

South Umpqua Rod and Gun Club Interested in Extension of County Road System

ROSEBURG GROUP PLEDGES SUPPORT FOR CUT-OFF ROAD

Maurice Newland, Chamber of Commerce President, Discusses Benefit of Tourist Traffic.

Super-Road District Plan for Tiller-Trail Project to Be Investigated by Committee.

(News-Review Douglas County Special.)
DAYS CREEK, June 7.—Maurice Newland, president of the Roseburg chamber of commerce, gave an interesting and inspiring talk on the values of road development before the South Umpqua Rod and Gun club at Days creek Wednesday evening. Quoting from California tourist traffic facts he very clearly presented the immense advantages to be gained by attracting to Oregon more of the millions spent each year in the west by the tourists. Mr. Newland assured the club that the chamber of commerce and business men of the county were deeply interested in the development of the South Umpqua country and sympathetic toward any movement for the completion of the Tiller-Trail road.

Mr. Newland was followed by Huron Clough, county commissioner, who briefly reviewed the road program of Douglas county for the last few years and suggested a means of organizing the South Umpqua country for the purpose of pushing work on the Tiller-Trail cut-off. Mr. Clough expressed his faith in the value of the road and pledged his full support to any organized effort to complete it.

B. F. Nichols of Tiller, an enthusiastic "good roads" booster, promised his support to any movement of the kind and, as a member of the club, moved the appointment of a committee to investigate the various super-road district plans and plot out tentative boundaries. F. L. Blatter of Canyonville and Archie Ferguson and R. A. Moore of Days creek were appointed and instructed to make a report at the next meeting of the club, two weeks hence.

W. W. Willis, mayor of Canyonville and B. F. Nichols spoke in behalf of the Canyonville Pioneer celebration to be held July 4. Mr. Nichols recounted some interesting incidents in the early days of Canyonville and invited the upper river people to assist in making the celebration a success. The club endorsed the Canyonville event and promised its cooperation and support.

The past hunt, which has been in progress since April, was extended for two more weeks. The final count and arrangements for the big feed will be made at the next meeting of the club which will be held at Tiller, Wednesday evening, June 13.

Nine new members were enrolled, bringing the total enrollment to 103. The goal is now set for 150 members by July 1.

