

MAULERS SET FOR SLUGFEST BEFORE THROG OF 75,000

Sharkey Betting Favorite at 9 to 5 Odds to Beat German in Titular Bout Tomorrow.

Schmeling's Main Chance to Win Rests on Gob's Known Pechant for "Temperament."

NEW YORK, June 11.—In the most interesting and most extravagantly ballyhooed fight since the late Tex Rickard pulled the strings of the heavyweight Punch and Judy show, Jack Sharkey will fight Max Schmeling tomorrow night, 15 rounds or less, at the Yankee stadium for the "heavyweight" championship of the world.

It is by all odds the most significant heavyweight bout since the retirement of Gene Tunney, but whether the winner will be recognized outside of Germany, Lithuania and the United States remains to be seen.

With any kind of an even break from old man weather, a crowd of 75,000 fans probably will pay in excess of \$700,000 to see the big show. This is a far cry from the figures attending the last of the outstanding Rickard extravaganzas on Chicago's lake front in 1927, but it exceeds anything on the books of the heavyweight business for the past three years. In addition the customers will have the happy opportunity to serve a double purpose in benefiting the children's milk fund, sponsored by Mrs. William Randolph Hearst, and in aiding the recovery of the indigent heavyweight division.

Posers for Wiscacres
Today, the two main questions up for debate among the railbirds are:

First, can Schmeling carry the fight heights that three previous foreign challengers, Firpo, Carpenter and Heeney, failed to reach? Second, can Sharkey overcome the temperamental jinx that has seemed to pursue him in international competition and fight at his best?

This fight is no exception, when it comes to the speculative "ifs" and "buts" or even the loose talk that everything is "in" and "all right" for one principal or the other. So far as that goes it is just the ballyhoo that has become a part of the game.

The claims for one corner that Schmeling will win if he crowds and harrasses Sharkey from the outset are countered by the cries that the Teuton will have his ears cuffed off if he mixes too willingly.

Sharkey Inconsistent
The belief that Sharkey is due for one of his good fights and, therefore, will emerge the winner is offset by his record of consistently putting up mediocre bouts against foreign rivals. It is this strange feature of Sharkey's career that seems to give Schmeling the best chance to capture heavyweight honors that any invader has had since Louis. Angel Firpo knocked Jack Dempsey out of the ring at the Polo grounds seven years ago.

Sharkey has fought his good fights almost exclusively against the domestic punch absorbers. His most impressive performances were scored against Harry Williams and George Godfrey, the so-called black menaces; Jim Malone and Tommy Loughran, representing the Irish-American contingent.

Bets Favor Sharkey
This information may be food for the hungry players, even though not consoling to the patriots, who will consider it a national calamity, scarcely less important than the Wall street crash, if the heavyweight title is lost to America. In spite of it, the form players have made Sharkey a 9 to 5 favorite in the betting and he probably will enter the ring at that figure.

The tale outside of the ring may be more impressive than that within for the ring-side seats will be occupied by dazzling rows of notables in evening frocks and stiff-shirred costumes. The ranks of the famous "600 millionaires" of Madison Square garden may be somewhat depleted since recent events in Wall street but they will all be there, anyway. The prices, \$25 to \$50, have, however, tended to fill the bookbooks of the faithful in all ranks.

THESES WRITTEN BY ROSEBURG SENIORS GAIN ATTENTION

These written by members of the civics class of the Roseburg senior high school this year have attracted much attention for the excellence of the work produced by the students. A thesis on some selected topic was required from each student and those who have examined the productions pronounced several of them equal to similar papers written by university students for their degrees.

This is the third year that term papers have been required, the first year having been given over to a history of Roseburg in which all members collaborated. Last year the subjects were chosen, and this year the students were privileged to write on any theme in which they might be interested. It was required, however, that the theme be of real interest, preferably a topic that might aid in determining the life career of the individual. The papers, it was provided, must contain not only material from books, but data secured from government agencies, public institutions, corporations and personal interviews. A minimum of 3,000 words was required. The papers had to be written in accordance with the American Historical Association system, using standard footnotes as provided by the association rules. It was also necessary that each paper contain a bibliography, divided into primary and secondary sources, giving names of books, authors and publishing companies of all books used, and list of references. A condensed but adequate outline was also required.

