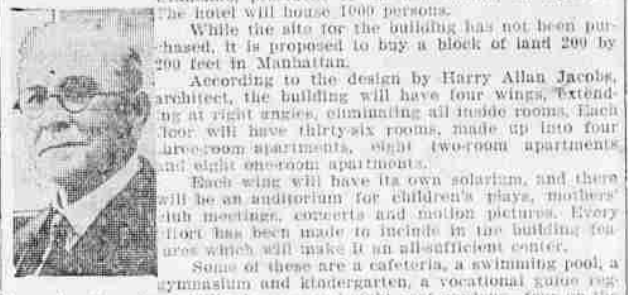

### HUMANITY'S STOCK GOES UP

Plans for a 28-story hotel for working mothers with small children from whom financial support has been withdrawn have been completed, and, as soon as funds are available, work on the structure will be started in accordance with the charter just granted the Working Mothers' association, according to an announcement by Mrs. Rose Mithers, president of the association, on April 29.



The hotel will house 1000 persons. While the site for the building has not been purchased, it is proposed to buy a block of land 200 by 200 feet in Manhattan.

According to the design by Harry Allan Jacobs, architect, the building will have four wings, extending at right angles, surrounding all inside rooms. Each floor will have thirty-six rooms, made up into four three-room apartments, eight two-room apartments and eight one-room apartments.

Each wing will have its own solarium, and there will be an auditorium for children's plays, mothers' club meetings, concerts and motion pictures. Every floor has been made to include in the building features which will make it an all-sufficient center. Some of these are a cafeteria, a swimming pool, a gymnasium and kindergarten, a vocational guide room, bowling alley, billiard rooms and eight roof gardens—four on the sixteenth and four on the twenty-eighth floor. Of the four open courts formed by the wings of the building, one will be used as an entrance, and the other three will serve as open-air playgrounds, with supervised play for the children.

In describing the aim of the association in building the hotel, Mrs. Mithers said: "The hotel is planned mainly for the mothers of the period of readjustment following the withdrawal of financial and moral domestic support. In the hotel these mothers will be assisted and housed during their crisis, and facilities for education, vocational guidance and material assistance will be provided.

Among the sponsors of the association's venture, Mrs. Mithers said, were Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Mrs. Rebekah Kolat, Mrs. Edith Totten Fleming, Theodore W. Darrell, the Rev.
