PROCLAMATION FOR SWIM WEEK HERE IS ISSUED

Three or four hundred youngsters and adults will receive instruction in the "Swim-in-Safety" campaign which will be held here June 29 to July 5, inclusive, according to Dr. H. C. Church, who is in charge of the event.

To date only 40 have registered for the free instruction. Dr. Church states that those who wish the lessons usually wait until the day the classes start and then register. This causes confusion and loss of instruction time, he declares, and urges that registration be done at once.

A proclamation setting aside the week and urging children and adults to enroll in the classes was issued today by Mayor E. V. Hoover.

The proclamation follows: "If a community can prevent or reduce needless deaths from drowning, it is an accomplishment to which every citizen and every mother and father should give the fullest cooperation."

"Swim week a year has become universal throughout the country, and Douglas county chapter of the American Red Cross will sponsor one in our city from June 29 to July 5. Free lessons in swimming and life-saving will be given by a qualified instructor to all who enroll in the classes."

"I cannot too strongly urge all parents to encourage their children to take advantage of this instruction and to participate in it themselves. Not only does such an enterprise as this promote healthful recreation among our people, but if one single tragedy is prevented, the endeavor is abundantly worth while."

"I therefore, designate the period of July 29 to July 5, inclusive, as 'Swim-in-Safety' week for the city of Roseburg and invite the people of the community to lend their efforts and cooperation to the Red Cross in helping make this movement a success."

Evelyn Houser, a Roseburg girl, is again at her post as telephone operator at Glendale. This will be her sixth year in this highly important capacity. During the other months of the year she is a student at the University of Oregon at Eugene. It is from her switchboard at Glendale that most of the information comes from the forest to the office of the supervisor here. Special lines connect that point with lookouts throughout the forest and with Roseburg.

MOTT GETS CHINOOK WITH 5-OUNCE ROD

Major Lawrence Mott, noted sportsman and writer, who is spending his summer at his Camp Contentment on the North Umpqua river, has again broken a record for light tackle fishing.

Fishing with Zeke Allen one mile above Steamboat yesterday, the major, using a five-ounce Heddon rod, captured a 21-pound chinook which he sent into town to J. A. Harding, manager of the Umpqua hotel.

Saturday morning the major hooked, played and brought to beach a 12-pound steelhead, which he described as the most beautiful he ever saw. This fish was also landed on a five-ounce rod. It took 15 minutes to land the fighter.

Fish are rather scarce at present, the major reports, on account of low water. The water is lower now than when the sportsman left last September for his home in Hollywood.
