ROAD IS CLOSED
FOR IMPROVEMENT

The road from Garden valley to Wilbur by way of the Lee Love place has been closed temporarily on account of construction work, and will probably remain closed for several weeks. The county, co-operating with the road district, which voted a special tax for the purpose, is widening the road over the hill by the Love ranch, eliminating a crooked and narrow grade and providing a wide and better road bed. The improvement will take in about a half mile of the road. It is planned to continue the work in future years until the entire road is in good condition.

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condemned the tariff bill, which caused Schall to drop his personal campaign to return to Washington where he joined the minority against it Friday when it was passed. Schall stands pledged to continue his support of the independent republican faction while Christianson in his address went further in his disregard for national party lines by pledging to "join forces outside the party in the interests of the state."

Schall, a newcomer in state politics, the third aspirant for the senatorial nomination, made his appeal entirely to those favoring repeal or modification of national prohibition. His opponents supported prohibition, but kept the issue in the background.

White Wins in Maine
PORTLAND, Me., June 17.—Congressman Wallace H. White Jr., representative in the national house for 13 years, today was the republican nominee for United States senator to succeed Arthur R. Gould.

Returns from 589 election precincts out of 632 in the state representing 475 cities and towns out of 518 give:

Republican senator: Brewster 39,235; Dewar 7,661; White 46,184.

Republican governor: Gardiner 57,927; Wilson 38,121.

For the second time in two years former Governor Brewster stood defeated for the nomination. Two years ago, while chief executive of the state, he contested with Senator Frederick Hale for the latter's seat and was defeated by 33,000 votes in a primary in which 128,000 republicans went to the polls.

Nomination on the republican ticket is tantamount to election in Maine and Congressman White undoubtedly will succeed Senator Gould of Tennessee later, who is resigning. Possibility that reappointment of the national house would see a discarding of the seat he occupied was a factor in White's candidacy.

Gardiner Endorsed

In the other statewide contest, Governor William Tudor Gardiner, who had attacked the chief executive as a "tool of the interests."

Gardiner polled 52,036 votes to Wilson's 34,721.

In the three-cornered republican contest for the office to be vacated by White, Donald Partridge apparently received the nomination.

Edward C. Moran Jr. and Frank H. Jinsell were unopposed respectively for the democratic party's gubernatorial and United States senatorial nominations.

New Jersey at Polls

NEWARK, N. J., June 17.—The political eyes of the nation were centered on the New Jersey primary today in which prohibition is the paramount issue and an ambassador, a former senator and a congressman are the candidates for the republican nomination for United States senator.

Managers for Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow, former Senator Joseph S. Frelinghuysen, and Representative Franklin W. Fort, the republican senatorial candidates, all predicted one of the largest votes in a New Jersey republican primary.

They estimated that from 500,000 to 650,000 ballots would be cast.

PROGRESS OF EGG COOPERATIVE TOLD

A most interesting talk on the growth of cooperative egg marketing in Oregon and the prospects for an egg packing plant in Roseburg was given before the Kwanan club at the regular luncheon meeting of the club today by James H. Clark, a director in the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers' association.

Mr. Clark outlined the growth of the organization from 1920 to the present time, showing the handicaps despite which remarkable success was achieved. The organization, he stated, did a business of \$2,400,000 last year, paying 33 cents per dozen to members for eggs, paying 12 cents per cent dividend on common stock, and distributing \$23,000 surplus money for eggs delivered in 1927. The association, he stated, has a reserve of \$101,483 on hand, together with \$299,000 worth of eggs on storage. He stated that there is every

WEMME ESTATE
DECISION FAVORS
THE CUSTODIAN

SALEM, Ore., June 17.—Because of their having sold stock of the E. Henry Wemme company in Multnomah county for what the court holds was little more than half its actual value, Edward W. Wicke, Dow V. Walker and August Wemme must pay \$67,545.80 as the termination of a suit brought against them by Howard Sutherland, alien property custodian. This was the decision of the supreme court today in affirming Judge Louis P. Hewitt of the lower court for Multnomah county. The opinion was written by Chief Justice Coshaw. Justice Bean dissented. Justices Rand and McBride did not participate.

The only alternative for August Wemme and Walker, by two other opinions handed down today, is imprisonment. Upon Wemme's failure to satisfy judgment execution was issued against him and he was imprisoned. He brought habeas corpus action against Sheriff Hurt of Multnomah county and was released. The opinion in this case today dissolves the writ of habeas corpus.

Walker brought suit against

Sutherland to enjoin him from having similar action taken in his case. Sutherland demurred, and Judge Hewitt sustained the demurrer and Walker appealed. The opinion today sustains the demurrer and dissolves the injunction. These two opinions also were written by Chief Justice Coshaw. Justices Brown and Rossmore concurring and Justice Bean dissenting. The Sutherland suit against Wicke, Walker and Wemme was one of the many cases growing out of the E. Henry Wemme endowment fund, out of which also grew the disbursement cases of George W. Joseph and Thomas Mannix.

OUTROW WISCONSIN

MADISON, Wis., June 17.—Washington's powerful varsity eight shot over the two-mile Lake Monona course here today in 10:34 to defeat Wisconsin's crew by more than two lengths. Wisconsin rowed the course in 10:25.

The Washington junior varsity crew defeated the Wisconsin junior boat by five lengths over the same course in 10:32, while the Badgers were clocked at 11 flat.

Can Receive U. S. Aid

The purpose of the regional organization will be to eliminate competition between groups in marketing, as far as possible, and to coordinate cooperative activities to the greatest possible extent. The association has the sanction and approval of the federal farm board and is in line for its financial and other benefits, which can be passed on to the various affiliated groups.

The papers are to be submitted to the 60 or more cooperatives within the ten states covered by the organization, and when approval is given, steps will be taken to complete the organization on a permanent basis.

Politics in Chaos
PORTLAND, Ore., June 17.—Accompanied by a military escort, the body of Senator George W. Joseph, republican nominee for governor of Oregon, arrived home last night. Senator Joseph died early yesterday morning while viewing a field demonstration by a unit of the Oregon national guard at Camp Clatsop.

Senator Joseph's death upset the political situation in Oregon; it leaves a vacancy at the head of the party ticket and it devolves upon the republican state central committee to select his successor.

The committee of 36 men may select a man from the unsuccessful candidates who opposed Joseph in the recent primary election or it may select a new man. If the committee so desires, it can arrange a republican state convention to name a candidate.

Kay in the Field
So far only one person has been named as a possible successor to the republican nomination. He is Thomas H. Kay, state treasurer. Kay has refused to make any comment on what his decision will be.

Senator Joseph's death came so suddenly that even those who were with him were unaware of its approach until he slumped to the ground. He had taken breakfast with Major-General George A. White, commander of the Oregon national guard, and his staff. After breakfast he rode to the drill area and dismounted. A few moments later he was dead.

Funeral arrangements have been held in abeyance pending word from Joseph's sister, Mrs. John Garner, Glendale, Cal. The date has been set tentatively for Thursday.

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GANG WAR VICTIM
TAKEN FROM CANAL

CHICAGO, June 17.—The headless body of a man with hands and feet missing, was dragged from the sanitary district canal at Lockport, southwest of Chicago, yesterday.

Apparently the victim of a gang ride, police said the man might have been one of a number of gangsters who have disappeared in recent months. Coroner's officials said the body had been weighted down in the canal for at least six months.

The body of Eugene (Red) McLaughlin, a notorious gunman and gangster, was found in the canal two weeks ago. At that time, it was decided to drag the canal from Chicago to the spillway at Lockport in the belief that other gangland mysteries might be solved.
