WILLIAM BROCK and Edward Schlee flew into an airplane at Jacksonville, Florida, in the early morning and fly across the country to San Diego before nightfall of the same day.

Remaining in San Diego just long enough to fill their fuel tanks, they head back for Jacksonville, arriving there shortly after noon the next day.

CORONADO, the Spaniard, more than three centuries ago, was the first white man, so far as anyone knows, to make the trip overland from Florida to California. It took him years, instead of hours.

What will people be doing in the way of travel three centuries hence?

THE airplane is still in the experimental stage. Every ship that is built is hopelessly out-of-date before it is completed, so rapid is the progress of improvement. So they have to be built slowly and expensively, largely by hand labor.

Someday that will cease, and airplanes will be built, as automobiles are built now, by automatic machinery and quantity production methods.

Then they will be very cheap, instead of very costly.

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NEWS BREVITIES OF OREGON

EASTERN TRIP MAY COST NORBLAD SOME SALARY

SALEM, Ore., June 20.—Attorney General Van Winkle may be asked to decide whether acting Governor Hamilton, Governor Norblad or both of them will receive the governor's salary during the time Norblad has been in the east with Hamilton serving in his place. Officials say it has not been customary to "dock" a governor while out of the state, although the question whether he is away on state business may have something to do with it.

FILIPINO LABOR INVASION THREAT STIRS PROTEST

SALEM, Ore., June 20.—Notwithstanding protest by the state labor department, the State Federation of Labor and the American Legion, it is understood a number of Filipinos will be brought into Oregon this summer to work on farms, particularly in the lower Columbia river district and in Coos county. This information has reached C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner.

GARDEN POISON CAUSES DEATH OF VALUABLE COWS

SHERIDAN, Ore., June 20.—County authorities today were investigating the death of five purebred dairy cattle owned by Peter Cue, a rancher of this district. Cue told authorities he found large quantities of a garden poison preparation scattered about the pasture.

The cattle died suddenly. Stomachs of the bovines have been sent to Oregon State college for examination.

Marsters Boomed For Governor

ROSEBURGER'S FRIENDS URGE NOMINATION

Long Career in Banking Farming, Politics Makes Him Well Qualified, Backers State.

Leading Advocate of Road Improvement, President State Fair Board, Ex-Senator.

A. C. Marsters, one of Roseburg's most prominent and active citizens, who has for many years been a political leader in the state of Oregon, is being mentioned as a probable candidate for governor of Oregon, and the Douglas county republican central committee will make an effort to secure his nomination in the place of the late George W. Joseph, whose recent death makes it necessary for the party to select a new nominee to carry the republican colors in the coming general election.

Mr. Marsters, through past experience and wide knowledge of state conditions, coupled with his active political work of previous years, is believed to be exceptionally fitted for the office, and if nominated will unquestionably have strong party endorsement throughout the entire state.

During fifty years of active life in this state, Mr. Marsters has been very prominent in all local and state development. He was one of the first advocates of the state

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EDDY THINKS HE'S CLOSE TO VICTORY

SALEM, Ore., June 20.—Senator B. L. Eddy of Roseburg, contender for the presidency of the 1931 state senate, while here today, declined to give figures relative to his pledged vote, but said he was certain he had more pledged support than his opponent, Senator Willard Marks of Albany.

"I believe I am nearer the required 16 than Marks is," said Eddy. "The situation seems very hopeful."

Eddy is attending a meeting of the interim committee investigating the possibility of better working conditions in the house and senate to avoid confusion during the legislative session.

NEWS BREVITIES OF OREGON

CASCADE RAPIDS POWER APPLICATION REFUSED

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Because army engineers said the proposed project would not develop the Columbia river's power possibilities, the federal power commission today denied an application by E. G. Hobson of Portland, Ore., for a preliminary permit to ascertain the feasibility of constructing a power plant on the Cascade rapids north of Portland.

Hobson proposed to develop 120,000 horsepower with the Cascade rapids plant, but the engineers reported it would not be a complete development and would "spoil" the site for other developments.

