## ENDORSEMENT OF CUTOFF PLAN SENT TO AUTHORITIES

At the regular forum luncheon of the Roseburg chamber of commerce held Wednesday, unanimous endorsement was given the South Umpqua super road district project, now being advanced to secure completion of the Tiller Trail cut-off road. The secretary was ordered to prepare a resolution in keeping with the endorsement, and the resolution has been placed on the records as follows:

Recognizing the importance of highways in the development of our county and state and—

Resolved, that there is now a movement under way for the completion of one of the most important trunk highways in the state of Oregon; and—

Whereas a large amount of money has been expended on the highway known as the Tiller Trail cut-off, leading from the Pacific highway at Clatskanie, and running eastward to Crater and Diamond lakes; and—

Whereas only a few miles remain to be improved in Douglas county to make said highway one of the most scenic and attractive roads in the state, both for tourists, and for the produce of the Tiller valley in delivering their products to points in eastern Oregon; and—

Whereas the completion of this highway will lessen the distance to Crater and Diamond lakes from points north of Clatskanie by at least 51 miles;

Therefore, be it resolved by the Roseburg chamber of commerce, at its regular forum luncheon, that we heartily endorse the early completion of this important link in the highway system of the state of Oregon, and urge the state highway commission and the federal bureau of roads to cooperate with the county of Douglas and the proposed improvement district to the fullest extent possible, to the end that said road may be open for traffic at the earliest possible moment; and be it further—

Resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the state highway commission and to the federal bureau of roads.

### DOUGLAS COUNTY WELL REPRESENTED AT O. S. C. SCHOOL

Douglas county is very well represented at the summer school session being held at Corvallis this year. Many 4-H club members were given scholarships for efficient project work, these awards being made by schools, parent-teacher associations, civic clubs and individuals.

The annual 4-H club summer school is held at the state college each year, and the boys and girls have entire command of the campus during the two weeks school is in progress. A self-governing body composed of five members has command of all rules of discipline and campus and business activities.

According to a report received from Harrison Winston, of this county, one of the young men attending the school this year, accommodations have been provided for all the students present.

The boys room in the new dormitory for men with two boys assigned to each room. The girls have two different halls assigned to them, girls under 14 years of age being placed in Kidder hall, while those over 14 are located in Waidle hall.

The program starts at 6:30 each morning when the students are assembled for exercises. Breakfast is served to the boys in the Memorial building and to the girls in their respective halls at 7:15 a. m. Classes begin at 8:30 a. m. and conclude at 12 noon. From 1:30 to 2:30 p. m. there is a general assembly, where songs, yells and a general good time is enjoyed, after which there is an address by some prominent speaker. These assemblies are being broadcast over KOAC, and local residents are urged by Mr. Winston to listen in each day.

Another assembly is held in the evening, where motion pictures are provided. All students are required to be in bed by 9:30 p. m.

### HILLCREST RANCH OF 800 ACRES SOLD TO E. G. VOORHEIS

Sale of Hillcrest ranch on South Deer creek to Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Voorheis, recent arrivals from California, was reported today. The ranch, formerly owned by Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Paul, is considered one of the finest of its size in the county.

Hillcrest ranch consists of 800 acres of improved and well equipped land, located on South Deer creek, in a most attractive part of the valley. The residence is a beautiful 8-room California bungalow, wonderfully landscaped. Among the trees surrounding the home are some very rare varieties, including the Deador, imported directly from India; the Auracaria, brought from Chile; laurustinus, English holly, Colorado blue spruce, magnolia, and many roses and flowering shrubs.

Mr. and Mrs. Voorheis formerly resided in New Jersey and came to Oregon twice looking for a location. They were greatly attracted by the Umpqua valley, and after wintering in California came back to Roseburg a few weeks ago to seek a permanent home.

They were greatly attracted by Hillcrest ranch, and negotiations, which have been in progress for considerable time, were completed today through the E. G. Kingwell agency.

The ranch is well stocked with Hampshire sheep and Angora goats. The sheep were brought directly from England by Mr. Paul, who has taken much pride in building up this fine breed. The sheep proved well adapted to the feed and climatic conditions of the coast and have proven very fine mutton producers. Special attention has been given in securing registered sires during the past 10 years, and 5-months lambs weighing 80

pounds were marketed this year at top prices.

Mr. Paul has also given equal attention to the development of his flock of Angora goats, disposing promptly of all interior animals and purchasing registered, purebred sires at considerable expense to maintain heavy, good quality mohair. The average flock yield is 6 1/2 pounds per head, as compared with a general average for the county of 4 1/2 pounds.

E. G. Kingwell, who consummated this deal, has made several other recent ranch deals, and reports that there is a great deal of interest being shown in farm property, with several other sales in immediate prospect. Mr. Kingwell states that the sale of this property through his office during the past 60 days to more than \$150,000.
