Editorials

on the Day's News

MANY things might be said about the sudden death of the Republican nominee for governor of Oregon. But here is the thing that is clearly true:

Up to the morning of Monday, June 16, 1930, the case of George W. Joseph was on trial before the people of Oregon. There has been a change of venue, and he has gone before a higher court.

GEORGE W. JOSEPH had his faults, many of which were manifest even to his friends. He had his virtues, among which were personal honesty and the courage and resourcefulness of a born fighter.

These faults and these virtues will be impartially appraised by the Great Judge before whom George W. Joseph has been called. This Great Judge will give little heed to the charges arising against the defendant out of the heat and passion of a political campaign here in Oregon.

THE successor of George W. Joseph will be chosen by the Republican central committee of Oregon. This writer has an idea that the choice will be a good one.

The weight of responsibility will rest upon the shoulders of the members of this committee. They will feel that they are personally on trial before the people of Oregon, to be judged by what they do. They will seek to name the very best man they can find.

WHEREUPON we shall hear this:

"You see, now, how much better is the convention system, with its calm, deliberate, informed consideration of the merits of candidates, than the primary system, with its whoop and its hurrah, its appeals to prejudice and its hasty judgments."

GRANTED, as to this particular instance, wherein the few men who will do the nominating for the Republicans of Oregon will be impressed with the weight of their responsibility in an unexpected emergency.

Emergencies call forth the very best that is in us. Witness the selfless way in which human beings act in the face of disaster, such as flood and storm; forgetting petty considerations and seeking only

NEWS BREVITIES OF OREGON

OFFICIALS DENY CIVIL SERVICE LAW BREAKING

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—A. A. Bailey, county clerk, and C. S. Stowe, former chief deputy clerk, entered pleas of not guilty to charges of engaging in political activity in violation of the civil service law yesterday.

The two and Morris Perkell, former license clerk in the office, were indicted several months ago by the county grand jury after the inquisitorial body made an investigation of the alleged political activities.

"WILDCAT" DUNCAN GETS COURT DELAY ON CASE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—Robert Gordon Duncan, charged in a federal indictment with using profane and abusive language over a radio station here, obtained two weeks delay in his case in court today. He was granted until tomorrow to file a demurrer to the indictment, and until Friday to file a motion for change of venue.

Duncan, self-styled "Oregon wildcat and chain-store nemesis," was an unsuccessful candidate for republican nomination to congress. His indictment for violation of federal radio commission regulations followed a series of speeches he made over radio KVEP here, attacking chain stores and a number

of Portland men. The license of the radio station was revoked by the federal commission.

LA GRANDE CLAIMS 8,043 EXCLUSIVE OF ENVIRONS

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 18.—Local estimates, taken from official census figures for the territory adjacent to the narrow city limits of La Grande, indicate a population of approximately 9,600 in this community. The corporate limits include 8,043, but large populated areas extend beyond the city boundaries on several sides of the city.

Population figures show Perry, Ore., had 145 persons, compared with 272 in 1920; Summerville 112, as against 114 in 1920; Hot Lake precinct 314, compared to 313.

LAST DAY DEPOSITORS OF DEFUNCT BANK LOSE SUIT

SALEM, Ore., June 18.—A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks, was informed today that the circuit court at Astoria has dismissed the suit of 37 so-called "last day" depositors of the Astoria Savings bank, insolvent, in which they sought to be declared preferred claimants against the bank. Their deposits, totaling about \$8000, were placed with the bank on the last day before its doors were closed.

Halt Prevented on Vets' Home Bill

EMERGENCY STATUS GIVEN TO MEASURE

Committee of Senate, at McNary's Urge, to Hold Hearing on Matter Next Friday.

City Withdraws Insistence of Being Designated as Site Now to Speed Proceedings.

The senate military affairs committee has decided to treat the soldiers' home bill, recently passed by the house, as an emergency measure, and will hold a hearing Friday, according to word received here today from Senator Charles L. McNary. The committee recently concluded consideration of new measures for the present session, and announced that no new legislation would be taken up by the committee.

