SANDE HURT ON EVE OF BELMONT RACE

NEW YORK, June 6.—Injuries Earl Sande received last night in an automobile accident will not prevent him from riding in the Belmont stakes at Belmont park tomorrow.

Sande appeared at the Aqueduct track today to give Gallant Fox, the big colt he rode to victory in the Preakness and the Kentucky derby, a last work out for the stakes.

He seemed little the worse for the shuffling up he received in the accident although he still wore bandages on his face, which was cut in the crash.

Three other persons were injured in the accident in which three cars flared. Sande was in a machine with Edward Barnes, also a jockey, whose ribs were fractured. Henry L. Gross, a Brooklyn jeweler, suffered fractures of his kneecaps and Miss Betty Reiter, of Jamaica.
