TROLLER FOR DEEP SEA SPORT READY

BANDON, Ore., June 25.—A deep-sea fishing boat owned and built by V. Laivo and son was launched Saturday at the foot of Chicago avenue. The boat has been christened "The Fairway," and is a beautifully constructed craft as the expert hand of Laivo could make. It is a 11-foot hull with an 11-foot beam, large enough to carry from five to six tons of iced salmon. A 20 horsepower Atlas Imperial Fall Diesel engine will be used in the boat. The size of the boat will warrant many days of fishing before the catch would have to be brought in to empty. The vessel is varnished a natural wood color which tends to give it a classy appearance; it will no doubt compare favorably with any fishing craft along the coast.

ROAD OILING TO COVER SIX MILES

BANDON, Ore., June 25.—A large number of oil trucks have arrived here to load with oil for oiling between Bandon and River-ton. Approximately a six-mile stretch has been resurfaced and is being given a first coat of oil.

The road between Bandon and Coquille is much improved over what it was a few weeks ago. Paul

Van Scoy of Coquille, district engineer for the state highway department, stated that the construction was progressing favorably and that the highway would be in fair condition for the heavy travel expected over the Fourth of July.

Numerous stretches south of Bandon are being repaired and will be ready for oil soon. All of this repair work should put the Oregon coast highway in excellent condition for heavy travel during the months of July and August.
