Mrs. Minnie Noyer, Gold Star Mother, to Visit Son's Grave

Shortly after America went into the World War, John E. Noyer volunteered. On a technicality his application was refused. In November of 1917, however, when the world knew that a crisis was approaching, he was drafted into company G, 364th Infantry, and sent to France.

During that terrific and decisive battle in Argonne forest Noyer lost his life and his body was laid beside those shell torn remains of his comrades in Flanders fields.

For these 12 years which have elapsed since the armistice was signed, a devoted mother has yearned to stand by the grave of that boy of hers.

This week the mother left for France to visit the grave held so dear by her.

The mother is Mrs. Minnie Noyer who has lived in Roseburg and Myrtle Creek for the past 19

years. She was born on a ranch between the latter community and Canyonville. When she was an infant her parents moved to the Willamette valley where they lived for a few years before moving to Pomeroy, Wash., and there she lived until the time she came to Roseburg. John, the eldest son, was born at Pomeroy.

Four other children of Mrs. Noyer are living. They are Mrs. George Cox, Mrs. Ray Roberts and Joe Noyer, all of Roseburg, and Mrs. Opal Tollefson of Portland.

Mrs. Noyer will arrive in New York on June 30 and will sail for France on July 2. She will spend two weeks in France, part of that time in Paris, from which city the trip to the cemetery will be made. On her return to Roseburg Mrs. Noyer will visit Idaho and eastern Oregon, being expected to arrive here seven weeks after the date of her departure.
