HERE is an interesting statement by W. H. Bentley, manager of the North Pacific Nut Growers Cooperative association: "Most Oregon filbert growers agree that the 1930 crop is going to be the biggest filbert crop ever grown in this country. We CERTAINLY HOPE SO, because our last year's introduction of filberts in a dozen eastern markets has resulted in a very heavy demand for new crop filberts this year."

THIS proves an important principle, which is this: As we get MORE of a good product, we can command a wider market.

Putting it another way, UNDER-PRODUCTION hurts the market, because you can't sell what you HAVEN'T GOT.

HERE is another interesting statement by Mr. Bentley:

"As an example of present interest in Oregon filberts, we may cite the case of our broker in New York, who has submitted orders for over TWELVE HUNDRED BAGS at large Barcelona filberts from customers who used only 150 bags last year."

THIS proves another important principle: "A better product than the buyer has been accustomed to brings orders for LARGER QUANTITIES."

New York consumers have been accustomed to the inferior filberts of Europe. When the SUPERIOR filberts of Oregon are made available to them, they re-order in larger quantities.

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Endurance Flight Record Smashed

HUNTER BOYS KEEP ON TO EXTEND TIME

Hope to Stay Aloft Until July 4th; Thousands of Chicagoans Acclaim Achievement.

Famous Airplane Columbia Adds Non-Stop Trip of 1600 Miles to Her Performances.

OUTSTANDING EVENTS IN FIELD OF AVIATION

Hunter Brothers, in the "City of Chicago," establish new world's record for refueled endurance flights and keep going, with July 4th as a new time goal.

Non-stop round trip flight from New York to Bermuda is added to the record of the famous monoplane Columbia. Week-end tragedies in the field of aviation include the death of two army pilots in a crash at Mitchell field and the drowning of a student flier when his plane dived into Buzzard's bay, Massachusetts.

Dorothy Hester, 19-year-old Portland aviatrix, makes thrilling performance in series of loops.

Detroit, Mich., boy of 17 wins European trip and cash prize for the best airplane model in U. S. competition.

CHICAGO, June 30.—The "City of Chicago" completed its 419th hour in the air at 8:40 a. m. (C. S. T.) today, making contact at that time with the refueling plane. The record exceeded that set last year by the "St. Louis Robin" by 29 hours.

The Hunter boys—two farmers who turned from the plough to the plane—roared onward today in triumph through the skies, piling more hours on the new world's endurance record they established early Sunday.

Bucking time and tiredness, the brothers hope to remain aloft at least until July Fourth.

The cheers of thousands burst the suburban Sunday stillness at Sky harbor airport when the plane came through the dawn with a new record on its wings.

Two score army planes—pursuits and bombers here for the army show—went up in the afternoon in salute formation. More than 40,000 automobiles honked through the heat of the day on the

ALLIED TROOPS BID RHINELAND ADIEU

WEISBADEN, Germany, June 30.—The inter-allied Rhineland commission today closed up shops, hauled down the French and British flags over their headquarters and left Germany. So ended the commission's long career, at one period of which it ruled the destinies of 15,000,000 Germans in the occupied territories.

But until the town clock marks midnight and the church bells sound the "Liberation," theoretical French occupation will continue. The German celebration is to start at midnight and continue until dawn.

There were a half million troops along the Rhine after the armistice, French, Belgian, British, Italian and American, but as other nations withdrew and the zones were evacuated the army of occupation dwindled to about 25,000 men these last few months.

A word of honor replaced force today as guaranty for German reparations. The Yompe plan, with its bank for international settlements and the recent issues of German reparations bonds in nine countries, now has the half-century job of settling German war indemnities to the allies.

Supporters of the Rhineland separatist movement began today to feel the reaction against their cause. Some received threatening letters, others had the windows of their homes marked and still others found placards in their doors which read:

"What are you going to do now that your protectors are gone?" Several already taken their departure into France.

The newspapers, with captions "what they left behind," today printed from the Rhineland birth statistics a total of re-called occupation babies, the figures given being 2341.

Among these 1851 had American fathers, 989 English, 767 French, 199 Belgian.

REED SMOOT TO WED WIDOW OF BISHOP

SALT LAKE CITY, June 30.—Senator Reed Smoot of Utah announced at his office here today that he and Mrs. Alice Taylor Smoot of Salt Lake City, would be married soon. The date was not made known.

