NAVAL PACT WINS COMMITTEE APPROVAL

Day's News

If you have heard many people talk about the courts and the jury system, you have heard this statement:

"If I were innocent, although under indictment on a criminal charge, or if I had an important civil case in which I knew myself to be right and the other fellow wrong, I would rather submit my case to the JUDGE than to a JURY."

In this writer's judgment, those who make that statement are wrong. Here is why:

The judge, no matter how good a judge he may be, no matter how intent he may be upon seeing that exact justice is done, falls inevitably into PROFESSIONAL habits of thinking. He learns to base his thinking upon certain established rules. He gets the professional viewpoint.

Juries, on the other hand, bring to the decision of the cases submitted to them the viewpoint and the habits of thinking of the average man.

It is this writer's opinion that in long run the ideals of justice will be better served by having the cases that come before the courts decided according to the viewpoint of the average man than according to the viewpoint of judges, who are trained professional men.

We must be very careful, in the administration of justice, not to get away from the viewpoint of the average man. It is for the average man, you know, that justice is sought.

YOU hear, also, that it would be better to have one set of jurors serving permanently, thus gaining experience in the weighing of evidence. The same objection applies to this suggestion. It would get us away from the AVERAGE viewpoint of the AVERAGE man, which is what we must have if the administration of justice is to be kept close to the grass roots.

YOU hear a great deal said about the SACRIFICE involved in jury duty. Well, why shouldn't all of us be willing to sacrifice something for good government in return for GREAT BENEFITS which we receive from good government?

Good government is what WE OURSELVES MAKE IT. IF WE

VETO THREAT
BESETS VETS'
PAY MEASURE

Added Compensation Plan
Vigorously Opposed by
Hoover, Mellon and
General Hines.

Unsound and Would Boost
U. S. Tax Bill; Senate
Fails to Agree on
Compromise.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Senate republicans at a conference today discussed but failed to agree on several substitutes for the finance committee's veterans' relief bill opposed by President Hoover.

Senator Watson, the republican leader, predicted the committee measure—which would add an estimated cost of \$102,000,000 to the present annual cost of veterans' legislation of \$511,000,000—would be passed late today despite the threat of presidential veto.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Despite warnings of an impending presidential veto, the senate today approached a vote on the World war veterans' compensating bill with its sponsors confident of enough votes for passage.

Administration leaders, however, declined to admit defeat and pinned their hopes of enacting a measure suitable to President Hoover upon a substitute plan prepared by Senator Reed of Pennsylvania.

A roll call today on the pending measure was assured by an unanimous consent agreement entered into last week. It had already been passed by the house and with the senate voting its approval it would go to conference as it was considerably modified by the senate committee.

"Unsound," Hoover Says

In vigorous fashion, President Hoover set forth his objections to the bill in a letter to Senator Watson.

UNION COUNTY GAINS IN
CENSUS; NEIGHBORS DROP

LA GRANDE, June 23.—Population figures issued by A. C. McIntyre, Pendleton supervisor of census, reveal that Union county had made a gain of 5 per cent in the last ten-year period. The 1930 population is 17,572, compared to 16,636 ten years ago.

Wallawa and Umatilla counties both showed a loss in population, the report indicated. The Union county gain was due to the growth of La Grande, which on official figures jumped to the largest northeastern Oregon city. It was third in 1920.

ELEVATOR DOOR BREAKS

BOTH OF CHILDS LEGS
PORTLAND, June 23.—Jean Summa, nine years old, daughter of Howard Summa, Portland Beaver baseball player, suffered fractures to both legs yesterday when she became caught in the door of an automatic elevator in an apartment house. It was believed the girl was inside the cage and stuck her feet through the elevator door. As the elevator moved her legs were crushed between the bottom of the cage and the top of the first floor. Pressure against the door cut off the power and the lift stopped. The girl's legs were badly crushed.

Mrs. Charles Lindbergh Presents
Noted Aviator Husband With Boy
"Eaglet" on Her 24th Birthday

ENGLEWOOD, N. J., June 23.—Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh are the parents of a son.

The baby, weighing seven and three-quarters pounds, was born yesterday in the home where his mother, the former Anne Morrow, was born. She became a mother on her 24th birthday.

