

MYRTLE CREEK WINS JUNIOR BALL TITLE OF ALL DOUGLAS

The junior league baseball team, representing the southern end of the county, made up largely of players from the Myrtle Creek high school, won the county junior league championship here Saturday afternoon, by defeating the north end team, made up of players from Yoncalla, Oakland, Sutherlin and Dallas, by a score of 1 to 0.

The game was an airtight exhibition of baseball, with only three clean hits being made in the entire contest. The sole score of the game was made on a fielder's choice.

There were several tight spots in the game, but the pitchers on both sides were able to pull out because of unusual twisting ability coupled with strong support in the field.

The north end team lost a chance to tie the score in the fifth inning, when a runner was put out trying to steal second, with no outs against the side. The next batter slammed out a two-base hit that would have doubtless brought the runner in if the stolen base had not been attempted.

The central district was beaten 7 to 3 in the morning contest with the north end, and was defeated 19 to 1 in the afternoon game with the south end.

A group of men conducting the junior league activities selected eighteen players, who will make up a first squad to represent the county in the district elimination. Four of these players are to be culled out before the team is definitely selected as each district is limited to 14 players. A practice game is to be played Thursday and another Saturday at Roseburg in preparation for the district contest. The players selected are: catchers, Goff, Sutherlin; Adams, Myrtle Creek; pitchers, Chaney, Leyer, Myrtle Creek; Smith, Sutherlin; 1st base, Bridges, Roseburg; 2nd base, Yocum, Myrtle Creek; 3rd base, Parker, Sutherlin; shortstop, Sellers, Yoncalla; right field, Cox, Yoncalla; left field, Cox, Yoncalla; center field, Taylor, Yoncalla; Miller, Riddle, left field, Henninger, Oakland; utility, Parks, Roseburg; Walter, Oakland; Bronson, Myrtle Creek; and Copland, Oakland.

The junior league is sponsored by the American Legion, and has been handled by a committee composed of Legion members. Special assistance was given in handling the championship by George French of Sutherlin and Coach Ireland of Myrtle Creek, who have been working in the north and south districts.

COMMENCEMENT PROGRAM HELD AT JUNIOR HI SCHOOL

The junior high school auditorium was crowded to capacity this morning for the third annual graduation program for the 8th grade students of the county. Graduates from practically every section of the county were present together with parents, relatives and friends. The service was a combined baccalaureate and commencement program. ing to organize as other groups have organized, he will be able to control production, set his own price and market his products when the markets are most favorable.

"The farm problem is a problem for the farmer to solve for himself and the only way it can be accomplished is by organizing the industry so that the producer can market his products through his own organization instead of turning them over to other groups to speculate with, for their own profit."

In this connection, Palmiter said, the grange "should pass a resolution condemning the action of the United States chamber of commerce in attacking the agricultural marketing act, and should commend Chairman Ledge of the farm board for so fearlessly defending the farmer and for his efforts in behalf of agriculture."

Barge Lines Favored
Palmiter said government owned and operated barge lines on the Mississippi had reduced transportation costs, and declared similar development on the Columbia and Willamette rivers would benefit Oregon and the northwest.

"A definite movement has been made with this end in view," he said, "by the Columbia River Development association, and our organization should get behind this

movement and lend all possible aid in securing its accomplishment."

"As in former reports to this body I still contend that the entire structure of freight rates is unfair to agriculture."

of the explosion. He was found by rescuers in a semi-conscious condition, crawling along the floor of the tunnel. This morning he still had not sufficiently recovered to give an account of what had happened.

The rescue parties reported that the stricken had reached the depth of 18 inches on the tunnel floor and might flood the tunnel, since the water had not reached the mouth. They were forced to wade through to locate the bodies. Pumps were put to work in the tunnel at once.

The first rescuers went in without gas masks and several were overcome temporarily. A messenger then was sent to fetch fire-fighters' headquarters at Livermore, gas masks obtained, and the bodies located.

Sam R. Hensley was the first man to enter the tunnel on a rescue mission. He wanted to save his buddy, Cook, with whom he had served in the army 15 years, in France, Hawaii, and the Philippines. Although warned, he went in without a mask, was overcome by the fumes and dragged out. Doctors said he would recover.

3 Killed, 12 Injured
DETROIT, June 9.—Three laborers were killed and between 12 and 20 others trapped by a dynamite explosion in a waterworks tunnel 180 feet below the surface of the Detroit river at the foot of Marquette drive today. Twelve were injured.

The explosion occurred in a tunnel in which the men were working when an electric drill struck a charge of dynamite which had been placed there Saturday but had failed to explode.

Two of the injured are expected to die.

In Power 30 Years

WASHINGTON, June 9.—The defeat of Senator Furnifold M. Simmons for re-nomination in the North Carolina democratic primary was the subject of much discussion in Washington today with many

citing his opposition to the presidential candidacy of Alfred E. Smith as the principal cause of his downfall.

These pointed out that Simmons' victorious opponent, Josiah W. Bailey, entered the contest with the avowed purpose of "punishing" the senator for deserting the party in 1928 and that this formed a major issue in the campaign.

