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CHINESE REBELS DESTROY AIR CRAFT AT NATIONAL BASE

PEIPING, China, June 17.—Claims of the northern coalition that General Feng Yu Hsiang's cavalry for a second time had destroyed the Nanking air base on the Lungshai railway front were confirmed today by foreign reports reaching here.
Eleven airplanes, some of them just shipped up from Shanghai, were destroyed, seven being set ablaze and the rest hacked to bits with swords.

NANKING, June 17.—The nationalist government ministry of communications today ordered the telegraph administration of Kiangsi province to evacuate 17 telegraph stations in the southern half of the province because communists had raided the offices, destroying equipment and mistreating operators. The raids virtually ended telegraphic communication in Kiangsi.
