MANIX PETITIONS FOR REHEARING OF DISBARMENT CASE

SALEM, Ore., June 16.—Thomas Manix, who was permanently disbarred by the state supreme court from the practice of law in Oregon at the same time that similar punishment was meted out to George W. Joseph, republican nominee for governor, has filed with the court a petition for rehearing of his case.

In his petition, Manix recalls that Joseph, who brought the charges against him, accused him of passing worthless checks, and avers that the court refused to allow him the constitutional privilege of introducing evidence to prove the falsity of the charges.

Concerning his charges against Joseph, which resulted in the disbarment of the latter, Manix says:

"This defendant did not, as he could have done, bring to the attention of the supreme court the criminal misconduct of Joseph set forth in the indictment against him in Multnomah county in which he was charged with forging the name of one Aylesworth to a complaint in the justice court. Neither was reference made to another such matter on file."

Manix alleges that the supreme court erred in its refusal of the charge that he purposely misled the supreme court in the first case involving the E. Henry Wemmo endowment fund.

Manix charges that following the recommendation by the referees that Joseph be disbarred, and following Joseph's later nomination for governor, various articles were published to the effect that the nomination was a vindication for Joseph, the articles being, Manix declares, an effort to intimidate the court in deciding the case in Joseph's favor.

THE BOY SCOUT COMES HOME

With the simplicity that gives such an incident lasting lustre, Norman Vaughan's townsmen in Hamilton, Mass., gathered in the town hall last night, to say to him that they were glad to have him among them again after his two years spent driving dog sleds in the antarctic for Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd's expedition.

Hardly more than yesterday, it seemed, Vaughan, wrapped in furs against south polar gales and temperatures, one among plodding men working warily through well-nigh trackless mountains of ice toward Axel Heiberg's glacier and Queen Maud range with Byrd's valiant geological party. Now, conventional in the dress clothes of life in civilization, he stood on a platform where, until the moment, he almost certainly never envisaged himself. The fine engraving of the winds and weathers of an area, given few men to see, was plainly visible above his eyes. He had probably never before in his life made a speech, but now he was saying he was glad to be back, and that he had no words at all to say how glad he was, or how poignantly he was affected by the warmth and generosity of this welcome from people he had known all his life. * * *

And as he grew on to the end he said: "Before I went away, I bought a flag to carry with me on the trip. It is curious it was the only one in the geological party. I carried it with me to within 273 miles of the pole. And it gives me great pleasure now to give this flag to the town of Hamilton." And he drew from the pocket of his dress clothes the little fluttering bit of red, white and blue silk, and gave it to Mr. Lamson.

The boy said then, "I thank you," and sat down suddenly with a look of immense relief on his bronzed face. The people jumped up and clapped and cheered, making the ragged sounds people make who cheer not for form's sake but for the heart's sake.—Janet Mable in Christian Science Monitor May 2, 1929.

SACRAMENTO STILL LEADS COAST PACK AFTER TEN WEEKS

San Francisco Keeps in 2nd Place—Portland Back in Cellar When it Drops 2 Games.

Sacramento and Seattle were the winners in yesterday's eight games closing the tenth week of the first half Pacific Coast league baseball season. The Senators took two games from Oakland 3 to 1 and 5 to 4, maintaining a firm hold on first place, and the Indians, downing Portland twice, 3 to 0 and 7 to 4, climbed out of the cellar where they had been for a day.

Tony Frietas got revenge for Wednesday's defeat by trimming the Oaks in the morning contest at Stockton. Howard Craghead took further punishment at the hands of the league leaders in the afternoon at Sacramento, when he lost a see-saw affair due to a ninth inning rally which gave the Senators the tying and winning runs.

Seattle in 2nd Place
San Francisco ended the week in second place, clinching its series with Los Angeles by taking the second game yesterday, 1 to 5, after losing the opener, 4 to 6. The Seals started the scoring in the first of the initial game, with Elmer Jacobs on the mound, but were soon headed, Clyde Barfoot hurling consistently good ball throughout for the Angels. In the seventh inning, nightcap the Seals started their heavy hitting by driving Walsh out in the first, and collected a total of 16 hits, four homers, off Walsh, Yerkes and Craghead. Sheely connected for the circuit twice. Curt Davis was the winning pitcher.

Missions Win Odd Game
Home runs were plentiful as the Missions took the odd game of their series with Hollywood by winning the morning contest, 15 to 4, although they dropped the afternoon game, 8 to 13. The Reds backed Luber over the morning to ruin the hopes of Hollister and Wetzel, Hollywood hurlers, Boone getting two homers. In the afternoon, Heath, first baseman for the Stars, knocked three homers to make a total of four for the day, and Monroe clouted three for the Reds, Caster, on the mound for the Missions, knocked a four-bagger in the second inning, and the Stars retaliated by knocking him out of the box in the fourth. Johns was relieved by Yde in the seventh but a 3 credit for the win.

Seattle profited by the three-hit pitching of "Dutch" Ruesher in their first game with Portland, and the Ducks were shut out as Malla yielded three runs. Portland ended with a one game margin in the week's series, although they lost both yesterday's games. The Ducks rallied for four tallies in the last two periods of the seven inning game, but the Indians had already batted Casacarella for enough to win.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 16.—Following similar advances by New York and California, Portland sugar prices will go up Tuesday a hundred pounds. Cane sugar and beet sugar will be \$1.15, instead of \$1.05. The difference between beet and the others is invariably 10c.

The hop market continues active as a result of the reports of heavy yield in some yards. During the week 1929 crop sales were reported over a range of \$1.00 to \$1.25. New crop contracts at 125¢ to 130¢.

Due to light receipts and large shipments to California, the butter market tone was steady. The city demand was inactive.

Corn trading was quiet, with receipts liberal. The price was barely steady.
