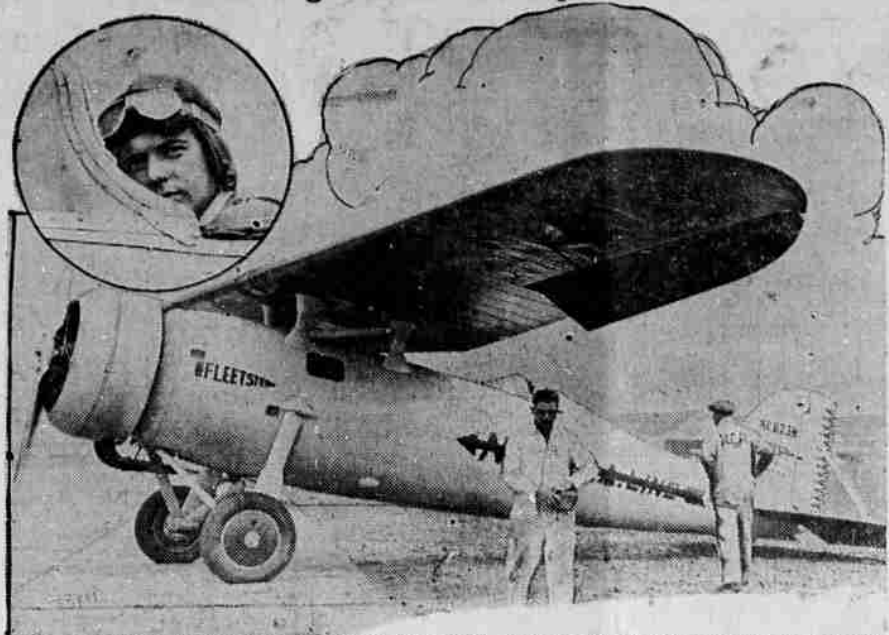
Bride-Elect Honored Wednesday Afternoon With Lovely Shower

POPE PIUS FETED ON 73TH BIRTHDAY

VATICAN CITY, May 31.—Pope Pius today celebrated his seventy-third birthday. Greetings poured in from all over the world.

As in former years the Pope devoted special attention to prayer. The pontifical banner was broken out from several edifices within the city-state, while the Swiss guards hoisted their own standard from their principal post near the famous bronze door, and, with the palatine guard, appeared at all formal occasions in full dress uniform.

Achille Ratti, now Pius XI, was born at Desio, not far from Milan, May 31, 1857, of a family of textile mill operators. The town of his birthplace was then under Austrian domination. He was crowned pope on February 12, 1922.

The pontiff gave audiences to several hundred persons. He approved plans for decoration and illumination of St. Peter's on the occasion of the canonization of the Canadian martyrs.
