STRAWBERRIES CAN BE SERVED IN NOVEL WAYS

Luscious Berries Give Hostess Chance to Surprise Guests

When strawberries are plump and large it is a pleasant variation to put several on a plate unstemmed, garnished if possible with their glossy leaves. Include a little mound of granulated sugar on the plate, and then eat the berries after taking them by the stem and dipping them in the sugar. The experience is quite as pleasant as plucking and eating the berry from the vine.

Another inviting way is to pour three or four spoonfuls of sweetened orange juice over each individual serving of stemmed berries.

The value of sugar in improving the flavor of early summer fruits should be kept in mind. Many of these fruits have a tartness that will be pleasantly modified by sugar. And if berries, peaches and early apples are stewed, sugar is essential for real enjoyment.

Of course, it is exceedingly profitable to take advantage of opportunities that occur and "put up" a supply of jellies, jams and preserves. These foods help make balanced meals more appetizing. A bit of sweet makes the meal complete. The Sugar Institute.

HARVEY W. WILEY, CRUSADER FOR PURE FOOD

Writing at 85 the concluding chapter of his autobiography, Dr. Wiley says: "When I retire it shall not be in idleness, but to study and contemplation. I hope to cultivate the higher philosophy which teaches man that life and death are the two extreme links of a harmonious whole." And he heads that last chapter, "I Still Enjoy My Work." Dr. Wiley has ever been a crusader, and the crusading fire still burns in his breast, though he realizes realistically that he must leave it as "a legacy to all right-minded people" to re-establish the work of his hands in the days to come. For, as he had so vividly shown in his earlier book, "The History of a Crime Against the Food Law," he points out that the law he labored so long to perfect is in danger of being overthrown or nullified. "The method of control of the law and its purpose," he says, "have both entirely changed and the law may easily become a protection for misbranding and adulteration, and a cloak for the misbranders and adulterators."

The story of the pure food battle that he waged unpretentiously throughout the twenty-nine years of his agency of that office in Washington bulks large in these pages. Dr. Wiley tells that story dramatically, vividly, vigorously, but always with good humor. And it is a story of lively interest as well as great importance to the health of the people of the United States—G. W. Harris in a review of Dr. Harvey W.