Simmons' defeat came after thirty years of party leadership in his state during which time he was a power in the national councils of his party. In his retirement, the senate will lose its oldest member in point of service.

He has been identified primarily with tariff and taxation legislation. Throughout the war he was chairman of the powerful senate finance committee and since, as ranking minority member of the committee, has been a party spokesman on revenue questions.

In spite of his years—he is 76—he has been active in the tariff fight now approaching its end. He is a leader of the democratic-independent republican coalition, opposing the tariff bill, and one of the senate's conferees.

Verdict on Heflin Due

The primary of Saturday was the first of the year involving a democratic senator who opposed Governor Smith. Senator Heflin of Alabama, who also urged that Smith be defeated, is seeking re-election this year, but has been excluded from the democratic primary and is running independently.

With Simmons out of the race, nine of the present senate member-

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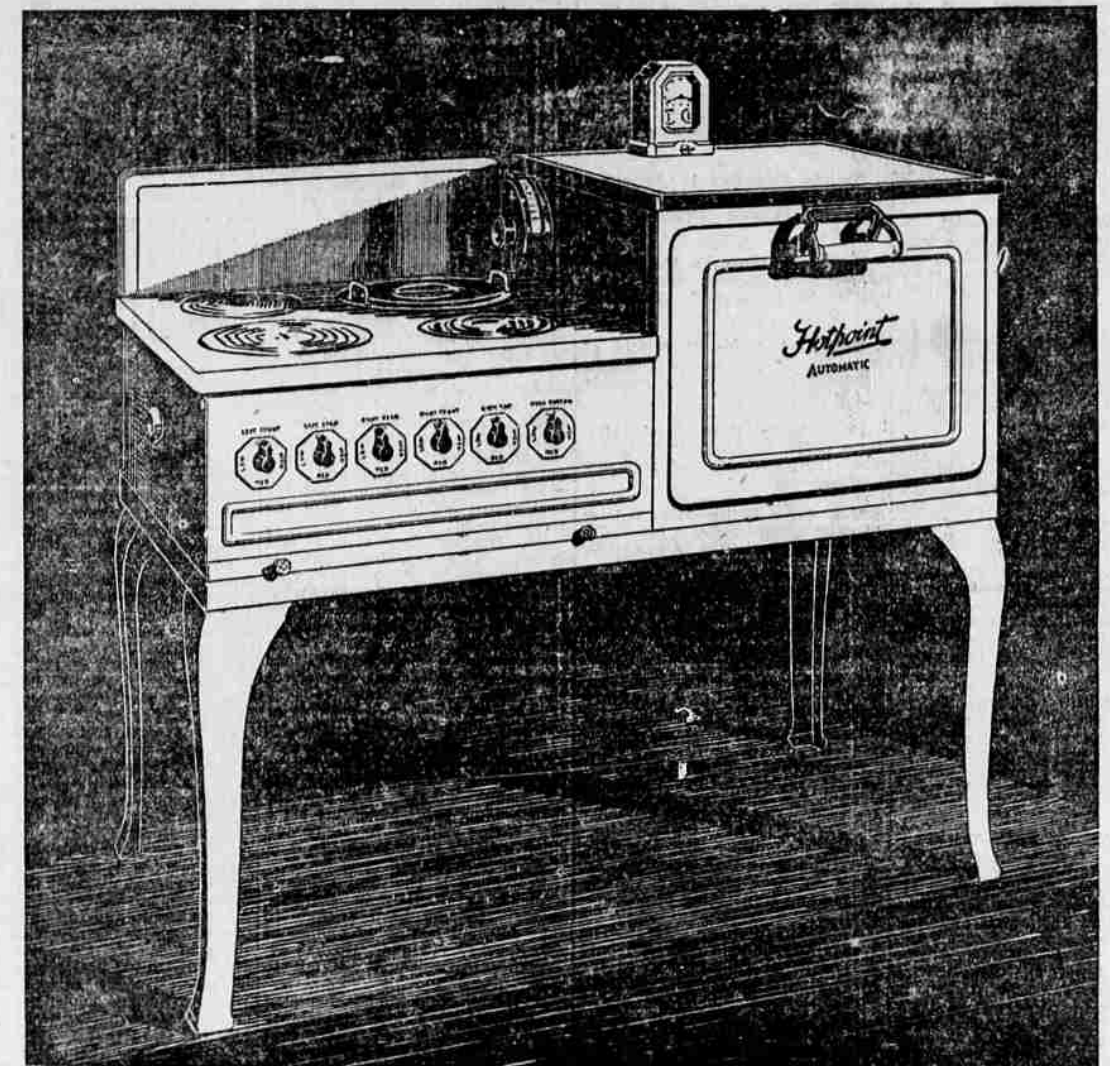
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ship will not return for the seventy-second congress. Deneen, of Illinois and Grundy of Pennsylvania, were defeated in primary elections and six are not candidates for re-election. This group consists of Gillett of Massachusetts, Gould of Maine, Phipps of Colorado, Goff of West Virginia, Sullivan of Wyoming, and Baird of New Jersey.

Senator McMaster, republican, South Dakota, is the only member who has emerged successfully from a primary contest. Senator McNary, republican, Oregon, was renominated without opposition.



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
