SOLDIERS FOR PEACE

For the best 300 word paper in the high schools of the United States on "How May the Pact for the Renunciation of War Be Made Effective?" Ray Steubing, a student in the Jefferson high school, Portland, Ore., has won a trip to Europe this summer under auspices of the World Acquaintance Travel, Inc.

The contest was an optional part of an extensive program for the study and discussion of the peace pact, known as the National Student Forum on the Paris Pact. Judges were Dr. William John Cooper, United States commissioner of education; Arthur Capper, senator from Kansas; and Oldean A. Lyon, associate editor of the Washington Star.

More than 122,900 students enrolled in the forum for the school year 1929-30, representing more than 1500 high schools in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii, Philippine Islands, Porto Rico and the Canal Zone. The national committee in charge consisted of about 300 leading high school principals, superintendents and representatives of state departments of education, headed by Dr. P. P. Claxton, former United States commissioner of education. Several leading peace organizations cooperated.

Placing second in the essay contest was Lucille Palmer, John Marshall high school, Richmond, Va.; third, Max Baer, Central high school, South Bend, Ind.; fourth, a tie between Mow Lan Ho, of Iolani high school, Honolulu, T. H., and Clara Deerenberger, Garfield county high school, Jordan, Mont.—News story from Washington, D. C., May 12, 1930.
