

# Quick-Thinking Sea Captain Saves Lives and Property in Avoiding Accident

## LUMBER SCHOONER BROUGHT TO STOP IN SHORT SPACE

Fishing Craft Was Stalled Helplessly in Front of Heavily Loaded Ocean Vessel.

Captain F. A. Kristiansen Shows Ability in Meeting Emergency and Averts Heavy Damage.

REDSPOUT, June 14.—Quick thinking, coupled with able seamanship, undoubtedly saved the lives of two fishermen, besides averting thousands of dollars of damage to the Dan F. Hanlon lumber schooner, and great damage to the Southern Pacific company's drawbridge Wednesday, when Captain F. A. Kristiansen, in command of the lumber vessel, found his craft in danger of running down a crippled fishing boat in the open draw.

The schooner had just loaded at the Umpqua mill docks, and was being moved to the Winchester Bay mill to receive the remainder of her cargo, consigned to southern California. The schooner had whistled for the draw and was on the point of entering, when the captain discovered that a small boat had become unmanageable and was directly in the Hanlon's path in the open drawbridge.

Harry Reed and Sam Conrad, on the small boat, the "Trixie," were working madly to start their engine, while the Hanlon was bearing down upon them as they lay stalled directly in its path.

Seeing the predicament and the danger to the two fishermen and their craft, Captain Kristiansen met the emergency by dropping his port anchor within a short distance of the draw and putting his engine into full reverse, thus throwing the huge vessel broadside to the bridge and bringing her to a stop.

It seemed for several minutes that the forward motion of the heavy freighter would cause her to ram the bridge, which would have resulted in very great damage to both the craft and the railroad structure, which spans the river at Redspout, but ability on the part of the captain to think and act simultaneously averted the accident.

## MASS MEETING TO PLAN SUPER ROAD DISTRICT CALLED

South Umpqua Residents to Meet at Canyonville Wednesday Evening, June 18.

Maps Prepared and Will Be Submitted for Revision If Changes Found to Be Advisable.

DAYS CREEK, June 14.—Following the meeting of the Myrtle Creek chamber of commerce Wednesday evening at which the proposition to create a super-road district in southern Douglas to complete the Tiller-Trail road was enthusiastically received, the committee from the South Umpqua Road and Gun club, which is sponsoring the movement, announced that an open meeting will be held at Canyonville, Wednesday evening, June 18, for the purpose of discussing the boundaries of the proposed district.

The guiding committee, which consists of Archie Ferguson, R. A. Moore and F. J. Blattner, have prepared maps showing tentative boundaries and have interviewed many of the residents of the district affected. No decided opposition has been shown so far, according to Mr. Ferguson, but on the contrary nearly all of those interviewed expressed a hearty desire to see the super-road district formed, and the cut-off completed at an early date.

All taxpayers of southern Douglas are invited to be present to look over the proposed boundaries and to discuss the plans so far formulated.

RECONSTRUCTION CLUSTER LIGHTS WELL UNDER WAY

GLENDAL, June 14.—Final work of rebuilding the cluster light system along Pacific avenue was begun Tuesday with a crew of local men under the supervision of L. D. Hutchinson. The start on this job was made a number of weeks ago by the California-Oregon Power company at which time concrete bases for the lamp posts were made. The company was unable to complete the work then because of the non-arrival of special cable, needed for the job.

This cable was specially made at a factory at Wilkes-Barre, Penn., and was shipped by water by way of the Panama canal to Portland. It is one and one-eighth inches in diameter, lead covered for use under ground, and weighs 34 pounds.

Three lamp standards are being placed on each block along Pacific avenue. Each standard carries three large globes containing electric lights served with current by the underground cable.