Aside from the statement of the baby's birth and his weight, no details of the event were forthcoming from the household of Mrs. Lindbergh's parents, Ambassador and Mrs. Dwight W. Morrow, except the statement that mother and baby were resting comfortably.

News of the arrival of the Lindbergh heir spread rapidly to all parts of the country and to foreign shores and within a short time a parade of messengers with congratulatory messages and bearing flowers began to arrive at the Morrow home.

Radio stations interrupted their programs to broadcast news of the event which has been awaited with lively interest for several weeks. A name had not been announced for the new arrival but Charles A. Lindbergh Jr., for his father, or Dwight Morrow Lindbergh after his grandfather, were mentioned as probable choices.

Mrs. Lindbergh, who has been her husband's constant companion in the since their marriage May 27, 1929, continued her flying to within a few days of the baby's birth. Last Thursday she flew with Colonel Lindbergh from Teterboro airport to Hartford, Conn., and return. Ten days previously

she had accompanied him on a test flight in the same monoplane.

The only description of the baby was the statement of a servant in the Morrow household who was quoted as saying that "he looks like his father." He has blonde hair and blue eyes.

Mrs. Lindbergh is a graduate of Smith college. Among her classmates she was known as a studious, dreamy girl, with a talent for writing poetry.

MAYOR, 3 OTHERS
KILLED IN WRECK

ABSECON, N. J., June 23.—Mayor Anthony M. Ruffa Jr., 52, of Atlantic City, and three other persons were killed today when an automobile was struck by a shore-bound Philadelphia-Atlantic City express on a grade crossing here.

The other dead are: John Wiley, 52, his wife, Lillian, 40, of Ventnor, and Margaret C. Stracusa, 37, of Ventnor, widow of Stephen Stracusa, a brother of Mayor Ruffa's wife.

Mayor Ruffa, reputed to be extremely wealthy, was a powerful political figure at the shore resort, where there have been several efforts to oust him. He had just finished a short rest he took after being acquitted by an Atlantic county petit jury on charges of illegal practices in connection with the placing of the municipal insurance.

MINISTER DROPS 13
STORES IN SUICIDE

CHICAGO, June 23.—Rev. Clarence E. Singleton, Baptist minister of Fairbault, Minn., jumped to his death last night from the thirteenth floor fire escape landing of the Y. M. C. A. hotel.

Hundreds of people on adjacent buildings, watching a squadron of army airplanes overhead, witnessed Rev. Singleton's leap.

Although the Rev. George W. Kehoe, pastor of the First Baptist church of Fairbault, whose assistant Singleton was, could offer no motive for the suicide when he reached last night, notes in Singleton's room indicated he had been brooding over some undisclosed problem of conduct.

YOUTHS ACCUSED OF
SLUGGING AND THEFT

PORTLAND, June 23.—Two boys, who are said to have kidnapped, slugged and robbed an Oregon State college student of his automobile last April, were arrested here today. They said they were Robert Annas and Malcolm Walker, both 17 years old. The automobile was recovered and three private garage owners were to be cited into city court because they failed to report new tenants.

Harold Synnestevedt Jr., college student, was reported to have picked Annas from a jail lineup today, as one of the pair who on April 5 boarded his automobile downtown and forced him at the point of a pistol to drive to a lonely out-of-town spot where he was slugged by another youth and robbed of the car.

Annas named young Walker as his accomplice and the boy was arrested at his home.

CANADIAN STORM
TAKES HEAVY TOLL

WINNIPEG, June 23.—Crops were ruined, a church demolished, cattle injured and poultry killed by hail and wind storms which swept over several southern Manitoba districts during the weekend.

Tearing from the northeast the storm was particularly severe in Emerson, Manitoba, and Fredon, where heavy damage to property and growing crops were recorded. The Lutheran church, valued at \$20,000, was wrecked at Fredon. In the Rosefield area, also to the south of Winnipeg, some farmers estimated total loss to crops, while others suffered 25 to 50 per cent damage.

YOUTH, 16, GOES TO
TRIAL FOR MURDER

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 23.—Clifford Campbell, 16, charged with the murder of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Northrup, ranchers, who were killed on the night of April 30 when a dynamite blast wrecked their home, went on trial in superior court here today.