Mrs. Smoot, prominent in activities of the Latter-day Saints church, of which Mr. Smoot is an apostle, has been a widow since 1918. Her first husband, Edwin S. Smoot, a bishop in the Latter-day Saints church, died during the influenza epidemic.

Senator Smoot's first wife died more than a year ago in Washington.

ELECTRIC CHAIR TAKES 3 KILLERS

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 30.—Three convicted murderers were electrocuted at the Rockview penitentiary today. They were Marvin Arvey and William Henry Bell, negroes, of Pittsburgh, and Frank Taux of Wilkes Barre. It was testified at Taux's trial that he was once a companion of Gerald Chapman, also executed for murder.

GUNMEN RAID WAREHOUSE, TAKE LIQUOR

\$200,000 Worth of Stored Stuff in U. S. Custody in Chicago Speeded Away on Trucks.

Booty Includes 400-Case Cargo From Capone in Florida; Syndicate Is Suspected.

CHICAGO, June 30.—Fifteen gunmen held control of a government warehouse for three hours last night and trucked away whiskies, brandies and alcohol the value of which may exceed \$200,000.

Included in the liquor stored in the two-story warehouse were 400 cases of bonded whiskey shipped to Chicago from Jacksonville, Fla., presumably by agents of Al Capone, and seized by federal agents.

The possibility that the raid on the warehouse last night was by Capone gangsters to recover the seized liquor, is being investigated. Watchman Deceived.

Paul Perry, night watchman, was alone when four men, each carrying a large can, appeared at the entrance. Perry thought they were federal prohibition agents bringing more liquor for storage, and he admitted them.

Gun barrels were poked against his side and he was bound, gagged and blindfolded. The gang leaders then admitted the others, and the three-hour job of carrying out the cases of liquor to waiting trucks was begun.

The raid on the warehouse did not end until shortly after one o'clock this morning. At least three trucks were taken away, a hurried inspection revealed.

The liquor was stored on the second floor, and the night watchman said that many trips were made by the elevator in moving the cases to the ground floor, where it was loaded into trucks. The raiders worked at great speed, he said.

Syndicate Suspected. Police believe the raid may have been inspired by the desperate plight in which liquor syndicates have found themselves as a result of the recent police shakeup.

The police theory is a syndicate, finding its source of supply from outside Chicago, endeavored to arrange the raid so as to obtain liquor with which to meet the demands of its trade.

Only a few of the raiders—probably only the four men whom the night watchman admitted—were gangsters, police said; the others being laborers and roustabouts who did the actual work of transferring the liquor from the warehouse to the trucks.

CHICAGO, June 30.—A bear she was continuing to the right hand and forearm from three-year-old Barbara Cross as she stood at the bear cage of the miniature zoo at the Medinah Country club yesterday. The upper arm also was severely lacerated before older persons, who came running at her screams, could pull her away.

Her condition today was serious but doctors said the injuries probably would not prove fatal.

BODY THOUGHT THAT OF ST. HELENS MAN

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 30.—Authorities today attempted to identify the body of a man found in the underbrush on Slouken creek, northern Clark county, as that of either R. H. Delin or E. G. Scarb, both St. Helens, Ore., who disappeared several months ago while on an inspection trip to some mines.

Delin and Scarb left St. Helens for the upper reaches of Slouken creek to inspect some mining claims belonging to Delin. Their automobile was found abandoned on a bypath and more than a half dozen parties entered the search for them.

Both men had wives and children in St. Helens.

Favors Shown Protestants in Rome Irks Pope

VATICAN CITY, June 30.—"Protestant proselyting" in Rome must be combated by an increased number of parish priests to serve the outlying quarters of the city, Pope Pius XI declared today in an allocation opening a secret consistory at which five cardinals created.

The pope's allocation said that certain recent laws of Italy which seemed to favor protestant activity "seem to whomsoever considers them well to be in strong contrast with the spirit and letter to the solemn lateran conventions."

The pope said that the protestants sects from 1880, the year in which the Italian troops took Rome from the holy see, "have not ceased to carry out the work of corruption and conquest with ever-growing insistence."

Observers indicated their supposition that he had in mind the missionary activities of the American Methodist, although he mentioned no specific denomination.

