### RETURNING MEDIC SCORES CONDITIONS AT LEPER COLONY

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11.—Dr. Robert Lindsey McArthur, Portland, who returned home today after residing his position as territorial government physician in the leper settlement at Kalaupapa at Molokai Island, charged that deplorable physical and moral conditions are permitted to exist while the territorial board of health has refused to consider a constructive program.

Dr. McArthur, who was graduated with the University of Oregon class of 1920 and from the medical school in 1926, said his letter of resignation, which contained the charges, caused the greatest sensation in Honolulu in recent years. The letter was dated to become effective yesterday.

The Oregon medic said that during his three-year term at the leper

er haven, he was continually rebuffed by the territorial board of health on every major project he undertook for the betterment of the colony.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—Mark Clifton, 23, was burned on the face and hands today when the gas he was using in an alleged attempt at suicide exploded. Clifton had carefully stuffed the cracks in his kitchenette, and opened the four burners of the gas stove. When the room filled with gas, the pilot light caused an explosion that stunned Clifton, damaged and broke the plaster in the kitchenette and an adjoining room. Apartment house residents were unable to assign any reason for the suicide attempt.

### POEM FOR THE DAY

#### THE MAINSPRINGS OF LIFE

The superiority from the point of view of genuineness of unattainable ideals as against those ideals considered attainable was emphasized by Professor Cassius Keyser of Columbia university in an address last week before the New York University Philosophical Society in the auditorium of the main building of the university in Washington Square. Professor Keyser warned against the "insidious and baleful influences of that school which discourages the pursuit of unattainable ideals."

Assuming that those ideals which can be realized are "spurious," although not necessarily unworthy, Professor Keyser declared that "genuine ideals are unattainable, because a genuine ideal is not a goal to be reached but a perfection to be pursued."

"It is the pursuit of unattainable ideals which has made possible the greatest progress of the human spirit in literature, in art, in philosophy, in jurisprudence, in all efforts of the human mind," Professor Keyser asserted.

Many persons who select a professional career, with the limited or attainable ideals requisite for such careers, "remember only what is subordinate and forget what is supreme," Professor Keyser said, citing the modern cult of efficiency as an example.

"All of us require a certain measure of technical efficiency for the daily battle of life," he explained, "but one who is inspired with the ideal of becoming a worthy representative of the potential dignity of man is called to something higher, to a kind of education that for 2,000 years has been designated as liberal or humanistic education, with the ideal that it implies."

These ideals, Professor Keyser said, are an intelligent understanding of the world and its historic mainstays, emancipation from bigotry, fanaticism and provincialism, magnanimity of mind and the highest possible development of the social instinct. The ideal of beauty without which man would perish from the surrounding ugliness also was included by Professor Keyser as among those to be pursued, although it may never be attained completely.—The New York Times, May 11, 1930.