The boy, who had been employed on the Northrup ranch as a chore boy, was arrested soon after the dynamiting. Sheriff R. E. McCrite said soon after the arrest that the lad had confessed to setting off the blast. This alleged confession was later repudiated.

The sheriff had quoted Campbell as saying he had heard his employers say they intended to discharge him.

Campbell pleaded not guilty.

HIGH COURT
HAS EDDY ACT
SECOND TIME

New Question Arises Over
Qualification of Voter
as Applied to City
Bond Issue.

Validity of Cottage Grove
Refunding Issue Hangs
on Result of New
Test Case.

SALEM, Ore., June 23.—An appeal in the case of O. O. Veatch against the city of Cottage Grove, another suit to test the constitutionality of the Eddy act of the 1929 legislature requiring that only taxpayers may vote on questions involving bond issues or special plying to the state and other subordinate political divisions, the first was held unconstitutional by the supreme court in the case of Loe vs. Britting, appealed from Multnomah county, and the case now on appeal from Lane county applies to the act relating to cities and towns. A similar case appealed from Pendleton, known as the Johnson case, is held insufficient to cover the case since it was confined to the Pendleton city charter.

Veatch challenges the validity of an election at Cottage Grove in which \$35,000 refunding bonds were voted on the grounds that persons who were not taxpayers were allowed to vote. The city's defense is that the Eddy act is unconstitutional. A demurrer by the city was sustained by the circuit court and Veatch appealed.

EX-OREGON "CONS"
STAGE CRIME ORGY

SALT LAKE CITY, June 23.—Police announced yesterday that Earl J. Hobson, 30, and T. B. Wise, 30, held in the city jail here following their confession to the shooting and kidnapping of a motorcycle patrolman preceding a wild ride through northern Utah cities Saturday night, during which they committed three robberies since they came here from Portland, Ore., Friday.

Information received here from Portland police stated that the men were well known to the police there. They admitted serving terms in the Oregon state penitentiary for robbery last year.

The men confessed to burglarizing a store and a service station at Layman, Utah, early Friday, and to breaking into a home here Friday night.

Motorcycle Officer Leland Daley was shot by Hobson while the officer was riding with the pair in their car to the police station after having arrested them on suspicion of automobile theft.

Wally Daley lying wounded in the back seat, the bandits robbed a service station here and sped away to Farmington, where they left Daley in care of a physician, staged two robberies and disarmed a state highway patrolman before continuing their flight.

Officers in four counties were on their trail and they were captured at Brigham City, sixty miles north, after their car broke down.

MAD KILLER MAY BE
IN WOMAN'S GARB

NEW YORK, June 23.—A man in woman's clothing was sought today as police began the second week of their search for the mad slayer of two men in Queens.

Meanwhile a Brooklyn newspaper distributor, Meyer Newmark, received a letter threatening his death unless he returned document "E. J. 43-14." This, the ninth letter purporting to have come from the maniac, followed an alleged announcement Saturday that his mission of death was ended and that he was returning to Russia. Police were uncertain as to the authenticity of either letter.

The theory that the maniac has donned woman's clothing to elude police was advanced today after Mark E. Brown, Manhattan, reported that a person at first thought to have been a woman, accosted him and his family as they were eating a picnic lunch in Queens yesterday, and asked for a ride to New York.

They invited the "woman" to lunch with them, Brown said, but as their guest took leave, they noticed trousers under the skirt.

Rockefeller Family Scion Weds
Boyhood Sweetheart at Ceremony
That Attracts the Elite of Society

PHILADELPHIA, June 23.—Miss Mary Todhunter Clark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Percy Hamilton Clark, of Philadelphia, becomes the bride of Nelson Aldrich Rockefeller, second son of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Rockefeller Jr., of New York, this afternoon.

More than 700 of the socially prominent of New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Baltimore and other cities will attend the ceremony at St. Asaph's Protestant Episcopal church in Bala-Cyned. Members of President Hoover's cabinet, senators and members of the diplomatic corps at Washington also have been invited. The ceremony will be performed by the Rev. Benjamin N. Bird, rector of St. Asaph's.