The class, as has been stated, selected subjects at random subject only to the approval of the instructor, Prof. Clyde Beard. Among the subjects presented were "Leoprosy in the United States and her Dependencies," "Future of Aviation," "Airports," "Development of Railroads in the United States," "The Value of Anti-Toxin and Vaccination in the Prevention of Communicable Diseases," "Prohibition," "Dress Designing," "Public Amusements of the United States and Oregon." In addition to these varied topics there were a number of papers on prime growing, dairying, turkey raising, forestry, occupations, and numerous other subjects. There were 80 papers written in all and material was secured from every state in the union and nearly all foreign countries. Practically every federal bureau furnished material and a majority of the leading professors of the state schools gave aid to the students.

One of the outstanding of these papers was written by Jack Gibbs on the subject of "Airports." This thesis is written in proper form and contains approximately 9,000 words. The ideas used in illustration and binding are very original and clever. In fact this paper is a very valuable piece of work and contains material that could not be found compiled in any one book that has been published today. It has been handsomely bound in leather, and is in reality a textbook on the subject.

Among others worthy of special mention is the paper on "Leoprosy," by Miss Audrey Wilson and "Anti-Toxin and Vaccination in the Prevention of Communicable Diseases," by Miss Coletta Langenberg.

Some of the outstanding papers have been placed on display at the public library, where they may be seen by requesting them from the librarian. They cannot be removed from the library, however.

TITULAR RING BOUT TO BE BROADCAST

NEW YORK, June 10.—The Sharkey-Schmeling heavyweight fight at the Yankee stadium Thursday night will be announced over the National Broadcasting company's combined networks through more than 30 stations including WJZ and WEAF. Graham McNamee will describe the action.

For foreign consumption and especially for the benefit of German listeners, the fight also will be broadcast in English and German over two short wave stations.

CAROL STILL SEEKS MARITAL REUNION

BUCHAREST, Rumania, June 10. King Carol II, seeking to unify the entire country after the dramatic events of the last few days, was busy working today on the formation of a new cabinet and trying for a reconciliation with Princess Helen.

The Associated Press was told on the best authority that efforts are in progress to bring about a reconciliation of more than a formal nature between Carol and Princess Helen, who divorced him two years ago.

It is felt it would be a difficult situation to have the king entertain the various diplomats while Princess Helen, who under different circumstances would be queen, remains out of the picture.

Flags were everywhere and there was an atmosphere of good will today. Crowds were still peeping through the rails of the royal palace which was guarded by three policemen and a sentinel of the guard in a tall bushy who paced before the palace portals.

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CARDINALS BREAK LOSING STREAK BY DOWNING BRAVES

Brooklyn Lead Increased as Cubs Meet Defeat; Sox Beat Mackmen in 11 Innings.

A little thing like a rapidly descending elevator, which causes unpleasant sensations in many quarters, shouldn't bother the St. Louis Cardinals a bit from now on. The Cards went up to the top of the National league with about the greatest possible speed, winning 17 out of 18 games, and have been coming down from the heights with about as great rapidity.

The Cardinals came to a temporary stop in their losing yesterday after dropping five straight games, but it took them ten long innings

to gain a 2 to 1 decision over the Boston Braves and even that triumph left them with a record of only two victories in the last 12 games.

The Chicago Cubs, who appeared to be heading for the job of successors to the Cards as league leaders, suffered another setback yesterday after losing two out of three to Brooklyn. Much to their surprise, they ran into Phil Collins of Philadelphia and got only six hits, Philadelphia winning 6 to 2. The defeat left Chicago 3½ games behind the league leaders.

All the other National league games add the Washington-Cleveland contest in the American league were rained out.

Another champion club, the Philadelphia Athletics, played second division baseball as they dropped an eleven inning struggle to the Chicago White Sox by a 7 to 6 count. Bob Grove, who had won seven straight games, was charged with the defeat although he pitched less than two innings.

The Boston Red Sox and Detroit Tigers put on another exhibition of poor fielding and heavy hitting. Boston had the better of both for a 12 to 6 victory.

The New York Yankees got a fast start against the St. Louis Browns and scored all their runs in the first two innings to win, 5 to 3.

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
