'WILDCAT' FACING
NEW CHARGE; PIPER
IS ALSO INDICTED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—Robert Gordon Duncan, self styled "Oregon Wildcat" and unsuccessful candidate for republican congressman from this district, who yesterday was sentenced to 10 days in jail and \$75 fine for violation of the Oregon corrupt practices act, yesterday was indicted by the county grand jury for violation of the federal radio act.

The jury also indicted Edgar E. Piper, magazine writer, on a charge of assault and battery. Piper, son of the late Edgar B. Piper, editor of the Morning Oregonian, is alleged to have struck Duncan in the office of the United States marshal because of remarks Duncan made about Piper's father over radio station KVEP.

The indictment contained five specific counts. Duncan was arrested June 2 on a commissioner's warrant and was at liberty under \$2500 bail.

The indictment charged that Duncan, in his radio broadcasts, violated the section of the radio act which prohibits the use of obscene, indecent and profane language. Excerpts from speeches on May 9, 12, 24, 25 and 26 are contained in the indictment including alleged attacks on Franklin C. Kewell, congressional representative from this district.

B. F. Irvine, editor of the Portland Oregon Journal and other business men, against whom Duncan is alleged to have used slanderous language, were named in the indictment.

Duncan was accused of using the radio station on the day of the Oregon primary to broadcast speeches favoring himself as congressional candidate and accusing other candidates of various indiscreet acts. His attorney filed notice of appeal on the charge of electioneering.

Meanwhile, the federal radio commission has prepared to fight an injunction suit owners of KVEP brought against the commission in an attempt to restrain the commission from refusing to issue a new license to the station.

IDAHO BANK YIELDS
\$5,000 TO ROBBERS

BOISE, Idaho, June 12.—Two bandits entered the First National bank of Wendell, Idaho, yesterday and escaped with \$5,000 in cash, police here were advised.

The bandits, one about five feet nine inches tall and reported to police here as being "Dutch" Ball Simon, escaped in a small coupe without license plates but bearing a pink slip on the windshield indicating the license had been applied for.

The bandits entered the bank at 11 a. m. and after the robbery headed south along the highway.

Simon was described as about 35 years old, 5 feet 9 inches tall, and weighing 190 pounds. He had black hair and a gunshot wound and a scar on his face. The other man was described as "large" and of light complexion.

Wendell is located about 130 miles southeast of Boise in Gooding county.

PLANE CRASH KILLS
ONE; TWO INJURED

BILLINGS, Mont., June 12.—An airplane engine that faltered as the ship took off cost the life of one man yesterday and injured two others.

A. D. Minamyer, 36, Billings oil man, was thrown from the plane as it hurtled over the rimrocks at the edge of the flying field west of the city and killed when his head struck a rock. Major J. Carroll Cone, vice president of the American Eagle Aircraft corporation of Kansas City, the pilot, and O. E. Lee, Billings financier and airplane enthusiast, were carried down with the plane in its 80-foot drop and slightly injured. Cone was formerly state auditor of Arkansas.

He Leaves His Elevator
To Seek British Baronetcy

After Twelve Years Iowa Man Receives Word That He Inherits English Property.

WATERLOO, Iowa, June 12.—Dick Wolseley, for twelve years a humble elevator operator here, has just learned he has inherited an English baronetcy.

A few days ago the authorities here were amused when an English woman called on them and asked for Sir Reginald, Beatty Wolseley, Baronet of Wolseley.

They explained that though Waterloo is a thriving middle-western town, they could not boast a single blue-blooded British peer.

Then some one remembered that the last name of the Blackhawk building's elevator operator was Wolseley. They sent the woman, who said she was Mary Elizabeth Baker, of Brixham, England, to see him.

Miss Baker said: "Sir Reginald, I suppose."

Dick smiled. "Not that I know of, ma'am."

Then Miss Baker told him her story. She said his mother had died last November and in her last words had asked Miss Baker to find her son in America and bring

him back to England.

Miss Baker added that Dick's two older brothers had died, and that consequently he was heir to the famous title and estate.

"I guess I am Sir Reginald, after all," Dick murmured after she had concluded. The next day the new baronet felt so grateful to Miss Baker for informing him of his inheritance, that he proposed to her. She accepted at once and they were married the same day.

Sir Reginald and Lady Mary plan to leave Waterloo soon and return to England to claim his rightful due. The former, who is 33 years old, came here thirty-three years ago to seek his fortune.

For one reason or another, Wolseley never succeeded in his quest. Wandering from job to job, his correspondence with his relatives dwindled. In 1918, he went to work running the elevator here and has been doing it ever since.

According to the Dretts' illustrated baronetage, Reginald Beatty Wolseley is a collateral relative of Sir Capel Charles Wolseley, ninth baronet of Mount Wolseley. Because of his passing and the death of the Iowa elevator's two elder brothers, "Old" Dick became a baronet some time ago without

Goldberg said that his daughter and her husband, whom she married secretly, were arrested at night last week while they were sitting in an automobile near Reed college by two policemen. The junk dealer said the policemen forced his daughter and her husband to drive to his home where they demanded money to "hush" the case.