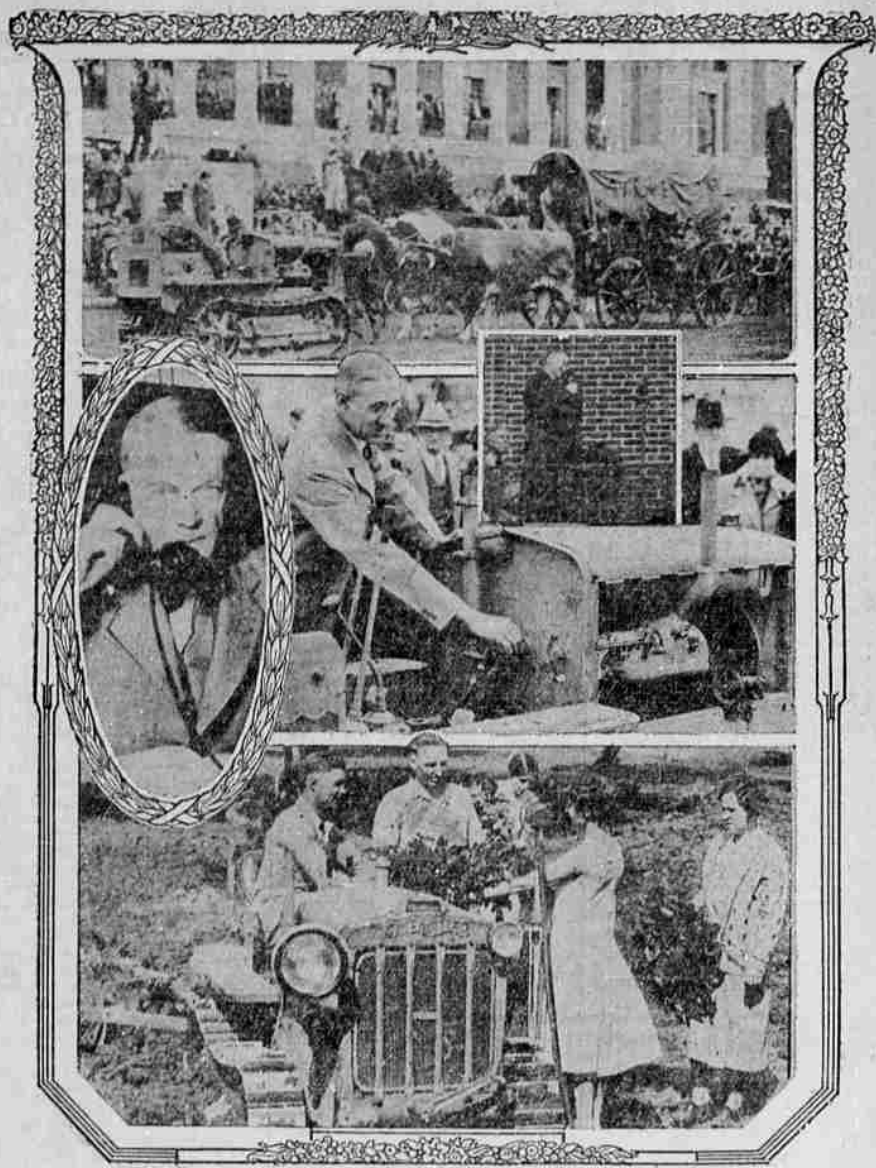

IMPROVEMENTS TO BE MADE AT U. S. AVIATION FIELDS

(News-Review Douglas County Special.)

GLENDAL, June 7.—In order to help make the landing field beacon and its markings more visible to flyers the oak trees in the immediate vicinity of the aerial field, near the government emergency landing field near the Garrett place on the Cow creek highway, are being cut down this week. A tall pine tree that was near this point was also felled because it was thought it might prove a menace at some time to some flyer seeking to land here.

All the trees on top of Stage Creek peak that were within range of the direct rays from the revolving beacon located at this site were felled last week. The workmen engaged in felling these trees saw 26 rattlesnakes while at work on and near the summit. They succeeded in killing 24 of them.

All work at these beacon sites and emergency landing fields is being done under supervision of the airways division of the U. S. department of commerce. The tree felling job is being done by R. B. DeFord, J. M. DeFord and J. B. Cox, all of Ashland, who are doing considerable clearing work at many of the beacon sites on the San Francisco-Seattle route. Nearly all the material used last summer in the construction of beacons in southern Oregon was packed by DeFord and his helpers to the various mountain peaks and summits where the beacons were erected.

A crew of painters is expected here this week to paint the beacon towers and concrete arrow markers, both at the field and on top of the mountain, also the field supply house. The large concrete direction marker arrows are to be painted chrome yellow. The ground adjacent to the arrows, for a width of three feet, will be given a heavy coating of black oil, giving these arrows a greater visibility from the sky and also preventing grass and weed growth. The field boundary markers will also be encircled with a large ring of black oil.

Arrangements for the cutting of the weeds and grass on the local field have been made with W. B. Garrett, caretaker.

The Glendale emergency landing field is one of the most important fields between Roseburg and Grants Pass, according to government officials, because of the hazardous flying conditions that prevail over the mountains in this part of the state much of the time.

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CITY COUNCIL AT GLENDAL PAYS FOR WATER SYSTEM

GLENDAL, June 7.—The regular monthly meeting of the Glendale city council was held Monday evening at which time the usual list of bills were ordered paid. Most of the bills allowed were incurred for labor on the Mill Creek addition to the city's water supply. Approximately \$13,517 has already been spent by the city this spring on its water system.

W. B. Lesh, under whose supervision the Mill creek job is being done, reported the completion of the pipe line to the source of intake on Mill creek and that the water would be turned into the line Tuesday. It was expected that water from Mill Creek would be turned into the distribution lines the latter part of the week.

The council ordered immediate repairs made to the Section creek intake line and discussed building a cover over reservoir No. 2. A price was placed on the old pipe salvaged from the relay job and Mayor Brown was authorized to sell same.

An offer by J. Gould to paint the city fire truck for \$10 was accepted.

As nearly all the money raised by the recent water bond issue has been spent the council ordered the special \$16,000 treasurer's bond covering this issue cancelled.

An expenditure of not to exceed \$20 to help defray costs of leveling driveway in front of the Presbyterian church was authorized.

No action was taken regarding a suggestion by Mayor Brown in regard to cutting weeds and grass at this time so as to reduce fire risks later in the season.
