THERE is no doubt that a large number of accidents are due to carelessness. They are met in industrial life, among the thousands who go to business every day in the great cities and on the highways.

With the growing use of machinery in the small, as well as the large industries, there are greater hazards to life and limb. The speeding up of life in general contributes to the dangers of modern existence.

Safety devices, safety measures and "safety first" publicity have lessened the dangers to some extent. But in spite of them the rate of increase in accidents is appalling.

An investigation into the causes of street accidents made in New York City revealed the fact that the number of accidents reached its highest peak between four and five in the afternoon. At this time of day school children, office workers and laborers are on their way home after a hard day's work.

Fatigue has a great deal to do with accidents. When you are tired you are less alert, less watchful of danger and more indifferent to it.

There can be no doubt that in any calling where strenuous effort is required accidents are more to be expected during the period of greatest fatigue. There are other factors, of course, but we must consider this.

There is a limit to human endurance. The limitation of bodily and mental effort must be properly met. It is not good for anybody to work so hard or in such a form of work as to be habitually tired.
