

MANY MEASURES TO BE SUBMITTED TO STATE VOTERS

November Ballot Will Be
One of Longest in the
History of Oregon
Government.

Cabinet, Income Tax, Fish
Ban, Cigarettes, Wages
of Lawmakers, Tax
Issues Are Up.

SALEM, Ore., June 7.—Voters at the general election in November will be confronted with one of the longest ballots in the history of the state provided all of the proposed constitutional amendments and initiative measures are completed. This was announced by the secretary of state today.

Seven amendments and two measures were referred to the voters by the last legislature. Probably the most important proposed constitutional amendment is that providing for a cabinet form of government. Under this amendment there would be nine government departments. These would include agriculture, labor and industry, financial administration, commerce, education, public works and domain, health and public welfare, police and military affairs, and legal affairs. Heads of these departments would be appointed by the governor. The executive, state and treasury departments would remain intact.

Loan Extension Proposed
Another proposed amendment would extend the privilege of obtaining state loans under the soldiers' bonus law to residents of Oregon who served any time in the Spanish-American war or in the Philippine Insurrection or the Boxer rebellion. The loan privilege also would be extended to persons otherwise qualified who were not residents of Oregon when they entered the service, but who should have been actual residents thereof for ten years continuously immediately before filing application for a loan. The amendment carries authority to increase the amount of state bonds necessary to meet the new requirements.

To Reclassify Property
There is another proposed amendment which would classify and subdivide property, including motor vehicles, for the purpose of taxation. The proposed new classification would take into consideration the use, value and depreciation of the property affected without specific assessment.

Another proposed constitutional amendment would fix the compensation of members of the legislature at \$500 for the term of two years, together with travel pay for going to and returning from the place of meeting. The presiding officers would receive one-half of their allowance as members as additional compensation.

New Income Tax Planned
Repeal of a constitutional amendment authorizing the state to pay interest on irrigation and drainage bonds for a period of five years after such bonds have been issued also will go on the ballot in November.

Two measures referred to the voters by the 1929 legislature provide for the enactment of a state income tax law and a method for filling vacancies in the state legislature.

Other constitutional amendments and initiative measures which have been filed with the secretary of state but which have not yet been completed, follow:

Cigarettes Are Target
Constitutional amendment prohibiting the importation, manufacture, sale, purchase, possession or giving away of cigarettes within the state of Oregon.

Constitutional amendment providing that from March 1, 1931, to and until March 1, 1935, all revenue necessary for the maintenance of state, county, municipal and district government, shall be raised by tax on the value of land irrespective of improvements in or on it, and thereafter the full rental value of land irrespective of improvements, shall be taken in lieu of all other taxes for the maintenance of government.

Measure denying to life insurance companies and fraternal organizations the right to do business in Oregon without favorable vote of the people. In cases where premium rates were increased contrary to agreement within six years previous to filing of application.

Bill providing for a flat annual fee of \$3 for the operation of all motor vehicles.

Constitutional amendment providing for the creation of water and power utility districts.

Constitutional amendment, closing the Rogue river to commercial fishing.

