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WOLF CREEK SITE GREATLY IMPROVED FOR SCOUT FROLIC

When the Boy Scouts report at Wolf creek camp on June 30 they will be treated to quite a pleasant surprise. The real pleasant part of the whole matter is that the work of preparing camp will all be done. The old kitchen has been torn down and a new building, 25x40 feet has been erected in its place. This new building will house the kitchen, the office and the dining hall. The kitchen and pantry are to be screened but because of lack of funds the dining section will be left open. It is for the same reason that the building will not be stained this year.

The baseball diamond will be in the center of camp and much larger than that of previous years. This has been made possible by the removal of the large stumps. Another treat is the cooking that the boys have been used to through other years. Mrs. Taylor has promised to come back, which means good food and plenty of it. With the new stove and the new kitchen she will be able to get out plenty of pies this year.

There are thirty-five scouts already signed up for the first camp and by the 25th, the time limit for registering for the first camp, the roster will be full. Every effort is being made to give the boys a good camp during each period. They desire a lot of fun and will get it. They will have every opportunity to advance in scoutcraft while in camp. Physical examination blanks have just been sent out. Each boy is to have an examination and his blank properly filled out returned before or on coming to camp. If he neglects this, he will not be allowed to swim or hike until an examination has been made and a report received from the parent. This is for the protection of every individual boy and is accepted as such by parents.

Many of the Coos Bay scouts will come to the second camp, which begins July 14. They are having a big yacht regatta during the first camp. It is expected to have a full quota of forty-eight at the second camp.

There will be a camp for boys under twelve some time during August, but it is not decided as to the exact date yet. The Umpqua hike camp has a limit of forty scouts. There are already twenty signed up for the trip which begins July 30. Sixty scouts have already signed and paid deposits for admittance to the summer camps.

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PUBLIC SUPPORT NEEDED IN FOREST FIRE PREVENTION

Flames Harm Timber in 6 Ways, Expert Declares to Science Group at Eugene.

Dependent Farm Regions Also Suffer; 60 Pct. of Every Tree Felled Said Wasted.

EUGENE, Ore., June 19.—Declaring that the whole-hearted public support in the prevention of forest fires has not yet been attained, in spite of their destructiveness to forest reserves, E. L. Kotok, director of the California forest experiment station, today urged that scientists of the nation lend their best efforts to the problem of forest fire control. He spoke at the annual meeting of the Pacific coast division of the American Association for Advancement of Science.

An "annual crop" of 158,000 forest fires in the United States explains, he said, why American foresters devote much of their time to the problems of fire control. There are six ways in which fires contrive each year to destroy the forest resources of the country, Dr. Kotok said. These are: By burning trees at the base so it cannot withstand the mechanical strain placed upon it; killing of the cambium layer; by burning part of the crown and reducing the vigor and rate of growth of the tree; by reducing vigor thereby increasing susceptibility to insect and fungi attack; by completely wiping out younger stands of trees in seedling and sapling stage; by reduction of the site quantity through removal of organic material and accelerating process of erosion.

Even the lightest fire, Kotok said, may produce some of these deleterious results. In intense fires, he said, complete destruction may be expected.

Another Peril Cited
But the destruction to timber alone and the effect of fires on future growth of timber is not the only problem, Dr. Kotok explained.

"In the western United States," he said, "where forests have a peculiarly significant bearing on water resources a single fire by the removal of the vegetable cover may produce disastrous results to dependent agricultural lands. Our experimental data show that by removing through fire the litter, humus and organic material in the forest, there will be an increase of immediate run off one hundred fold and eroded material one thousand fold.

"Where a forest becomes an important watershed," he concluded, "it is obvious that every fire is a threat to dependent agriculture."

Dr. Kotok summed up his paper with the conclusion: "Until the forester is able to secure reasonable fire exclusion the development and use of our western forests will be delayed for untold centuries."

Huge Timber Waste
Asserting that 60 per cent of every tree cut in the timber lands of the United States is wasted, Dr. Wilson Compton, secretary and manager of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association of Washington, D. C., today asked assembled scientists of the Pacific coast to lend their best efforts "to ward preservation of the west's greatest resource."

"Of the average tree cut for lumber manufacture, one-fourth, including defective trees, tops, limbs and stumps, is left in the woods unutilized," Dr. Compton said, "because there is no present use for it. Of the log brought to the sawmills, one-fourth, consisting largely of bark and saw kerf, is not utilized except for fuel. Another fourth, consisting of slabs, edgings and trimmings is usually converted, so far as is possible, into byproducts. The other 50 per cent of the log emerges in the form of rough lumber."

Losses in Manufacture
"Nor does the loss of material end there. When the finished lumber is used, the further fabricating losses in building usually range between 5 and 15 per cent; in lumber manufacture, between 10 and 15 per cent; in furniture making nearly 25 per cent."

"Of the total wood content of the average tree, therefore, as it stands in the woods, only 35 per cent in its finished form is finally used in ordinary building, and less than 30 per cent in the more exacting manufacture of finely fabricated wood products."

"Our age has been described often as the age of steel, the age of electricity, the age of concrete, the age of anything except wood," Dr. Compton said. "Unmindful of the fact that timber is our only reproducible natural resource, the impression has gained popularity that our forests are vanishing."

"Timber is the west's greatest resource," he continued. "The lumber and wood using industries are its greatest industrial asset." Of the annual drain upon the forests of the country, Compton said, less than 35 per cent goes into the manufacture of lumber. Nearly 40 per cent is used for fuel; only 4 per cent for wood chemical and pulp purposes. Ten per cent is destroyed by forest fires, tree diseases and forest insects.