ATTEMPTED ROBBERY OF DALLAS THEATRE FAILS

DALLAS, Ore., June 20.—An attempted hold-up of the Majestic theatre here was foiled last night when two thugs who had covered Miss Ruth Helm, cashier, with a gun and commanded her to put the evening's receipts into a bag they passed to her, were frightened away by a passer-by on the street.

The pair fled at the sound of approaching footsteps. The robbery attempt occurred at about 9 p. m.

GRAND RONDE VALLEY HIT HARD BY STORM AND FIRE

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 20.—Severe electrical storms over the Grande Ronde valley today caused several thousand dollars worth of damage. Lightning struck the Eastern Oregon Light and Power company substation at Union, starting a fire which destroyed much equipment and gutted the building.

NOMINATION FOR GOVERNOR URGED

GRANGE PETITION FORGER ARRESTED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 20.—Robert E. Dennis, 31, a petition circulator, who had been employed by the Oregon State Grange to circulate initiative petitions for the "people's water and power utility district constitutional amendment" was in the county jail today, charged with violating the state election laws by writing a name other than his own on an initiative petition.

Dennis was arrested by county authorities yesterday as he stepped into the office of R. E. L. Julian, who had been employing him to circulate the petition.

Dennis' arrest followed discovery yesterday by James W. Gleason, chief register in the county clerk's office, of apparent forgeries and signatures on three "books" submitted by Dennis. On the petition Dennis had signed his name as R. E. Dennison and gave a different address.

The district attorney said Dennis made a complete confession following his arrest. The case will be presented to the grand jury, the district attorney said, and the statements of Dennis, as alleged to have made, that he forged more than 300 names to the petition would be submitted as evidence.

Dennis told the district attorney, according to authorities, that he needed money, had been out of work several months and saw an opportunity to make "a little money" by boosting the names on the petition.

KENWOOD LUMBER MILL DESTROYED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 20.—A heap of smoldering embers and twisted iron was all that was left of the Kenwood Lumber company mill today after a fire which caused loss estimated by J. D. Harvey, president, at \$70,000, only about half covered by insurance.

Only the office and part of the dock on Columbia slough were saved. They were separated from the main buildings of the plant.

The mill had about 100,000 feet a day capacity and gave regular employment to about nine men.

N. Y. WAREHOUSE FALLS; MAN KILLED

NEW YORK, June 20.—One man was seriously injured and several others escaped injury today when a six-story general merchandise warehouse collapsed on the downtown west side.

The entire front of the building collapsed with a crash heard of all sorts, and debris were thrown for several hundred feet along the narrow street.

CROSS-STATE RAIL PROJECT IS SET BACK

Commencement of Work on Crane-Crescent Link Put Off From July 1 to January 10.

Interstate Board Allows U. P. Chance to Contest Order That Calls for 15 Million.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The interstate commerce commission today postponed from July 1 to January 10 the date on which a Union Pacific subsidiary would be required to begin 185 miles of new railroad in Oregon, in view of the appeal against the order taken to the Oregon district court.

The litigation involves a test of a novel use of interstate commerce commission power and is being watched with more than ordinary concern by all railroad interests.

The precedent-creating decision of the commission resulted from a complaint instituted by Oregon which asked that the Union Pacific, through the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company, which it owns, be required to build an east and west line directly across Oregon from Crane to Crescent Lake.

The cost of the construction was placed at about \$15,000,000 and the railroad protested sharply, challenging the authority of the government to force it to make any such involuntary investment of new capital. After a protracted contest, the commission, notwithstanding, ruled the line was needed and that the railroad was able to meet the cost. Thereafter, the railroad entered the federal courts to continue its resistance, and the commission's order today granted the delay to allow the appeal to proceed.