Senator McNary, however, laid the matter of the emergency of the soldiers' home before Senator Reed of Pennsylvania, chairman of the committee, and in view of the need existing for a soldiers home in the Pacific northwest territory, he agreed to secure action of the committee on the measure passed by the house.

Senator McNary had a bill before the committee designating Roseburg as the site for the home, while the measure passed by the house does not specify Roseburg, but merely provides for a location in the Pacific northwest.

Roseburg Waives Point

Roseburg notified Senator McNary that this city is willing to take its chances in securing the site, and deemed it better to secure approval of the house bill than to wait until the short session in December in an effort to secure passage of the measure definitely.

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EDITOR ONLY SIX YEARS WINS PRIZE

MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 18.—A Mississinipi weekly newspaper, whose publisher entered Journalism only six years ago, was awarded today the trophy for greatest community service, the highest honor bestowed by the National Editorial association.

The McComb Enterprise, edited by J. O. Emmerich, a former farm demonstrator, was credited with having "not only the outstanding record for the last year, but probably would stand first among all weekly newspapers which have competed for this honor in former years."

Stocks Tumble Near Marks of Autumn Panic

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

NEW YORK, June 18.—The stock market passed through another selling climax today which depressed several pivotal shares to within striking distance of the minimum levels of the autumn selling panic. Total aggregated 6,400,000 shares, exceeded this year only by the 8,000,000 share day of May 5.

Selling was in enormous volume during the early hours of trading, when it appeared that the day would record sales in excess of 8,000,000 shares, but the storm center appeared to have passed by early afternoon, trading slackened substantially, and important shares regained about half of their losses.

U. S. steel tumbled to \$155, within \$5 of its low of the November; American Telephone touched \$201.25, within \$4.25 of the autumn minimum. General Motors, at \$39.52, was within about \$6 of the autumn bottom. Extreme losses in important shares ranged from \$5 to \$10, while several of the high priced issues recorded wide breaks, allied chemical getting down \$29.

G. O. P. SELECTION TO OCCUR IN JULY

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—Phil Metchan, chairman of the retiring state republican committee, said today that the state committee will not be called to pick a republican gubernatorial candidate for the November elections until the middle or latter part of July. Upon this committee devolves the task of selecting a successor to Senator George W. Joseph nominee, who died suddenly at Camp Clatsop Monday.

Meanwhile Metchan said that new members elected to the state central committee were being urged to come to the convention with an open mind and unpledged to anyone.

Of the 36 committeemen from each county, 25 have been elected. Eleven counties have not organized but all had meetings scheduled this week.

Two Questions Raised

In the interim technical questions are being raised regarding the power of the old or new committee to select the successor to Joseph. Metchan has asked the state attorney general to rule on the question and the attorney general said a decision would be forthcoming within the next few days.

A second technical question, Metchan said, which is being raised is whether county committees which did not organize within 20 days of the primaries could be legally organized after that time. A dozen or more counties would be affected by the ruling that the committees must be organized within the 20-day limit. It would then be necessary for Metchan to name a temporary chairman in the dilatory counties.

INSULT UNABLE TO GAG AMBASSADOR

BERLIN, June 18.—Frederick M. Sackett, American ambassador, this afternoon delivered before the world power conference an unexpected version of his speech on power costs which had been reported eliminated at the behest of Samuel Insull, Chicago corporation magnate.

Ambassador Sackett previously had caused his address to be published in the morning newspapers of Berlin when Mr. Insull had objected to portions of the advance text as controversial. Mr. Sackett last night announced the address would be given in full without alteration and this afternoon carried out his intention to the letter.

The delegates apparently appreciated Mr. Sackett's viewpoint as they applauded when the ambassador spoke the line around which the storm had been reported to have centered, "I know of no other manufacturing industry where the sale price of the product to the great mass of consumers is fifteen times the actual cost of production."

TINKHAM'S CHARGE IRKS CHURCHMAN

Bishop Cannon Challenges Lawmaker to Repeat Speech in Way to Permit Suit.

Refusal of Al Smith's Foe to Account for \$48,300 Campaign Donation Causes Wrangle.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Representative Tinkham, of Massachusetts, was challenged by Bishop Cannon to repeat his charges against the dry leader in a way which would make him subject to prosecution for libel.

