

## Most Men Have Weak Arches

A recent foot-health survey disclosed the fact that 69% of men have weak or broken arches. Much of this trouble has been caused by wearing shoes that did not give a firm and scientific support to the arches.

Located at the mouth of the Umpqua river, on the shores of the beautiful curving bay, Winchester Bay boasts of an ideal climate, where roses bloom the year round, and where summer sports of all kinds may be enjoyed.

The town now has two modern grocery stores, four service stations, a thrifty confectionery store, tea room, modern auto camp and numerous other services and conveniences.

Much of the undeveloped land is being taken over by newcomers to be transformed into cranberry fields and truck farms.

The Winchester Bay region affords unequalled facilities for big game hunting, fishing and other outdoor sports.

Some fine catches of trout are being made in the bay and the nearby freshwater streams. A few salmon are being caught, and next month the run of silverides will be on. Boats are being made ready and trolling equipment is being put in shape to meet the influx of fishermen expected when the salmon season starts.

## STAR ROUTE MAIL CONTRACTS ARE LET

GLENDALE, June 18.—New contracts for the carrying of mail over the two star routes served from the Glendale postoffice, effective

July 1, have been awarded the present contractors, William G. Bernstein and Bud Belcher. With the beginning of the term of his new contract, Bernstein begins his sixth 4-year appointment. He has carried the mail over the 4 1/2 miles to Fernvale daily, except Sundays, for nearly 2 years. He leaves Fernvale at 8 a. m., arrives at Glendale 9:30, leaves Glendale an hour later and arrives back at Fernvale at noon. He receives \$675 per annum.

According to L. L. Hurd, Glendale's postmaster, Bernstein has the only so-called star route in the state, and possibly in the U. S., that does not terminate with a

post office at both ends of the route.

Bud Belcher will begin his second 4-year term July 1. He makes a round trip daily excepting Sundays, of approximately 21 miles, delivering mail along the highway as far as the Azalea post office where he delivers and collects the Azalea and Anchor mail. He leaves Glendale 8:15 a. m., returning again at 12:45 p. m. His pay is \$339.50 per annum.
