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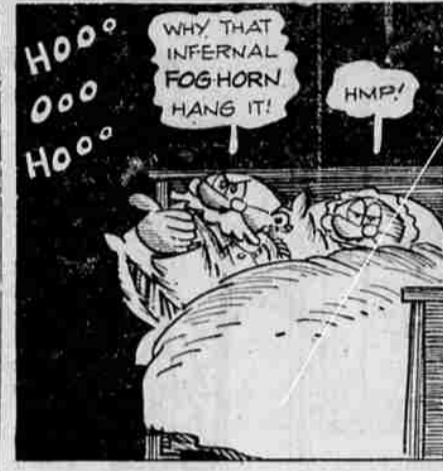

The universe in the opinion of Dr. Robert A. Millikan, physicist, is not running down like an eight-day clock, but is constantly renewing itself. Speaking before a natural science forum under auspices of the American Institute of the City of New York, the Museum of the Peabody Arts, and the New York Electrical Society, April 19, Dr. Millikan declared natural science at last had reason to believe the cosmic drama of formation still is being enacted in the stellar spaces. He thus takes issue with Sir James Jeans and other physicists who champion the theory that the universe is slowly disintegrating. Dr. Millikan in 1927 received the Nobel Prize for the isolation and measurements of the electron. A little more than a year ago he discovered the cosmic ray. He is a professor at the California Institute of Technology. He said he based his opinion on 10 outstanding discoveries, including the law of the equivalence of rest and work, the cosmic ray, radio activity and the Aston curve. "Somewhere in the universe," he said, "is still going on the process of upbuilding the heavy elements, such as gold and platinum, out of the lighter ones. We now know within very small limit of uncertainty that all elements were originally built up from hydrogen. With the discovery and identification of cosmic radiation we have indications that the same building process is still going on.—Associated Press story from New York, April 12, 1930. Weather Conditions The Canadian disturbance has increased in energy and is central this morning in Manitoba, with low pressure extending southwest to Mexico. Within the past 24 hours showers have occurred in the Puget Sound region, North Dakota, Minnesota and Michigan and heavy local rains in Florida, Tampa receiving 1.46 inches; elsewhere generally fair weather prevails with unseasonably cool weather in most western sections and temperatures above normal in the eastern half of the country.