Speaking in the house, Tinkham late yesterday said the southern churchman "will stand convicted in the eyes of all honest men of having appropriated" to his own use money given to him to prosecute the anti-Smith campaign of two years ago.

This assertion was made after he had reviewed Cannon's refusal to tell the senate lobby committee of the disbursement of \$48,300 given him by E. C. Jameson of New York, to promote the Hoover campaign in the south.

Calls Tinkham Coward

Passing through Louisville, Kentucky, last night, Cannon read of Tinkham's statement in the newspapers and immediately dispatched the following telegram to Washington:

"When congressman Tinkham shall give to the press over his personal signature the statements reported by the press as made by him today on the floor of the house of representatives where he is immune from prosecution for libelous statements, he may command the respect of honorable men, but making such statements on the floor of the house, where he knows his immunity from prosecution, brands him as a blustering cowardly congressman, appealing especially to his wet Roman Catholic Boston voters to retain him in office."

Violation Charged

Before the lobby committee Jameson testified he gave Cannon \$85,300. Of this amount the bishop reported expenditure of \$17,000.

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PLANES TAKE FOOD TO STORM VICTIMS

EDMONTON, Alta., June 18.—Isolated by torrential rains, which have played havoc with highways and railway lines in northern Alberta, a motorcade of 120 persons, seeking new homes in the Peace river country, are facing starvation.

The settlers, stranded at the town of Smith, reported their plight by telegraph yesterday and an airplane loaded with bread and meat was immediately started on its way northward.

When between Athabaska and Smith, on the northern rim of Alberta, the settlers were overtaken by a succession of storms which transformed roads into quagmires, disrupted communications and washed out the two principal bridges of the district. They struggled through to Smith, where washed out bridges blocked further progress. It will be at least ten days before they can proceed.

TOURIST LEAVES \$20 ON TRAFFIC CHARGE

Henry Wolfe, an Illinois automobile tourist, was brought back from Eugene by Deputy Sheriff Dietrich yesterday following his arrest on a charge of reckless driving. Wolfe, it is charged, struck a team of horses and wagon being driven along the highway north of Roseburg Monday causing the team to run away and injure one of the horses. He was released from custody upon the deposit of \$20 bail money, and failed to appear at the time set for the hearing of his case, the bail being declared forfeited. The owner of the team had prepared to file a damage action, but Wolfe's departure prevented service of the papers.

Clara Bow Pays \$30,000 for Her Latest "Crush"

DALLAS, Texas, June 18.—Clara Bow, "It" girl of the movies, is going to leave Monday or Tuesday, so she says, after giving Dallas the first real thrill of the hot weather season.

She appeared mysteriously Monday, under an assumed name which did not conceal her identity successfully. She said her studio managers thought she was in Hawaii. "Just loafing," was her explanation.

Tuesday, interviewed by a reporter from the Dallas Times Herald, she told a new story about dates with a young business man of Dallas which led to a threatened alienation suits and payment of \$30,000. According to this story, which could not be confirmed from California records, she came to Dallas to explain some things to the young man.

Studio officials in Hollywood discounted the story. They said Clara was given to talking extravagantly. They told the Associated Press they knew nothing of any demand for money.

Today Miss Bow, who has been entertained by automobile rides and dances and apparently avoiding further interviews, was found again by a reporter. This time she said that, instead of remaining two weeks as she had intended, she would leave Monday or Tuesday. "Too much hot weather and too much noise," was her explanation.

The cinema star was accompanied in Dallas by her secretary, who was using the same assumed name.

BROCK AND SCHLEE END RECORD FLIGHT

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., June 18.—William S. Brock and Edward F. Schlee, transcontinental fliers, arrived over the Jacksonville municipal airport and headed at once for Jacksonville beach, the finish of their round trip flight to San Diego, Calif.

The aviators appeared at the airport sixteen hours and 44 minutes after they took off from San Diego, Calif., last night.

In landing at the airport, which is about 20 miles from the beach, the fliers overshot the runway and went into a fence. The plane was tilted on its side, one wheel was broken, but the men were unhurt.