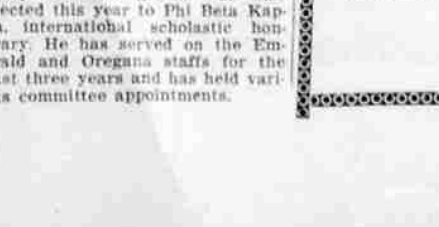
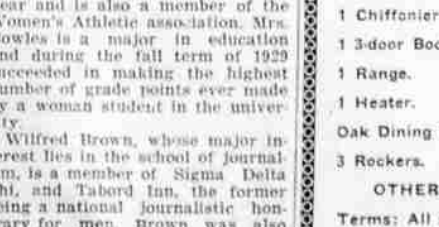
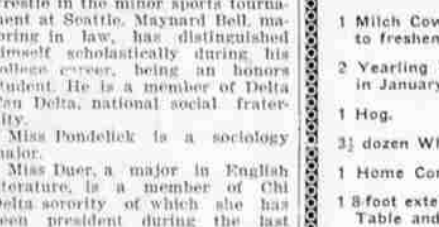
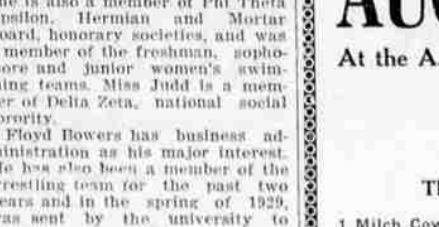
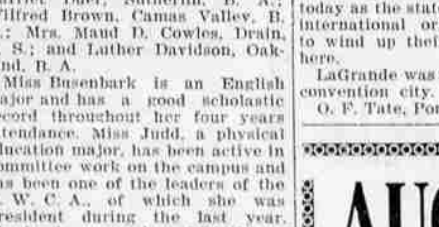
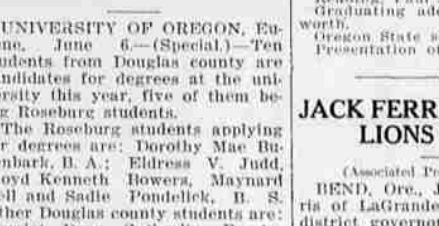
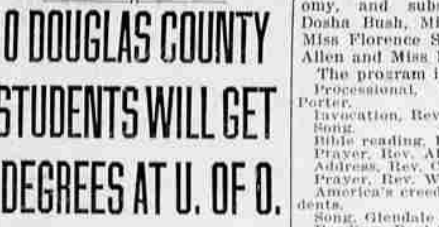
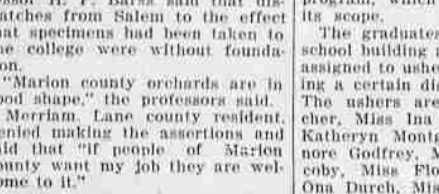

HOUSEHOLD HINTS
Patent advice on the care of patent leather slippers is timely, as it is the leather that is shining forth from well-kept feet this spring. Scratches may be made invisible by painting with a fine brush that has been dipped in a mixture of olive oil and jet black ink. "If at first you don't succeed try, try again" is a slogan to be remembered. The process may be repeated several times if the scratches are deep. The beauty of patent leather may be prolonged by rubbing it at night with a little vaseline. Then polish it off in the morning. Kid shoes are improved in the same way.

TIRE PRICES CUT BY TWO COMPANIES

Many motorists were assured of a saving in the cost of automobile upkeep today when two tire companies—Goodyear and General—announced through their local dealers reductions ranging up to 5 per cent on most popular sizes. The Healy-Wood Tire company made the announcement of the Goodyear reduction and J. A. Soules, of the Highway Service company, announced the reduction on General tires.

Other companies, it was reported, would meet the cut.

The Goodyear Tire & Rubber company, one of the "big four" of the American tire industry, was the first to announce a price slash. It was followed by a reduction of about 5 per cent on all pneumatic

tires and tubes by the General Tire & Rubber company.

P. W. Litchfield, president of Goodyear, in announcing a cut of 5 per cent on four-ply passenger tires and tubes and smaller reductions on some heavy duty sizes, said the retail buyer was now able to buy tires at the cheapest price in history.

The reductions were coincident with the sensational drop in crude rubber prices, both in New York and London, which was the culmination of a steady decline since early in the year which leading British and Dutch growers have attempted to curb through restricted production. Mr. Litchfield said that the cut was influenced by this drop in the price of raw materials and also the improved manufacturing methods of Goodyear.

Before the final vote was put on the unamended resolution, Mrs. Otto Kahn, New York, gained recognition from the chairman to speak in favor of inclusion of the word. What was scheduled as a projected move on the part of one group of delegates to delete another section of the resolution failed to materialize. This section recited that "prohibition offers the best means for curbing the liquor traffic and its attendant crimes."
