

TITULAR FISTIC BATTLE TO DRAW GATE OF \$700,000

**Sharkey Continues Betting
Favorite But Backing
of German May
Strengthen.**

**Referee for Thursday Bout
Not Yet Chosen—Both
Principals Appear
in Fine Form.**

NEW YORK, June 10.—Jack Sharkey's heavyweight championship battle with Max Schmeling on Thursday night will not draw a million dollar gate, but there are indications it will pass the \$600,000 total that has been predicted for it.

Mr. John Public is showing unmistakable signs of getting excited about the whole business. The boys on the streets are talking about it, arguments as to the respective merits of a left hook and a right cross are common and that's what made Jack Dempsey's various title battles draw millions.

A steady rain, a drab and colorless day, could not prevent customers from appearing in droves at Madison Square garden's box offices yesterday to demand more or less choice seats for the fray at Yankee stadium. At the end of the day the Garden announced the coffers of the Milk Fund, sponsors of the show, had been swelled by \$40,000. Recalling that \$90,000 had been taken in on Friday and Saturday, the Garden was not slow to estimate that the total gate would pass \$700,000.

Both in Good Shape
Just to make the day one of unalloyed bliss for the promoters, Sharkey and Schmeling both put on great workouts at their training quarters in Orangeburg and Tudor City, N. Y. The boys who will do the actual work have one more day of training ahead of them.

They will rest Wednesday and come to New York in time for

weighing in ceremonies at the stadium at 2 p. m. Thursday.

Principal interest here turned on the question of a referee. Neither Sharkey nor Schmeling has offered objection to the New York state athletic commission's plan to select the third man in the ring just before the 15-round title affray begins. A rousing contest among the experts nominated Ed Forbes, Jim Crowley and Kid McPartland as the most likely candidates.

There were indications that Les Magnolia, referee of the "foul-no-foul" contest between Sharkey and Phil Scott at Miami has been ruled out of consideration.

Betting Favors Sharkey
The latest betting odds favored Sharkey 9 to 5. Odds of 1 to 3 have been offered against Sharkey scoring a knockout and a 1 to 7 against Schmeling accomplishing the feat. Casting around for an explanation of the scarcity of wagers, some experts were of the opinion that supporters of Schmeling are waiting for longer odds before putting down their cash.

The radio details of the match will be broadcast through a national hookup by the National Broadcasting Co., with Graham McNamee the probable choice for duty at the microphone.

The athletic commission was to decide later today the status of Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's manager of choice. Jacobs has been under suspension here for months but the general expectation was that he would be granted a temporary license in time to handle Schmeling in his corner the night of the fight.

"YOUNGSTERS" IN 80'S TO VIE IN BILLIARD MATCH

MACKMEN INCREASE LEAD; CLEVELAND CROWDS SENATORS

Baseball games won in the spring count as much as the ones won in September, but the Washington Senators are discovering that it takes more than an April and May winning streak to keep in the midst of the American league fight.

True, the Senators are still clinging tenaciously to second place in the Junior circuit, but every day sees the Indians creeping closer and closer. Today Cleveland is only a half-game away while out in front, setting a burning pace, are the Athletics with a three game lead.

The Indians today stood within grasp of runner-up honors as the result of a 5-to-4 victory over the Senators yesterday. With Eddie Morgan providing the big gun of the offensive power and Walter Miller hurling good ball in the pluches, Cleveland came from behind to nose out their rivals in the eighth inning. Morgan hit a home run with one on and then added a triple later in the game.

Taking advantage of the Senators' defeat, the Athletics strengthened their hold on first place by eking out a victory over the White Sox, 3 to 2. Big Bob Welland held the champions at bay for eight innings, but in the ninth he bunched two of their six hits with a base on balls and a sacrifice fly to score what proved to be the tying and winning runs.

Chad Kinsey turned in a brilliant bit of relief hurling at St. Louis but holding the Yankees to five hits in six innings, failed to stop them from defeating the Browns 8 to 5. The Yanks scored seven of their runs off Crowder in the first three innings.

In the only other game played in the major leagues the Red Sox nosed out Detroit 7 to 6 by a five-run rally in the seventh. Gaston held the Tigers to nine hits.

All National league games were postponed either because of rain or wet grounds.

BAILEY'S PRIMARY TOTAL 1551 MORE THAN WILBUR'S

SALEM, Ore., June 10.—Official count of the vote cast in the primary election for the democratic nomination for governor, according to the secretary of state, shows that Edward F. Bailey of Junction City received 11,539 votes and George R. Wilbur of Hood River 10,388, a lead of 1551 for Bailey.

A. C. Hough of Grants Pass received 2679 and Ed S. Piper of Portland 4395.

In all three congressional districts the republican incumbents will have democratic opposition in November. In the first district W. A. Delzell of Salem, unopposed for the democratic nomination, received 10,440 votes. He will oppose Representative W. C. Hawley. In the second district Robert Bradford of La Grande, whose name was written in on the ballot, was given 85 votes and the nomination. Representative R. R. Butler of The Dalles, republican incumbent, received 43 democratic votes in the district.

In the third district Charles H. Martin, nominated by the democratic central congressional committee of the district, and whose name was written in, received 705 votes, and will run as the democratic opponent of Representative Kereff.

Elton Watkins, by the official count, received 25,058 votes for the democratic nomination for United States senator. Justice Harry H. Belt, republican incumbent, was accorded both the republican and the democratic nominations for position No. 6 on the supreme court. Chief Justice O. P. Coshaw, democrat, received 23,015 votes. He will have republican opposition in Judge J. U. Campbell of Oregon City.

WELTER KING BEATS DOLAN IN 3 ROUNDS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—Young Jack Thompson, welterweight champion of the world, showed his mettle here last night by knocking out Jimmy Dolan, rugged Portland Mexican welter, in the third round of a scheduled ten-round non-title fight. Dolan weighed 149; Thompson 147.

The Oakland, Cal., negro found Dolan's chin early in the fight and dropped him for a count of nine in the first round.

Dolan came back hard in the second round, set a fast pace and maintained it throughout the round, but the champion easily dodged all the blows that would have done damage had they landed.

Thompson rapped Dolan for a nine count again in the third round. Dolan got up only to go down a minute later for a count of ten.

The negro used a looping right to the chin to score both knockdowns and the knockout. He was the master and the aggressor throughout the bout, ripping short rights and lefts to Dolan's head and body.
