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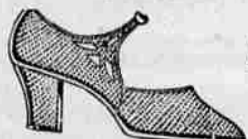
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HOOVER SIGNS BILL GIVING ROAD FUNDS TO ELEVEN STATES

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—Thirteen western states would benefit by the Oddie-Colton bill just signed by President Hoover. It authorizes federal cooperation in construction of roads through unreserved public and Indian lands.

Funds authorized under the act will be available only to states which have more than five per cent of their area in non-taxable federal lands.

The eleven so-called public land states that would receive the greatest benefit, and the proportion the unreserved public and Indian lands bear to total area, follow:

Washington, 39.6; Oregon, 45.6; California, 46.7; Idaho, 57.3; Nevada, 84.2; Montana, 39.8; Wyoming, 51.8; Utah, 66.3; Colorado, 32.2; Arizona, 66.8; New Mexico, 37.7.

South Dakota and Oklahoma also come under the provisions of the act.

The house road committee, reporting favorably on the bill, said: "It has long been recognized as most desirable that some means be found to hasten completion of the main roads that cross these untaxed federal reservations in states whose resources are limited and, which derive very little direct benefit from the construction of highways across these lands owned by the federal government, it is believed passage of the pending bill will be of real assistance in that regard."

The act carries no authorizations for this year but Senator Oddie, Nevada, co-author, said annual authorization of at least \$3,500,000 would be used on federal highways crossing the unreserved public and Indian lands.

DRUM CORPS BILLS BENEFIT DANCE

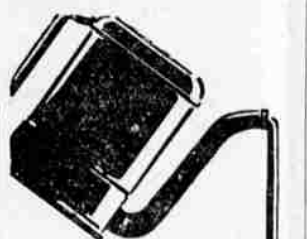

home "in one of the Pacific northwest states" was provided for. Because of the importance of getting the bill through senate before it is adjourned for this session, sponsors of the bill consented to let it stand without the name of Roseburg mentioned. This city, it is positively believed, will be the prime favorite for the location, since no other city in the north-



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west has made a strenuous fight for it and further, since the natural climate and geographical advantages have received the approval of the soldiers' home board, the body which designates the final location.

600 Ready to Enter
The visit of Dr. E. B. Stewart to Washington a few weeks ago resulted in assurance that if the bill passes congress that if the bill by the president Roseburg need have no fear of winning the home. Location of the home in Roseburg will mean not only the expenditure of the \$2,000,000 here, but will mean also that in a short time hundreds of veterans will be residing here. It is estimated that more than 600 men could be immediately placed in the home were it completed.

McNary's Message
That the senate will certainly pass the bill in the morning is shown by the text of the telegram received from McNary. The complete telegram follows:

"W. C. Harding, Secretary Chamber of Commerce Roseburg, Oregon: 'Happy to advise you that the senate military affairs committee has just reported favorably my bill for home for disabled veterans in Northwest Pacific states. This afternoon I shall adjourn senate so that we may have a calendar in the morning at which time I shall attempt to pass the bill.'"

"CHARLES L. McNARY."
McNary's influence with the administration virtually assures the favorable signature of President Hoover who looks to the Oregon senator for support in the upper house. Both McNary and Hawley have repeatedly stated that they firmly believe Roseburg will be the ultimate location for the home.

City Must Give Site
The bill does not provide money for a site. It will be contingent upon the city where the home is placed to furnish land for the building. State of Oregon authorities have unofficially announced that as an inducement to the national government the state soldiers' home grounds and buildings here will be donated in case the bill goes through. This is considered an attractive offer for the reason that the present buildings at the state institution will accommodate more men and the hospital in particular is designed for addition of further units.

ROSEBURGERS SEE FIRE-FIGHT PLAN

A delegation of four Roseburg men were given a glimpse of the system used by the forest service under actual fire fighting conditions when they visited the Wolf creek ranger station last evening.

Dr. B. R. Shoemaker, Dr. H. C. Church, Harold McKay and Harris Ellsworth drove to the camp to look in on the three-day forest school which is under way there. Dr. Shoemaker made a brief talk on first aid. The visitors dined with the forestry men under conditions which prevail when fire fighting is going on.

Twenty-four employees of the forest service are attending the school under the direction of O. C. Houser, central dispatcher. Major John Guthrie of the Portland office is at the station.

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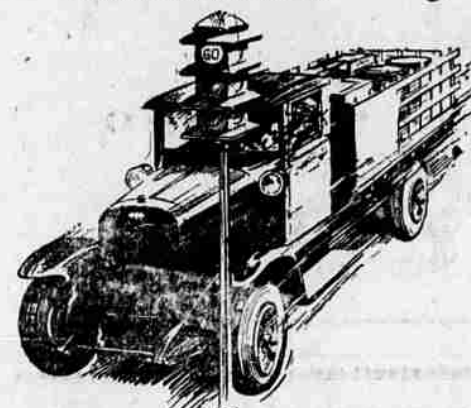

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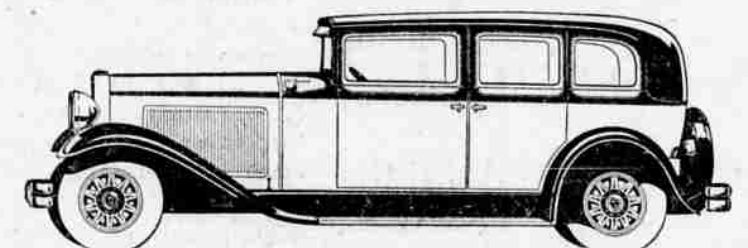
