WATER 'LOANING'
TO BRING PENALTY.
COUNCIL DECLARES

GLENDALE, June 19.—Water users in Glendale who permit their neighbors to get all the water they may need through them, so that said neighbors avoid paying water rental to the city, will be charged a double rental, according to instructions given the city recorder and marshal by the city council at a special meeting held Monday evening. By taking this action the city council hopes to discourage city water users from permitting neighbors, who have had their water supply shut off because of failure to pay water rentals getting all the water they want without paying for same.

The remainder of the unpaid bills for labor on the Mill Creek project and repairs on the Section Creek intake, amounting to \$198.20, were allowed paid. REDISCOUNT RATE
AT RECORD "LOW"

NEW YORK, June 19.—The New York Federal Reserve bank today reduced its rediscount rate to 2 1/2 per cent from 3 per cent. The latter had been in effect since May 2. The 2 1/2 per cent rate is the lowest the bank has ever had.

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