NEWLYWEDS LOST ON CANADIAN HIKE

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 20.—Hope for the safety of William H. Albee, 23, of Glendale, Cal., and his bride, who ventured into the wilderness toward Dawson several days ago was virtually abandoned today by the Royal Northwest Canadian police. The couple was en route to Fairbanks, Alaska, on a hiking tour around the world. They had intended to spend the winter in Fairbanks.

The couple ventured into the wilderness against the protests of frontiersmen and trappers and further disregarded the advice of Sergeant W. J. Service, in charge of Fort George provincial police, and refused to follow the telegraph trail. Provincial police patrol that regularly carries only a small rifle and a pack sack of provisions. Neither was accustomed to the perils of the north country.

BOMBING SUSPECT FOUND MURDERED

CHICAGO, June 20.—While efforts were proceeding with a reorganized police department to clear up the assassination of Jake Linde, Tribune crime reporter, and free Chicago of gang domination, a gangster slaying came to light today.

Lorenzo Juliano, 40, questioned by police in connection with eight murders and 12 bombings in the last three years, reached the end of the hoodlum trail.

His body was found, shot through the breast and wrapped in canvas, in an automobile which had been shunted into a deep clay pit near Blue Island, south side suburb.

Juliano was said to be involved in the bombings of the homes of United States Senator Charles S. Deneen and of John A. Swanson, while candidate for state's attorney, in the tempestuous primary campaign of April 1928.

Commissioner Alcock's first thrust against liquor activities was directed early today in a raid on the Yerakles grill, on the south side, where a \$5,000 stock of whiskey, wines and beer was seized.

Harmful Golf, "Good" Alcohol Cited by Medic

SPOKANE, Wash., June 20.—Golf is harmful and alcoholic liquor has its benefits, Dr. William Muhlbarg, Cincinnati, president of the Association of Life Insurance Medical Directors, believes.

Speaking here last night, Dr. Muhlbarg said: "The average man who plays golf goes out to the course, dabs a shot, gets mad, tears his hair, maybe throws his club away or breaks it up, and as a result, increases his blood pressure. Instead of playing the game for the enjoyment of it, he bets so much a hole, strives to beat his opponent, often plays more holes than he should and over exerts himself."

The average American, he said, does not know the meaning of repose. He worries about business, frets because his neighbor's car is better than his, and instead of resting in his leisure time, he spends it worrying, dashing madly somewhere in his car, or in some form of violent competitive exercise.

"A little bit of alcohol is good for mankind, we find," he asserted. "It soothes the nerves and makes his outlook on life brighter. The Italian gets good from his wine, and the German from his beer, but the American gets little but harm because the average American drinks as he does everything else—to excess."

LOST CLERGYMAN OBJECT OF SEARCH

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 20.—While Indian runners and posses of citizens are scouring the desert wastes of southern Arizona for some trace of the Rev. Thomas Howard, 74, missing from Tucson for nearly two weeks, state officials today are seeking legal means by which they can enlist the National Guard in the search for the former Minnesota circuit rider.

Colonel Earl E. Howard, Wheaton, Minn., publisher in Tucson to aid in the search for his father, reported that all clues followed thus far have been fruitless. Nothing has been seen of the aged man since he left the home of his daughter, with whom he was visiting in Tucson, to visit with old Minnesota friends who he "believed lived a little way out in the desert."

YAKIMA, Wash., June 20.—Yakima's lost girl scouts, Evelyn Krautkremer and Marion Converse, who disappeared Tuesday in the Fifes peak district of the upper Yakima valley, today were safe at the Last Crossing ranger station in King county, E. J. Fenby, who was in charge of rangers in the search, reported.

CARAVAN OFF FOR COAST TO VIEW PORTS

Opportunities for Freight Terminals to Be Eyed at Reedsport and Marshfield.

Roseburg Excursionists to Get Information About Harbors and Links for Highways.

On a mission to gain first-hand knowledge of the freight terminal possibilities of the Port of Umpqua and Coos Bay, a caravan of 32 Roseburg men and women left at 7 o'clock this morning to spend the full day and evening at Reedsport and Marshfield.