The plane shot across the finish line at Jacksonville beach at 1:01:45, according to the official timer. This gave Brock and Schlee a total elapsed time from San Diego of 16 hours and 50 minutes.

SAN DIEGO, Calif., June 18.—News of the progress made in their dash back to Jacksonville, Fla., by William S. Brock and Edward F. Schlee, who yesterday flew from the Florida city to San Diego in record smashing time and who, after the brief stay here, sped back toward the Atlantic, were eagerly awaited here early today by aviation authorities and enthusiasts.

Brock and Schlee averaged 152 miles an hour in rushing across the 2100-mile course to the Pacific.

They crossed the nation in 12 hours, 55 minutes and 30 seconds.

HONEY CREEK CAMP FIXED FOR SERVICE

More than a score of the members of the Glue Grange went to the grange campsite near Honey creek, on the North Umpqua, yesterday and put the camp in shape for use. The several Roseburg civic clubs and the Glue Grange have each taken over the task of preparing and equipping suitable public camps on the North Umpqua for the free use of tourists, and the grange is endeavoring to establish a first class camp. The site, which covers about 20 acres, was cleaned of rubbish and undergrowth, high spots were leveled, roads were constructed, and various other improvements made.

NEW YORK SET FOR GREETING TO EXPLORERS

Byrd and Party, Returning From Antarctic, Will Get Big Welcome From City.

Military and Civil Pageant to Be Followed by Trip to Washington for U. S. Honors.

NEW YORK, June 18.—Returning home after sixteen months of exploration in the Antarctic, Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd and the members of his expedition will be received as conquering heroes by the city of New York tomorrow.

Expectations were that the city's welcome would surpass all receptions here since that accorded a substitute, Dwight W. Morrow, ambassador to Mexico and father-in-law of Charles A. Lindbergh, America's aviation king; was nominated for United States senator by New Jersey republicans at their primary yesterday. Morrow, 57 years of age, was formerly the legal brains of J. P. Morgan and Company, Wall street banking firm. He is a native of West Virginia and was graduated from Amherst college with Calvin Coolidge.

First greetings to the returning explorers, however, will be extended from a big navy amphibian plane carrying former Governor Harry E. Byrd, of Virginia, brother of the commander, and officials of that state. It was planned to circle over the two Byrd ships, the city of New York and the Eleanor Bolling, as they approached quarantine and return in time to take part in the city's welcome.

Family is Waiting

Admiral Byrd's wife, children and mother were expected to go down to quarantine on the municipal tug Macon with members of the city's official welcome committee which will be headed by Governor A. Whalen. Among the many distinguished visitors here to honor the return of Admiral Byrd is Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt.

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LIGHTNING AND FIRE KILL 9 IN CHURCH

BUCHAREST, Rumania, June 18.—A dispatch from Transylvania today said that three persons were killed and six fatally injured when lightning struck the tolling church bells of a church sheltering a crowd in a terrific storm at Schorach.

Three peasants, frightened by the storm, climbed the church belfry and swung the bells with their hands in signal to the remainder of the crowd to kneel and pray. Just as they knelt lightning struck the belfry and the three were killed.

The church caught fire and six died later of burns received. A larger number of others were burned badly, the peasants remaining rooted to the spot.

King Sees Tragedy

ASCOOT, Eng., June 18.—Panic swept through the throngs of fashionable persons at the Royal Ascot race meeting today when a terrific electrical storm broke over the enclosures and a bolt of lightning struck and killed Walter Holbein, well known bookmaker, only a few yards away from the king and queen and their royal guests.

EBERHART AGAIN TO TEACH SWIMMING

Jean Eberhart, who successfully conducted the classes in swimming life-saving held last summer under the auspices of the Douglas county chapter of the American Red Cross, has again been selected as instructor, according to a statement made today by Dr. H. C. Church, chairman of the Red Cross life-saving committee. The campaign this year is scheduled to be held from June 29 to July 4th.

Eberhart is a student at the University of Oregon, majoring in physical education. He is a qualified Red Cross life saving examiner and a member of the University life saving corps. For the past two years he has been attached to the summer staff of the service. As a representative of this service, he will conduct several life-saving campaigns in Oregon this summer, in addition to the one in Roseburg.

