camp. The new building, which is built on the order of the public school play sheds, is forty feet long by twenty wide. The kitchen is twelve by fourteen feet; the store room, seven by eight and the office seven by eight also. The main part is twenty-six by twenty. This will be used as a dining room but is for the use of the boys in case of bad weather.  
The Southern Oregon Gas company furnished a range, boiler and pipe fittings to the scouts without charge. Pete Crummett went up to camp and made the installation as a donation. In order that the yellow jackets will have hard going when it comes to either carrying off the food or stinging the boys or Campfire Girls, the Churchill Hardware Co. is supplying plenty of screens to shut them out. This, too, is a donation.  
The price of the building has been kept at a very low figure through the above donations and also through the kindness of the Coen Lumber Co. in furnishing doors and other items to the scouts. The building will replace the old shed which has been used for four years.  
Every effort is being made to put on the best camp ever held here. Lots of training and instruction put over by the "fun" way will keep the boys busy every minute. They will be on the move from the rising time to nine-thirty bed time.  
Of course the entire time is given over to boy training but the scouting instruction period will cover two hours each morning. A boy has every opportunity to advance in scouting while at camp. The camp will be "self-governed" by the boys this year as during the past. They will have their own judge, sheriff and deputy, as well as prosecuting attorney. There will be "moot" court twice each week. Forty-eight boys will be in camp and will be placed in six groups of eight each. Each group will tent in a place separate from the rest and will have a separate table. The groups compete one with the other for points in inspection, advancement, sports, table manners and personal appearance.

That was a very good game and now with the cream of those two teams selected, together with two from this city, a good game is assured.  
Players composing the Douglas county team are: Goff, Smith and

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Parker of Sutherlin; Dyer, Youm and Irkine of Myrtle Creek; Collins and Cox of Yoncalla; Mellor and Walker of Riddle; Taylor, Parks and Bridges of Roseburg. These boys are confident of winning though they are bucking against a hard team. The Coos team has been practicing faithfully with the idea of winning from the local aggregation.