Because of the North Umpqua highway and the Tillamook-Tillamook construction, which is scheduled to begin shortly, Roseburg and the Umpqua valley are naturally directly concerned with port facilities which will affect the development of inland sections to be served by the roads.

These two major road projects link up with transcontinental and coast highways, for direct trade connections between Idaho, eastern Oregon and the coast through Douglas county and there is a wonderful opportunity to be visualized in the development of transportation.

In order to better understand the port facilities tributary to the Umpqua valley, the Roseburg chamber of commerce recently made plans for a caravan to visit the two ports. The dates were changed from time to time, until a satisfactory day for all concerned was reached, and the caravan departed this morning.

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HOLDUPS GET \$4919 FROM SEATTLE BANK

SEATTLE, June 20.—Holdup: officers of the bank away with pistols four masked men robbed the First Security bank of \$4919 in cash shortly after the bank opened here today.

The bandits lined five employees up against the wall and searched for the money themselves. They rifled three of the four cash drawers behind the counter, overlooking a fourth containing several thousand dollars in their haste to flee.

After looting the drawers the holdups forced Cashier R. M. Lee and Teller Leonard Hutton to open the vaults and currency compartments of the safe, and then backing out of the bank they escaped in an automobile.

The automobile was rented from a Seattle "drive-it-yourself" garage by a man who gave the name of Leo Clark. It was traced by the license number. Garage employees said "Clark" was about 24 years old, five feet eight inches tall and wore a dark suit.

Although police arrived a few minutes after the holdup, they found no trace of the car or the robbers.

CHAIN STORES NOW RIVAL UNDERTAKERS

SPOKANE, June 20.—Washington state undertakers, holding state convention here, deplored the encroachment of chain stores into the coffin selling industry and looked into suggestions to live up their business.

C. E. Smith of Spokane told the convention that chain stores had not only started selling coffins, but were dealing in complete funerals as well. He added that he did not believe this type of competition was a menace to the profession, because chain stores "cannot supply the personality to the service."

\$15,000 STATION TO RISE IN ROSEBURG

Construction of a service station in Roseburg at the cost of approximately \$15,000, will begin immediately. It was announced this morning by the Texas company. A building permit for that amount was taken out today and surveying of the site has begun.

The station, which will be built of frame and stucco after the Indian adobe style, will be located on the southwest corner of Stephens and Mosher streets.

The permit issued calls for an expenditure of \$5000 on the service station proper, \$4000 on a weighing rack and store room, \$1000 on rest rooms and the remainder for miscellaneous equipment.

Texas company stations in other cities are unusually attractive, it is reported, and plans call for one of the best here.

EXTENSION TO SAN FRANCISCO IS PERMITTED

Western Pacific and Great Northern May Unite in Constructing Roads in California.

Prolonged Struggle Begun by Hill and Harriman Ended by Decision in Washington.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Conditional permission today was given the Great Northern and the Western Pacific railroad companies to construct new lines in northern California, which will enable the Great Northern to extend into San Francisco.

Approximately \$14,936,000 will be spent on the new extensions, \$10,000,000 of which will be provided by the Western Pacific and the balance by the Great Northern.

The extension was bitterly opposed by the Southern Pacific and the Union Pacific railroad, but the commission ruled that public convenience and necessity justified the construction. The condition attached was a requirement that the Great Northern should permit the Western Pacific to have reasonable joint use of a part of the new construction the company will undertake.

The construction program approved will result in the Great Northern railroad building 90 miles south from Klamath Falls, Ore., while the Western Pacific will build 110 miles north from a point on its main line in Lassen county, the two extensions to meet.

Aids Development

"The principal importance of the proposed line is as a bridge or connecting link between systems," the commission said. "This is true whether judged from the standpoint of prospective earnings or diversions of traffic from other lines. The new line will aid in development of a great timber area and some considerable agricultural areas in northern California."

"The local traffic would probably be insufficient to justify a line built to the standards here proposed, but considering all traffic available the applicants have reasonable prospect of earning a fair