VICTORY OVER U. S. MARINES CLAIMED

MEXICO CITY, June 18.—General Augustino Sandino's representative here issued a statement today saying the insurgent leader had returned to Nicaragua and had defeated the United States marines in two encounters.

The representative, Pedro Jose Zepeda, declared Sandino's men had captured a marine sergeant and an aviator and in addition had taken ten thousand rounds of ammunition and many guns.

Reports have been current all this year that General Sandino was on his way back to Nicaragua. The insurgent chieftain gave the marines much trouble in Nicaragua in 1928 and the early part of 1929, but eventually luck went against him and he sought asylum in Mexico.

Last July he took up residence in Merida, Yucatan, in the southern part of Mexico and there lived more or less quietly until rumors started in January that he intended to return to Nicaragua. In February he left Mexico with his staff and until now his whereabouts had been a matter for speculation.

After Sandino had left Nicaragua the troubles of the marines and the Nicaraguan national guard were not ended. They continued to clash with small groups of bandits and have had numerous engagements in the last few months.

TACOMA BUILDING HIT BY 3RD FIRE

TACOMA, June 18.—Fire starting from a short circuit in a motor truck swept through the lower floors of a five-story building here late yesterday doing \$50,000 damage.

Ten thousand spring chickens belonging to the Tacoma Poultry and Egg company were smothered to death, but one escaping. This fier, with singed legs, flew through a window to the street, where it was picked up by boys. Nearly half of the fire loss was caused by damage to stock of the Fisher company stored in the building. The fire was the third suffered by the structure in three years.

TARIFF BOARD TO BEGIN COST QUIZ

WASHINGTON, June 18.—The senate today adopted a resolution by Senator Borah of Idaho directing the tariff commission to make its first production cost investigations under the flexible clause of the new tariff act.

LEADS BOTH COMPETITORS OVER 200,000

Republican Candidate for Senator Advocates Dry Law Repeal and State Option.

Anti-Saloon League Will Continue Battle With Their Nominee in Fall Election.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

NEWARK, N. J., June 18.—Outdistancing his nearest opponent by 200,000 or more votes, Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow is the republican nominee for United States senator, double victor in a primary election in which he stood for repeal of the eighteenth amendment and state control of liquor. In the principal contest, for this long term, Morrow was nominated in a four cornered fight in which he won a majority of the total vote carrying all 21 counties.

Representative Franklin W. Fort, who ran as a dry with the backing of the state anti-saloon league, was second. Former Senator Joseph S. Frelinghuysen, advocate of modification of the liquor laws and federal control of liquor traffic, ran third. John A. Kelly, who sought the nomination as "the original wet republican," was a poor fourth. Kelly was Morrow's only opponent for the short term.

Democrats Name Wet

Morrow will be opposed for election next fall by Alexander Simpson, wet democrat, who was nominated for the six-year term without opposition and for the unexpected term of former Senator Walter E. Edge by Miss Thelma Parkins, the only democratic candidate for that term.

Fort and Frelinghuysen conceded Morrow's nomination a few hours after the polls closed and early returns indicated an emphatic victory for the ambassador. They sent telegrams congratulating him on his victory and pledging their support in the fall election. The returns indicated that Morrow had carried many of the 4,5 rural districts from which Fort was expecting his chief strength.

Dry Not to Quit

Ambassador Morrow sat quietly in his Englewood home reading Herodotus while the votes indicating his victory were being counted. He refused to comment, saying he would wait until the complete vote was tabulated.

"However," he said smilingly, "it seems to have carried my own ward."

He expressed great pride in the vote given him by his neighbors in Englewood.

Despite the overwhelming defeat of Fort, Dr. James K. Shilbills, superintendent of the anti-saloon league said, "The anti-saloon league is still in the fight and we are here to stay. We thought he would make a better showing than that."

Referendum Favored

Morrow opened his campaign May 15 with an address in which he declared that if elected he would be prepared to vote for a resolution submitting to the states a constitutional amendment which would restore to the states the power to determine
