STAINED PILLOW CASE VITAL ITEM IN MURDER TRIAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

EUREKA, Cal., June 10.—A pillow case found near the scene of the slaying of Mrs. Minnie McCoy was turned over to chemists today to determine whether stains appearing on it are those of blood as was contended yesterday by Clarence L. King, ex-convict, on trial for the murder of the woman.

King declared the case the pillow case to wipe up the blood in his automobile following the shooting of Mrs. McCoy, his former sweetheart. This testimony supported his previous statement that Mrs. McCoy met death through the accidental discharge of a pistol which he was attempting to wrest from her hand.

District Attorney S. E. Metzler, however, seeking to prove King killed his former sweetheart during a quarrel on the highway outside of the car, maintained the stains on the pillow case were those of rust and that the case, used as a bag, contained Mrs. McCoy's money.

The body of Mrs. McCoy was found beside a log near the Redwood highway 60 miles north of here last March. King was arrested in Portland, Ore., a few days later. It developed he had married Eunice Pardee of Corvallis, Ore., a few weeks after the slaying.

RUSSIA DECLARED SPONSORING WORLD WIDE REVOLUTION

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Assertion that officials of the Soviet Russian government had in official documents "declared war against all humanity" was made today by the Rev. Edmund Walsh, of Georgetown university, at the opening hearing on communists' activities in this country before a special house investigating committee.

Walsh, a student of communism, was with the Hoover famine relief mission in Russia in 1921. He said the Russian government was at the front of a world-wide revolutionary movement.

The revolution, he said, was directed without regard to geographical locations, adding the soviet policy was to divide the world into two phases—capitalists and socialists. Walsh said a million dollar fund was set up in 1917 for foreign communist propaganda.

MAKE WAR IMPOSSIBLE

When Frank D. Kellogg, as secretary of state for the United States, affixed his signature to the Pact of Paris, he was 72 years old. Many people thought the treaty a fitting climax to a long career, and the secretary, having brought about the adoption of this pact outlawing war by the leading nations, would be content to wear his laurels calmly and enjoy a well-earned rest.

But these people did not know the active secretary. They did not realize that behind an almost fragile body was a mind so vigorous and alert that rest would be irksome; they did not know anything of his life, a life that had been filled with struggles and activity since the time when a boy he got his first taste of education in a one-room country school near Potsdam, N. Y.

It is impossible for a man of his type to rest, and today Mr. Kellogg is almost as active in the work for peace as in those days when he was exchanging the now famous notes with M. Briand preparatory to proposing to the civilized world a recourse to reason rather than to arms.

He posed for me in New York the other day, and true to the routine that he followed when his office was in the formidable gray building on Pennsylvania avenue in Washington, he was receiving visitors and transacting business at an hour when much younger men are just beginning to wake up. For there is still much to be done in the work that he has set out for himself and, although he no longer holds public office, he has determined to devote the remainder of his life to further the cause of peace.

Mr. Kellogg is no visionary. He has had too much practical experience not to know that the road he has chosen is not an easy one. Nevertheless, it is in his hope that he looks forward, and by education carried on by schools and colleges, churches and societies, he sees a way of so educating the minds of the people both the horrors and the futility of war that another one would be virtually an impossibility.

Frank Kellogg is our dean of Peace; He gave our hopes a great increase; He paved the way for greater things. Such wise persuasion always brings. Through patient, kindly, gentle stress He made the world at last express Its love for peace—the Kellogg pact—The goal became acknowledged fact.

Call it a "gesture" if you please, But fear of war began to ease; The world began to spike its guns, Is down a million warship tons. The talk of peace is on the air In answer to a worldwide prayer; World friendship is a popular cry 'Tis blazoned on the very sky.

Yes, war has lost its vogue of fame; It has a scorned and ugly name. A warlike nation loses caste; The world revolts at it, at last. The Kellogg Pact helped wake this scorn; A new world-fellowship was born. Great navies pause—no longer race; Forbearance now is no disgrace.

Frank Kellogg's words have struck the note, (A sentiment we love to quote); Let all our children learn in school That noblest force—the Golden Rule; Let churches pray, and never cease Until we crown the Prince of Peace. And war will never come again To mar and blight the sons of men.

CHICAGO GANGLAND WARFARE CLAIMS ADDITIONAL LIVES

Murder Also Thought Fate of Several Missing, Including Moran, Crime Chief.

CHICAGO, June 2.—Russell, alias Frank Thompson, often called "the armorer of gangland," drove into a New Milford filling station last night, weak from a bullet wound near the heart.

He would not talk, although physicians said the wound might cause his death. When Sheriff Harry Baldwin of Winnebago county asked who had shot him, Thompson's only answer was: "I won't talk. You ought to be smart enough to know I won't talk."

The attack upon Thompson, discovery of the body of Eugene (Red) McLaughlin, one of gangland's toughest characters—and the statement of officers that George (Bugs) Moran and several other important names in the gang world are missing and presumably slain, were week-end developments in the gang war revival.

Thompson was questioned at length during the early investigation of the Moran gang massacre of Valentine's day, 1929. Police said he supplied the machine guns used in the massacre as well as other gang attacks.

The discovery of Eugene (Red) McLaughlin's body in the drainage canal Saturday was another instance of the effort gangster killers are making to dispose of their victims. McLaughlin's body had been washed with iron.

McLaughlin has been living at an address not far from the spot on Ashland avenue where, only a short time ago, a man was shot down and his body spirited away. Police believe McLaughlin may have been that man.

Half a dozen gangsters, most of them well known, are missing and perhaps dead. But Roche, special investigator for the state's attorney, believes all have been taken on gangland's "one way ride."

George (Bugs) Moran himself is one of the number. Some detectives believe he is hiding; others believe he "got careless" and was slain.

Others who are presumed to have been executed and their bodies removed are: Leo Mongovan, Moran's bodyguard; Ted Newberry, a leader who quit the Moran fold—and disappeared; Ben Bennett, said to have come here representing a New York liquor syndicate; Harry Higgins, St. Paul racketeer, and Robert Schmidt—Frisco Dutch—a pal of Red McLaughlin's.

Aloysius "Al" Kearney, collector for the National Garage Owners' association, was found early today lying face down in south Troy street with bullet holes in the head and chest.

Several persons heard the shots that ended Kearney's life, but the police found no witnesses.

Possible motives were disgruntled garage owners and enmity between the national organization of garage owners and the now defunct Midwest Garage Owners' association.

CARAWAY THINKS CANNON IN RIGHT

WASHINGTON, June 10.—A possibility that Bishop James Cannon may be subpoenaed before the senate lobby committee developed yesterday soon after Chairman Caraway returned to Washington.

Caraway said he stood by his declaration in Arkansas that the committee had no right to ask the questions Cannon refused to answer, but he indicated an open mind as to the issuance of a subpoena.

When he walked out on the committee last week, Cannon said he was through as a voluntary witness, but could be found at his office.
