HIGHWAY STREETS IN NEED OF CARE. COMMITTEE FINDS

Highway streets in Roseburg are not as well kept as they might be and therefore do not do justice to the general beauty of the town. This was one of the findings of the Roseburg Garden club contest committee when preliminary judging in the annual event was done yesterday.

Tourists naturally judge the city by the highway streets. It is pointed out, and every effort should be put forth to improve those thoroughfares. The Garden club will make this one of its activities in the future, it is stated.

Flower and vegetable gardens in the city on the whole are in wonderful condition, the three outside judges in the contest found when they made their survey yesterday.

The judges are Mrs. George R. Riddle, Grants Pass; George W. Taylor, Sr., Coquille, and Mrs. George Newberry, Winchester.

Escorted by members of the Garden club these judges yesterday conducted their preliminary survey. They expressed regret that many of the beautiful gardens in the city are not entered in the contest. In September the judges will return for final observation and will award prizes in the 11 different classifications.

PORTLAND JEWELER ROBBED OF \$3000

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26.—Two robbers gagged and bound H. K. Fujiwara, Japanese jeweler, here today while traffic streamed by outside the door and escaped with watches and rings valued at \$3,000.

A few minutes after the jeweler opened his store for business, a man entered and asked that the crystal of his watch be repaired. Fujiwara opened the safe in his store and another man then entered. Both flourished revolvers.

A passerby noticed the jeweler gagged and bound on the floor and notified police.

CHICAGO'S POLICE IN HUGE SHAKEUP

CHICAGO, June 26.—The police department's biggest shakeup in recent years was ordered today by acting Commissioner of Police John H. Alcock who transferred 534 men. Most of those were ordered moved to or from the detective bureau. Included were 724 detectives and 11 lieutenants. Alcock also issued an order literally decentralizing the department and placing the responsibility for each district upon its commander.

SMOKING TABOO IN WOODS AFTER JULY 1

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26.—C. J. Buck, regional forester, today issued a statement setting forth more stringent rules covering smoking in northwest national forests.

Under the new regulations, effective July 1, all national forest lands in Oregon and Washington are closed to smoking while traveling in timber, brush and grass

areas except on paved and surfaced highways.

Buck said that if forest visitors wished to smoke it would be necessary to stop while smoking and extinguish all lighted material before continuing. Forest service records, he said, show that many fires are started each year by campers, hunters and fishermen traveling along forest roads and carelessly tossing lighted cigarettes.

The forester said that anyone who throws away lighted material on forest land or who actually starts a fire in forest lands becomes liable to prosecution.

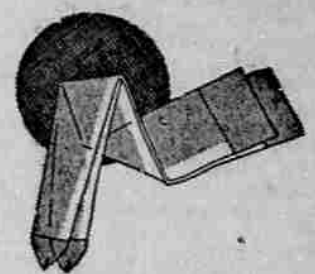
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
