitude of this country for his constructive action in a time of serious emergency. * * * as a result of his leadership thousands of men have been working during the past six months who otherwise might have remained idle."

ADVENTIST CHIEF SOUNDS FAITH CALL AT WORLD MEETING

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 29.—Formal organization out of the way, the 2,000 delegates to the quadrennial world conference of Seventh Day Adventists today started the active work of their gathering, which is to last until June 12.

They had before them the keynote sounded by their president.

the Rev. W. A. Spicer of Washington, D. C., that they "revive the simple advent message everywhere."

"We must sound the note that Christ is coming in power and glory, and the message of preparation to meet him," Spicer told the opening session of the conference last night.

"The last four years have witnessed the baptism of more than one hundred thousand souls. The great controversy between light and darkness is nearing the crisis, and we must preach the gospel in its fullness, with fearlessness and power."

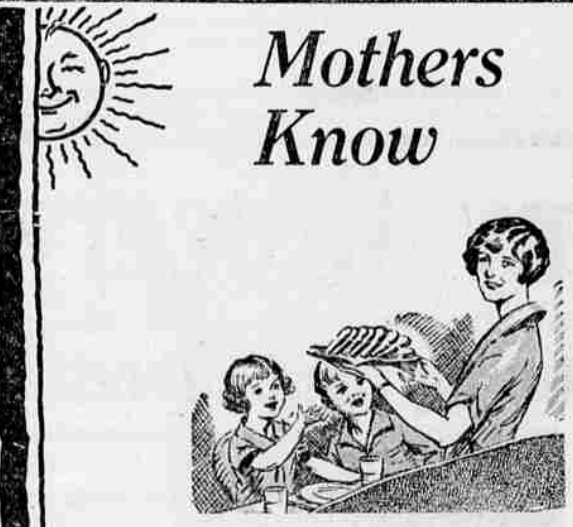
