The Taxpayers of School District No. 4 Ask of Directors Finlay and Shoemaker

AN EXPLANATION OF THE FOLLOWING Cold Blooded Facts

Although every fair minded person who has investigated the facts must admit that the action of the School Board in dismissing D. E. Oleman as principal of the Junior High School was one of the most arbitrary and unfair acts that could be done to a man, but unreasonable, privately spiteful and malicious as we believe such acts to have been, yet nevertheless in this recall election the Oleman question is not the main point in issue. Oleman has been dismissed and is out. He is not a factor in the Roseburg schools. But we do have in office, who are sought to be recalled, Directors of whom certain pointed questions should be asked, and we have candidates for office seeking to perpetuate the policies of the present School Board of whom like questions should be asked.

WHY IS IT?

that it costs so much more to educate a child in the Roseburg High School than it does in any of the other cities mentioned below?

The above figures are taken from the last four years reports of the Superintendent of Public Instruction of this State and are official, accurate, truthful and fair. Any person can verify the same with ease.

Directors Finlay and Shoemaker whom it is sought to recall, have been in office during all of the period above mentioned. Candidates Harris and Berg openly state that they will carry out the policy of the present School Board. These policies, as shown by the above figures, are highly extravagant. They give to the children of Roseburg a fair high school education at a cost of more than twice that what we find a similar education costing in the efficiently managed schools to the north of us. The Directors of the city of Portland give a very much superior education to the pupils of that city at an average cost of \$46.41 less per pupil than the cost in Roseburg.

If you wish to continue throwing your money away and perpetuating the extravagant policy which has been in force the last four years, then continue in office Directors Finlay and Shoemaker and elect Candidates Harris and Berg. If your money means something to you when you pay your taxes, or if you want your children educated like they are in Portland at a saving over the present cost, then vote for the recall and elect Candidates Flurry and Russell who are pledged to conservative, economical and fair administration. Compare Roseburg's present inefficiency with the efficiency at Eugene where a pupil is educated at \$90.68 per year less than at Roseburg; multiply that by the 460 pupils in the Roseburg high school and you will find that if you will recall the present management and elect men pledged to a plan of economy that we can give to our pupils education equal to that they are receiving and save our taxpayers \$41,712.80 each year. Or, you may give to the pupils of this city the far superior high school education given to Portland students, where the average cost at the present time is \$46.41 less per pupil per year than in Roseburg, and even after giving the children of this city that superior education the taxpayers of this district will be saving \$21,348.60 per year.

Take any city above; figure it out for yourself; draw your own conclusions.

The salaries paid to teachers in Roseburg as shown by the report of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, and as admitted by the present School Board, are less than paid elsewhere; the instruction given in any one of the above cities is equal to and in many cases superior to that given in Roseburg and yet the cost in Roseburg is greatly in excess of that in the cities mentioned. They are representative of the entire state. Even in smaller places such as Drain, Myrtle Creek, Oakland, Riddle and Sutherlin, with their few pupils, the cost is less than in Roseburg.

Taxpayers have a right to demand of Directors Finlay and Shoemaker an explanation of the above high cost and they have the right to ask that explanation not later than Friday in order that a reply may be made hereto. If there is no answer to this by them, there is no explanation. If they answer on Saturday when there can be no reply, has the taxpayer not a right to assume that a reply would show the fallacy of any answer made? Answer by Friday, Directors Finlay and Shoemaker, if you have any answer.

Candidate Ralph Russell has been a continuous taxpayer in this district for nineteen years; he has a family of four children; his interest is in the schools; he is a man of the people who will not refuse an audience to parents and taxpayers; he is honest, capable and qualified.

Candidate John E. Flurry has been a continuous resident and taxpayer since discharged from the army; he is a leader in fraternal and civic work. He was formerly himself a school teacher; he is a man who knows school needs and a business man—broad minded and fair.

They pledge themselves to fair treatment to teacher and to scholar; to parent and to taxpayer. They are men who will see that the pupils get a good education and that the taxpayer's dollar gives to Roseburg schools somewhere nearly the same service that a dollar gives in other places.
