GREETED BY REAR ADMIRAL BYRD

PENNSYLVANIA BOY SCOUTS WELCOME THEIR BROTHER SCOUT HOME

ERIE, Pa., June 26.—Loaded with honors and universally praised by fellow-members of the Byrd Antarctic expedition party, Paul A. Siple, most famous boy scout in the world, is back home once more, and glad of it.

Twenty-one-year-old Paul was the scout chosen from hundreds of thousands to accompany the history-making two-year expedition to the bottom of the world.

According to Rear Admiral Byrd and his aides, none worked harder or with more good will and intelligence than the modest youth from the city of Erie.

Though he grew to stalwart manhood amid the frozen wastes near the South Pole, Paul proved he was the same unassuming lad who had sailed away on the Barkentine "City of New York," when asked
