SOUTHERN PACIFIC
IMPROVING TUNNEL

GLENDALE, May 31.—Work of building a concrete portal at the north end of Tunnel 9 (north according to the layman, east in railroad parlance) and lining a part of the tunnel with concrete was recently begun by the Southern Pacific company. This project will require the expenditure of considerable money both for material and labor and when completed, will practically do away with the fire hazard that has existed here. The old wooden portal is surrounded by timbered country more or less subject to the ever present danger of forest fires. Tunnel 9 is near Leland and is nearly one-half mile in length. A number of minor projects are being planned by the Southern Pacific company for completion this summer. Work is expected to begin soon replacing the old rails with new heavy steel on all curves between Ashland and Carnes.

ROSEBURG BEATEN
BY GLENDALE IN
BALL GAME SUNDAY

GLENDALE, June 2.—The Glendale baseball team won its seventh consecutive victory and defeated Roseburg for the second time this season in a game played on the Brockway ball field near Coon Bay Junction Sunday afternoon. Roseburg used three pitchers to head off the Glendale sluggers who made 27 hits during the game which resulted in a 21 to 14 defeat for Roseburg. OF THE CITY BAND

GLENDALE, June 2.—Mr. and Mrs. Edward C. Throne, of the Double E ranch on upper Cow creek, spent Decoration day in Glendale. Throne played a cornet in the Glendale band at the Memorial exercises held Friday forenoon. He remembers well his first public appearance with a band in Glendale which was as leader of the first Glendale band that made its first public appearance at a Decoration day program held in 1905, just 25 years ago. The event was made especially memorable by a happening that occurred at that time. The band boys were proudly marching down the rough street of the early days with the bass

drum loudly booming when the bass drummer stepped into a hole. He missed the drum and the drum stick slipped out of his hand and landed in the brush alongside the road. All band performance was stopped until the bass drum stick was found and restored to the absent drummer, who was R. K.
