

SLAYS PARALYZED
WIFE AND HIMSELF

ALHAMBRA, Cal., June 19.—After writing several notes, in one of which were instructions to cut off the water, gas and lights in his home, while in another he ascribed his act to his wife's illness, Arthur W. Peck, 68, retired building contractor, shot and killed his wife, Edna, 64, and ended his own life with the same weapon at his residence here yesterday.

In an envelope Peck left \$100 for a daughter, Mrs. Zayda Blake, Sioux City, Iowa, with the request that the daughter "put away" the couple "as cheaply as possible," and the information that Mrs. Peck had suffered a stroke of paralysis and Peck "could not see her suffer."

VENISON POSSESSOR
GETS FINE OF \$100

Roy L. Cole, of Canas valley, was arrested yesterday evening by deputy game wardens, Ed Walker and C. L. Malcolm, charged with possession of venison. The officers armed with a search warrant, raided Cole's home last night and reported the finding of a considerable quantity of deer meat. Cole entered a plea of guilty before Justice of the Peace C. F. Hopkins and was fined \$100. Not being able to pay the fine, he was committed to the county jail for 60 days.

citrus growing communities for several days.

"The smoke drifted westward over Los Angeles," Young said, "interfered with the movement of shipping in and out of Los Angeles harbor, and even caused complaints from coastwise ships at sea."

The weather bureau in 1917 undertook establishment of a fruit-front service, he said, with gratifying results to growers.

Accurate forecasting of weather conditions over a restricted area through observations taken from airplanes was described to the society by Lieutenant V. O. Clapp of the United States navy, Seattle.

From observation flights made almost daily since January 23, Lieut. Clapp said, his data shows that subsequent conditions for 12 or 24 hours in advance have verified the indications. On three occasions results were contrary to those expected within 12 hours.

Dr. Olof Larzell, of the University of Oregon medical school, yesterday reviewed research work conducted by Dr. Ira M. Davis, also of the Oregon medical school, and told the scientists that Dr. Davis had found forest fire smoke and cloudy weather to be beneficial.

An excess of ultra-violet rays destroys certain vitamins in foods, the report said, and causes such foods to be less rich in nutritive qualities. The protecting screen made by smoke or clouds, during the late summer months and during the winter, devitalizes the sunshine to some extent and the ultra-violet rays do not penetrate. In addition to this, Dr. Larzell said, the average outside temperature in the northwest is sufficiently low so that small doses of ultra-violet rays are possible at nearly all times of the year. These two factors have been proved to be associated with the low infant mortality of the northwestern states.

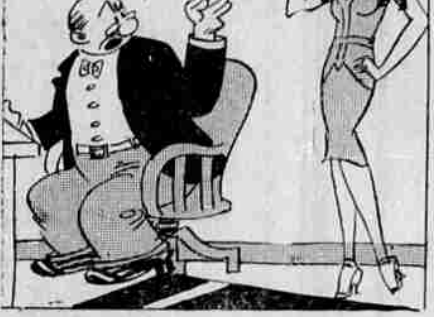

back room with McKinney where he told me it was going to be necessary for me to take out some 'government insurance.' He said his chief, Tom Reville, was running for governor and he needed campaign funds and it would be very beneficial to me if I would contribute at that time. He said that if Reville were elected governor he (McKinney) would be in a position to do me some good and that even if Reville shouldn't be elected he would stay in the district attorney's office and if I ever came to trial there would always be some way for him to keep me out of the penitentiary."

Phones Were Tapped
Olmsted said that he agreed to give McKinney \$3,000 and that this money subsequently was left with Fleming for delivery to McKinney. He said that McKinney later informed him he had received the amount.

Olmsted testified that he received from McKinney information as to the methods the government officials were pursuing. He declared prohibition agents had his phone tapped and that he had to be kept informed as to what they were doing so that he could be on the move. He said "McKinney also told of things going on in closed circles."

had only been surmised before. They found rock formations indicating great coal deposits, of commercial significance. They photographed miles on miles of ice covered terrain and definitely established the need in Antarctica of a permanent weather station.

The thing for which he was most thankful, he said, was that he had brought all his expedition all safely home.

"All my men have come back safe," he said feelingly, "for which we must thank providence."

Large Debt Faced
The admiral said he had no future plans and would not undertake further explorations until a \$100,000 debt remaining from his expedition is cleared away.

"There's not much left to explore is there?" he was asked.

"Oh, yes," he answered quickly. "There are thousands of miles of unexplored lands in South America and Antarctica and as long as there is land no one has seen, man will continue to seek it."

Mrs. Byrd, who was prevented by high seas from boarding the City of New York last night from a specially chartered tug, was not down the bay today to meet her distinguished husband.

Relatives said she had not returned from the futile trip out to Ambrose light until 3 a. m. this morning and had decided to postpone her greeting until later. She

was expected to join the admiral after the reception at city hall.

As the admiral's car turned into city hall park, surrounding office buildings were almost hidden by the storm of torn paper and ticker tape which floated down.

Dick Meets Jimmy

Admiral Byrd, escorted by Governor Whalen, climbed out of the car and ascended the steps to where Mayor Walker was waiting with outstretched hand.

"Hello, Dick," said the mayor.

"Hello, Jimmy," the admiral responded.

The mayor hailed the admiral as a great scientist and a still greater human being.

"Yours is a great scientific achievement," he said, "but your humanitarianism in the care of your men was even greater. You are one of the finest human beings alive in the world today. Welcome home forever."

"I stand here as a spokesman for 70,000 men," Admiral Byrd said in reply. "I wish to give you our sincere gratitude for this greeting."

Chancellor Elmer Ellsworth Brown of New York university then conferred on Admiral Byrd the honorary degree of doctor of engineering. When he addressed him as "Doctor Byrd" the crowd cheered.

A wild second inning saw the Angels drive Miljus out of the box and score four runs, only to have the Seals come back in their half to ruin Ballou and Peters and score nine.

The Indians got revenge for the shutout of the day before when they drove Flynn from the mound in the first inning at the capital city. Hubbell held the Seals to seven singles while Seattle was adding tallies off Gould and Hamilton.

Oakland errors and misjudged plays were largely responsible for their defeat by Portland, 7 to 5, which evened the series. They knocked Ortman out of the box in the eighth to tie the score but a wild throw to the plate in the ninth let in the winning run.

Hollywood made it two straight from the Missions when Rummel's home run in the eighth with one on gave them a 6 to 4 victory. The Reds had tied it at four all in the previous round, but Herman Pillette allowed the Stars one too many extra-base hits.
