

4-H CLUBS SEEN AS POTENTIAL HELP TO FEDERAL BOARD

Advised to Join Elders in
Cooperative Marketing
Plan to Stabilize
Farm Industry.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—Farm boys and girls, through their 4-H clubs, were told by James C. Stone, vice-chairman, federal farm board, that it is fully as important for a farmer to know how to market crops efficiently as it is to produce them efficiently.

Addressing the annual national 4-H club camp held in Washington under the auspices of the extension service, U. S. department of agriculture, Mr. Stone said that cooperative action seems to offer the best solution of the farm marketing problem and that the 4-H clubs can do more than any other agency in helping the farm board to make the program of the agricultural marketing act a successful service to the future farmers of America.

"The 4-H clubs," Mr. Stone explained, "teach you boys and girls how to become better farmers and home makers, encourage you to take part in neighborhood affairs and be of service to others, develop a spirit of teamwork among you and train you in leadership, one of the great needs of agriculture today. All of this is most excellent and serves to make life on the farm more attractive."

"But while you have been learning to produce well and efficiently, you have given little thought to efficient marketing. Farm premiums received for prize animals or products exhibited at county or state fairs, you will quickly learn as practical farmers, are not the prices paid in the markets for similar commodities. If you wish to get a fair return for your effort you will find that just as much or more attention must be given to marketing your crop as to producing it."

Blind Selling Cited
"For the most part, farmers in the past have been content to produce the limit and let someone else do the marketing. They have continued to grow and sell blindly, without regard to what their neighbors are doing, with the result that agriculture has not kept pace financially with other industries, which have become highly organized."

"The farm board was created to help correct this disparity. Congress said the way for agriculture to gain economic equality is through cooperation on the part of

farmers. Our board is trying to help the farmers get organized so that they, acting together, may control the production and marketing of their crops and thereby get a fair price for them. It is our opinion that cooperation is the only thing that offers real hope for agricultural prosperity."

Cooperation Imperative
"Cooperation among farmers that is being promoted by the farm board, nothing more than a broadening of the teamwork you young people are doing in your 4-H clubs. We feel that substantial progress is being made. The job is not one to be done overnight. In the long run success depends on the willingness of farmers to cooperate."

"Members of 4-H clubs know the advantages of cooperation in their work, they know how to lead others and also they know how to follow leadership. They can be of great assistance to the farm board in developing this program which will enable farmers, through collective action, to put agriculture on a sound financial basis. We feel that the future prosperity of American agriculture rests largely in the hands of the 4-H clubs and are confident you will get behind the cooperative movement just as enthusiastically and with just as much determination to succeed as you have your other club projects."

ROBINS AND CUBS OPEN SERIES FOR THE LEAGUE LEAD

Race in American Circuit
Tightens as Yankees,
Led by Babe Ruth,
Score 2 Wins.

Separated by one game, the Robins and the Cubs open in Chicago today a series of four games which probably will decide which will reach July 4, the traditional turning point of the season on top. Brooklyn has held first place for about a month with a crippled Cub team hanging right onto the next rung of the ladder. The Robins did a little sliding yesterday as they lost their final game before invading Wrigley field to the Pittsburgh Pirates.

They can lose again today and still remain ahead but only by a few percentage points. The Robins could not hit off yesterday's Ray Krimmer yesterday, getting but seven rather ineffective blows. Pittsburgh touched Duddy and Clark for eleven blows and a 5 to 1 victory.

The Cubs hit the Philadelphia pitching much more freely but barely pulled out the game by a 13 to 12 score to sweep the three game series and score their eighth victory in nine starts. Gabby Hartnett drove in the winning run in the ninth inning after his two home runs and a single had brought in five other runs.

The Cincinnati Reds shoved the New York Giants deeper into third place, by winning the series final, 1 to 3, to break even in the four games. Starting against an ex-Red, Pete Donohue, they pounded out 18 hits while Ted Lucas held the Giants to half that number.

Ruth Has Great Day
It was Babe Ruth day again in the American league as the home run king hit two wallopers of his favorite kind to lead the New York Yankees to a double victory over the St. Louis Browns in their third straight double header.

Ruth hit his 25th and 26th home runs in the second game, heading a 20-hit attack that resulted in a 16 to 4 triumph after the Yankees had edged out a 5 to 4 victory in the opener.

The day's results were all in favor of the Yankees, leaving them only a half game behind Washington and two behind the league leading Philadelphia Athletics. The Senators held out second place by beating the Cleveland Indians for the fourth consecutive time, 13 to 5. Washington scored eleven runs in the seventh.

The Athletics got an even break with the Chicago White Sox, romping through the first game 8 to 1. Chicago took the second, 7 to 2.

Jack Russell of the Boston Red Sox had just one hit in losing against Detroit, the eighth, but that was enough to give the Tigers the game, 4 to 3.

ROSEBURG GUARD BACK FROM CAMP; SHOWING PRAISED

Roseburg national guard company, Co. D, 162nd infantry, marched into home camping grounds this morning after being gone for 15 days. Together with all other units of the state militia, the local company spent two weeks in intensive training at Camp Clatsop.

Roseburg's unit made a splendid showing at the camp, according to Captain Victor McMill, commander. Just before the captain boarded the train to return here Major General George A. White, commander of the national guard troops of the northwest, stepped up to him and complimented him on the company's showing, concluding with the remark: "Captain, you certainly have a fine company."

Fifty-two men and three officers went from Roseburg to participate in the drills, inspection, instruction and other camp routine. None of the local men suffered any major injury or sickness. In the machine gun maneuvers Co. D made a remarkably high score.

H. C. STUTZ, AUTO BUILDER, PASSES

INDIANAPOLIS, June 26.—Harry C. Stutz, widely known automobile designer and manufacturer, died here today from complications which followed an operation for appendicitis. He was 53 years old. Inventions which improved rear axles of automobiles won Stutz his first recognition in automotive circles. He entered a car bearing his name in the first 500-mile race here in 1911 and it finished eleventh. As a result it became known as the "car that made good in a day," bringing with it fame and fortune to the builder.

UMPUQU SAVINGS AND LOAN DECLARES 7 PCT. DIVIDEND

Despite sundry statements about the quiet business situation in Roseburg, this city is one of the two communities in the state in first place in building and loan association dividend payments.

Judging from reports at the annual meeting of the Umpqua Savings and Loan association, held last night, this city pays a higher percentage of dividend on all its stock than any other place in the state, including Portland, with the one exception of Medford, whose rate is approximately the same.

Sixty-four loans were made during the fiscal year, reports of the company show. A dividend of seven per cent, exclusive of a reserve and provision for the excise tax, was declared at the meeting last night. The year showed a gain in loans and a gain in assets despite the building slump which prevails throughout the state and nation. The period averaged up with other years since the company was organized 18 years ago.

During that time no loan has ever been charged against the reserve fund, it is stated.

Stockholders in the concern elected E. N. Ewart president, A. C. Seabrand, vice-president; H. O. Pargater, secretary, and V. J. McMill, treasurer. Three directors were chosen, S. J. Shoemaker, Henry Harsh and B. B. Shoemaker.

James Ewart, G. C. Finlay and Mr. Sutherland were elected auditors, with Mr. Harsh as substitute auditor. Carl Wimberly was named attorney.

An increase in every branch shown during the year is taken by officers of the company as an optimistic indication.
