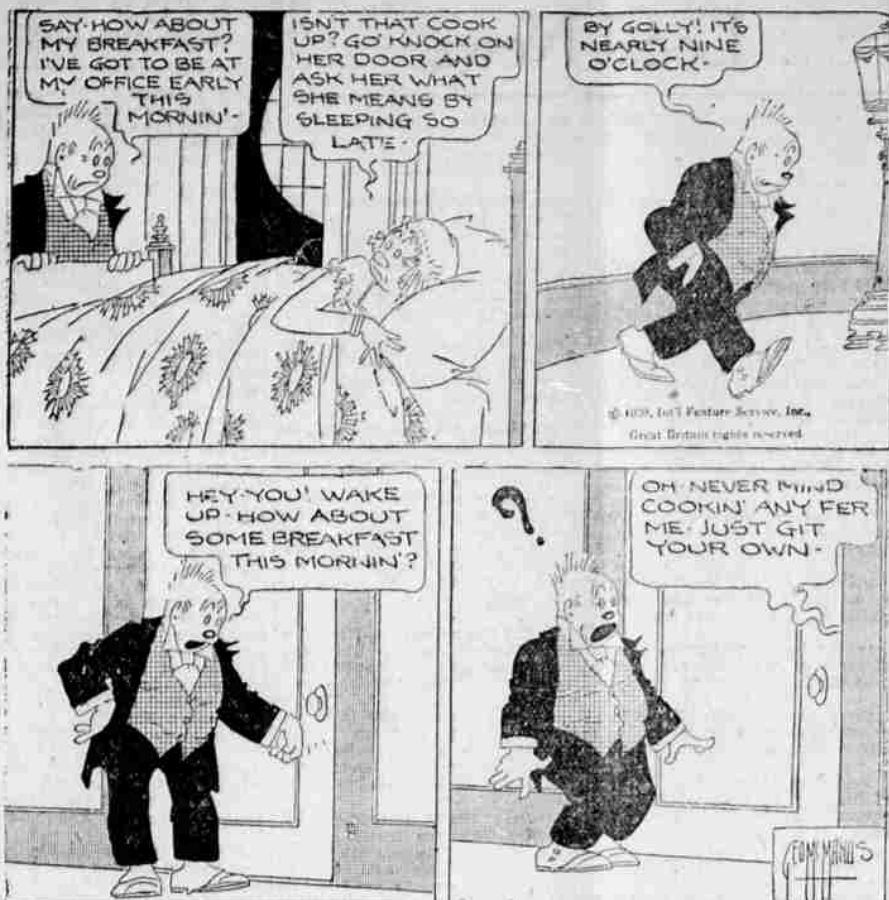
NORBLAD RETURNS; MUM ON POLITICS

Talks on Health

CONDITIONS of city life today are directly related to the health of the people. The stress and strain of business life, overwork, fatigue, worry, these are factors that have direct bearing on the development of certain diseases.

This is a disease in which the outer walls of the arteries become hardened. There is an increased growth of the connective tissues which hold the cells together. This tends to stiffen the walls of the arteries.

There may be softening of the inside walls of the arteries. Then any unusual strain may cause a break or tear, and a hemorrhage may follow.

The arteries of the brain may be involved. The arteries of the brain may be the seat of trouble. After some unusual strain a break occurs, and a hemorrhage or apoplexy follows.

Arteriosclerosis is often accompanied by high blood pressure. Over-eating is one of the chief causes of ill health. Temperance in eating will do a great deal to diminish the blood pressure.

Why is it that so many people fear dreadful things just because they have been told they have high blood pressure? It may or may not mean a thing.

A blood pressure of between 120 and 150 is looked upon as "normal." As a matter of fact, there are many persons past fifty who sometimes run a pressure of 150 to 160, and are still considered "normal."

Even if your blood pressure goes up to 200, it does not mean that your case is hopeless. Careful living, a limited diet, temperance in drinking, attention to bowel elimination, gentle exercise and cheerfulness of mind, will surely have their good effects on the health.

DEAR ANNE LAURIE: I am a girl in my teens, and I am going with a fellow about 15 years of age. He is very handsome and nice. I care for him very much.

Early attention will reduce the dangers and chances of arteriosclerosis. It pays to be careful.

A—Dizziness may be due to a circulatory disturbance, to an eye or ear condition or to some internal disturbance. An examination will determine the exact cause and then definite treatment can be prescribed.

T. E. S. Q.—I sleep without a pillow, yet find that I sleep with my mouth open, which causes sore throat. What would you advise?

A—Your trouble may be due to enlarged tonsils or to a possible obstruction in the nose. Have an examination so that definite advice may be outlined.

ALICE B. Q.—I am a girl of 20 and have noticed that my eyes have a tired, puffy look for the last year or so. I usually have eight hours' sleep every night and drink plenty of water during the day.

A—This may be due to a number of conditions. Have your kidneys examined to make sure they have no bearing on the trouble. Also keep your bowels open.

MRS. O. H. B. Q.—My husband is fond of hot peppers. Are they injurious or harmful in any way?

A—Highly seasoned foods or condiments are injurious to the stomach and indigestible in most cases.

STRIBLING KNOCKS OUT VON PORAT IN LESS THAN ROUND

Supposedly Crippled Fist Finishes Norwegian So Quickly Big Crowd Is Speechless.

Associated Press Sports Writer CHICAGO, June 21.—The angular figure of Otto Von Porat, Norway's heavyweight contribution, today was out of the championship scheme—propelled there by the left fist of William Stribling of Georgia, U. S. A.

Two minutes and fifty seconds after they crawled into the ring at the Chicago stadium last night, Von Porat, the paralyzer, was stretched paralyzed on the floor, by the same left hand that caused Stribling to ask postponement of the battle.

The ex-chookboy from Macon, Ga., fighting in a fashion that amazed a throng of around 21,000 persons, carried Von Porat off his feet from the start. None of the holding and mauling that has characterized previous Stribling engagements, were on display.

Stribling came out using everything and it was a thoroughly bewildered Von Porat who launched a right swing at Stribling's jaw—and ran into a left hook that dropped him like a rock.

Von Porat's head struck the canvas with a thud, and what the blow to his chin might have failed to do—knockout, was finished when his head struck the floor.

All Stribling From Start Stribling was all over Otto from the start. His left chunked into Von Porat's face with keen precision and a rousing right hand under the Norwegian's heart must have given him an idea what was coming later.

Stribling not only battered Von Porat out of the heavyweight picture, but leaped into the center of it. He might have eliminated Von Porat by pounding out a decision in the well known Stribling fashion.

Instead, he was the killer—a pleasant-faced, laughing killer. Everything he did was impressive.

Unofficial figures on the box office ante indicated the fight had created a new indoor attendance for boxing. Around 21,000 spectators paid more than \$30,000 to watch the stunning exhibition of what Stribling can do when he wishes.

The end came so abruptly that the crowd stood speechless. Stribling ran out of his far corner, as Von Porat to his stool, then laughed a few words into a radio microphone. Then he ran to "Pa" Stribling, his father-manager, and embraced him.

Stribling had caused postponement of the fight from Wednesday night to last night, pleading an injury to his left hand. An Illinois state athletic commission physician failed to find evidence of injury and Stribling was ordered to go through with the bout.

Any ailment in his left was swiftly transferred to Von Porat's chin, and William has something more to mention when he goes after a shot at the world heavyweight championship.
