GIL ASKS INQUIRY INTO PLOT CHARGE
(Mexico Press Leased Wire)
MEXICO CITY, June 10.—Former President Emilio Portes Gil has sent a letter to President Ortiz Rubio asking for a full investigation into charges made by Luis Morones, former secretary of industry, commerce and labor, to the effect that Portes Gil, while provincial president, plotted against the life of Rubio in Los Angeles. "I consider very grave Morones' charges that I headed a plot to 'take your life,'" Portes Gil said. "This idea, born in Morones' mind, puts me in the position of asking you to make a full investigation of all costs into the departments of the interior, foreign relations and the consulate in Los Angeles as I want to show my detractor his insincerity. I also hear that the railroad workers have published a statement to the effect that I never admitted them to unrest as Morones charges."