John D. Rockefeller, 3rd, will act as his brother's best man. After a reception at the Clark home Mr. and Mrs. Rockefeller will leave on a honeymoon trip around the world.

Upon their return they will reside at Tarrytown, N. Y., where Mr. Rockefeller's father has erected a \$75,000 home for them on his Pocantico hills estate. Mr. Rockefeller plans to enter his father's office in New York City immediately. Their wedding comes shortly after Mr. Rockefeller's graduation from Dartmouth college, where he made a brilliant record in scholarship.

The bride is an expert horsewoman and swimmer and plays a good game of tennis. Her father is a Philadelphia attorney, and her mother is the former Elizabeth Roberts, daughter of the late George D. Roberts, former president of the Pennsylvania railroad.

The wedding will mark a new chapter in a tale of romance which had its beginning on the beaches of Maine.

It was not far from there that the young scion of the house of Rockefeller was born.

It was near Northeast Harbor, Me., that these two minds found a mutual interest in the great outdoors.

Both are fond of horseback riding, tennis, photography, swimming and hiking through the hills.

DAUGHTER DIES

BAD BLOW FOLLOWS

SPRAY FORCES NUDE
FANATICS TO DRESS

NEILSON, B. C., June 23.—A disinfectant, sprayed by police upon 20 men and women of the radical "sons of freedom" sect of Doukhobors, was effective in forcing them to resume their clothing after force and moral evasion on the part of both conservative Doukhobors and police had failed to quell a nude demonstration at Brilliant, B. C., yesterday.

The radicals dispersed on the highway and the police were called in after the community Doukhobors failed in attempts to clothe them. The chemical warfare of the police quickly ended the disturbance and the community Doukhobors transported the demonstrators to a camp about a mile from the main settlement.

The Doukhobors are immigrants from Russia who live in agricultural communities in various parts of western Canada. All property is held by the community. The "sons of freedom" are a radical wing of the otherwise quiet religious sect.

TREATY SENT
TO SENATE BY
16 TO 4 VOTE

Minority Reports Against
Adoption of Plan to Be
Filed by Shipstead
and Johnson.

Borah States Debate Will
Bring Out Any Needed
Recommendation
for Passage.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The senate foreign relations committee today approved the London naval treaty.

By 16 to 4, the committee ordered it reported to the senate. Senators Johnson, republican, California, and Shipstead, farmer-labor, Minnesota, announced they would submit minority reports.

The overwhelming support for the treaty in the committee was believed to insure ratification of the pact when it is taken up by the senate in special session.

Those voting against the pact were: Johnson, Shipstead, Robinson of Indiana and Moses of New Hampshire, republicans.

Those voting for it were: Borah, Idaho, chairman; Capper, Kansas; Gillett, Massachusetts; Reed, Pennsylvania; Fess, Ohio; Goff, West Virginia; LaFollette, Wisconsin and Vandenberg, Michigan, republicans.

Swanson, Virginia; Pittman, Nevada; Robinson, Arkansas; Walsh, Montana; Harrison, Mississippi; George, Georgia; Black, Alabama and Wagner, New York, democrats.

Now Up to Senate

Borah announced he would submit the treaty to the senate today, without a report but merely introducing a resolution of ratification. This is the usual procedure of his committee.

Thus the treaty will be put before the senate without a word of recommendation either from President Hoover or from the foreign relations committee. In submitting the pact, the president only called for ratification.

"The debate will take care of any words of recommendation," observed Senator Borah.

With the treaty now on the senate calendar, there is a possibility that its advocates may move for immediate consideration should the senate and house become deadlocked and adjourn during a quarrel over the veterans bill. No suggestion has been made for that course, however.

SAWYER WILLING TO
RUN FOR GOVERNOR

EUGENE, Ore., June 23.—Robert W. Sawyer of Bend, publisher of the Bend Bulletin, said here today he would accept the republican nomination for governor if it is offered him, but he added that he is not seeking the position.

He added further that he is making no campaign for the post.

Sawyer was recently removed from the state highway commission by Governor Norblad, for reasons which Norblad said had to do with Sawyer's regard of the Roosevelt highway program.