L. V. Jenkins, police chief, said what action would be followed in the latest charges had not been decided.

Police charged Ragan with accepting \$20 he brought to police court with which he expected to pay a fine for speeding.

HIGHER WAGES URGED FOR PORTLAND CAR WORKERS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—The board of arbitration which heard the wage dispute between the Portland electric power company and employees of the street railway system yesterday announced wage increases ranging from \$4 to \$8 a month would be awarded.

Platform men, the board announced, will receive increases ranging from \$5 to \$8 and shop and track men will receive \$4 monthly. The new scale is retroactive to March 6, 1930, and active until April 30, 1931.

The street railway employees sought a 10 per cent increase after the electric company raised the price of trolley rides from 8 to 10 cents.

CATTLE TICK EDICT
DEFI BRINGS LONG
TERMS IN GEORGIA

For conspiring and interfering violently with employees of the federal bureau of animal industry engaged in tick-eradication, Mann Carter and his son Will Carter, of Echols county, Georgia, must serve seven years in jail and pay fines in accordance with the sentence imposed more than a year ago by the United States court of the southern district of Georgia. The United States supreme court, to which the case had been appealed, has refused writs of certiorari. This puts an end to the last of the several widely known Echols county dipping cases, according to information received by the U. S. department of agriculture.

Mann Carter was sentenced to seven years' imprisonment and was fined \$11,000. His son, Will Carter, was sentenced to seven years' imprisonment and was fined \$1,000. These cases grew out of local opposition to the work of eradicating cattle ticks in Echols county, Georgia, which resulted in the destruction of dipping vats, in the burning of spraying pens, and in interference with bureau employees. These culminated February, 1923, in the killing of one bureau agent. Another was wounded seriously.

Notwithstanding the organized opposition to the dipping of cattle, tick eradication was completed in Echols and surrounding counties several years ago and as a result, general satisfaction has prevailed among cattle owners and others, the department of agriculture reports.

CANNED MUSIC HIT
BY WOMEN'S CLUBS

DENVER, June 10.—Music robots cannot possibly take the place of the trained and gifted musician, the delegate body of the biennial convention of the general federation of women's clubs decided today.

The organization adopted a resolution "unalterably" opposing the "elimination of 'living music' from our homes and our theaters," and ordered a copy of the resolution sent to the Music Defense league, New York.

A slight change was made in the resolution as originally read after delegates from rural regions and small towns discussed with those from urban centers whether mechanical musical instruments were an "ever growing menace." It was finally decided they were not and the first phrase of the resolution was made to read "whereas, the incentive to study music as a means of earning a livelihood is rapidly being destroyed by the increasing use of mechanical musical instruments," striking out the words "ever increasing menace" before "mechanical musical instruments."

The convention was expected to re-elect Mrs. Sinsel president in one-two order with only the usual scattering of negative votes. By custom, federation officers are re-elected once, giving them four year terms.

BRANCH BANKING GIVEN APPROVAL BY MITCHELL

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Extension of branch banking systems outside metropolitan districts was recommended yesterday by

Charles E. Mitchell, of the National City bank of New York, before the house banking committee.

Warning against "precipitate legislation" the New Yorker said there was nothing to be "feared" in the movement of branch banking or group banking as a substitute where branch banking is not permitted.

"Banking is not a business which can be monopolized," he added.

Mitchell said the suggestion for branch banking within trade areas, proposed by John W. Pole, comptroller of the currency is "at present too broad in its scope."

He said that at present he thought it should be extended to a somewhat larger field in the vicinity of our cities allowing the experience of this extension to be the guide in future legislation.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—President Hoover today signed the bill for federal licensing and supervision of dealers in perishable commodities.

He said he had long advocated the legislation and it had the support of dealers and agricultural groups.

BROOKHART BLOCKS
CONFIRMATION OF
HANFORD McNIDER

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The nomination of Hanford MacNider of Iowa, as minister to Canada, was reported to the senate "without recommendation" yesterday by the senate foreign relations committee after Senator Brookhart, republican, Iowa, objected to the nomination as "personally offensive" to him.

Such an objection by a senator from the state of a nominee usually goes a long way in the senate and just what will result from Brookhart's complaint against MacNider was problematical. Some senators believed it would at least block action this session.

Brookhart and MacNider are both republicans but bitter political foes. Each supported President Hoover in the 1928 campaign.

Senator Steck, democrat, Iowa, is expected to enroll in the MacNider cause.

The foreign relations committee took the position it would leave Brookhart's "personally offensive" objection up to the senate.

MacNider is a former assistant secretary of war and past commander of the American Legion.

Brookhart confined his remarks today to saying the nomination was "personally offensive."

"I will have plenty to say when the nomination is considered," he added.

"I think there are other objections."