"If we might tolerate that in the practical order of things, these sects would be called cults admitted," which under the Italian statute were well denominated "tolerated cults." We could not expect that those very cults should later be treated in a fashion that seems they not only are tolerated in full and admitted in practice but also not a little favored—this is something that cannot but aid the degraded proselyting."

BOY SCOUTS OPEN WOLF CREEK CAMP

More than 40 Boy Scouts of Douglas county are in camp at Wolf creek.

Tests will be conducted for merit badges in all phases of outdoor scouting. The schedule calls for many kinds of outdoor recreation. Awards will be given on camp efficiency, cooking and other phases of work. The literary also includes several hikes, one of them to be for a long distance.

FISH YIELD HEAVY AT DIAMOND LAKE

Seven thousand seventy-five fish were taken from Diamond lake during June, it was reported today by Fred Perry, deputy game warden stationed there.

It took 1567 fishermen to catch that many fish from the lake, the warden states. All of the fish were rainbow trout. Most of the fishermen are residents of Oregon, he said.

Only five have been arrested for violating game laws at the lake. Catching more than the limit and fishing without a license were the causes. Forty-six women and children were caught fishing without license and warned to get the necessary tag or quit fishing.

Awards into the lake are in excellent condition and it looks as if this spot would draw a record number of people this season, Mr. Perry states.

WILEY, PURE FOOD FIGHTER, PASSES AT 85

U. S. Chemistry Bureau's Ex-Chief Main Figure in Battles Under 2 Presidents.

Triumphed Over Opponents in Celebrated Issues Then Retired to Private Work.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, 85, noted pure food advocate, died today of heart trouble.

When Dr. Harvey Washington Wiley became chief chemist of the department of agriculture in 1883 and took charge of the little cubbyhole laboratory in the basement from which the present far-reaching federal agency was developed, probably he did not know that he was embarking on a 30-year war of battle and controversy under the "pure food" slogan began for him that day; conflicts that were to demand repeatedly action by the president himself, and to end only when, vindicated and upheld by President Taft in his last clash, the scientist resigned after stubbornly refusing to be kicked out of the federal service.

Won Noted Contests. There are a score of bloodless but bitter battles, history of which might be written on Dr. Wiley's honorable discharge from the official pure food arena. There was the "what is whiskey" campaign in 1907 which revolved around him as the storm center; the "battle of benzene of soda," which still was rumbling in 1909, and finally the "board of personnel offensive" in 1911. The board, in what was known as the Dr. Rusk case, recommended that Dr. Wiley "be permitted to resign."

Secretary Wilson of the agriculture department and Attorney General Wickersham approved the board's report, but

Ed McPherson, driver of a truck, was arrested on a charge of driving while intoxicated following an accident which injured Mrs. E. Walsh, Taylor's ferry road.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 30.—Margaret Cox, 17, Horns Corner, was killed last night. The car in which she was riding turned over on a sharp curve.

Arthur Meredith, Portland, was uninjured as was the dead girl's mother, younger sister and three other occupants of the machine when it overturned.

NOTED CRUSADER FOR PURE FOODS AND DRUGS DIES

Death today claimed Dr. Harvey Washington Wiley, 85, who, while head of the federal bureau of chemistry, was the central figure in bitter controversies extending over a period of thirty years.

Through the backing of President Roosevelt and Taft, Doctor Wiley triumphed over his foes, then resigned. Outstanding among the issues that involved Doctor Wiley was his edict defining pure whiskey and another that struck at the use of benzene of soda in liquids and solids.

SALEM, Ore., June 30.—That none of the photographs of himself for which he billed the state in his expense account was used for political purposes, that he did not depart from usual practice in charging to the state, and that this expense was not excessive compared with expense accounts of other governors for the same purpose were statements made by Governor Norblad today in reply to criticism that has made of his including the photograph item in his expense account.

The governor also replied to criticism relative to other items in his expense vouchers including newspaper clipping service and long distance telephone calls during the days of the primary campaign. He declares that on not a single occasion when he charged traveling expense to the state did he deliver a political address.

STATE'S OLDEST MASON PASSES IN 103rd YEAR

PORTLAND, June 30.—"Uncle Jim" Whitford, who was born at Shadside Four Corners, New York, October 30, 1827, the year that state abolished slavery, died at the Forest Grove Masonic home yesterday at the age of 103. He was a member of the Masonic organization 62 years.

Whitford came to Oregon in 1879 to cruise timber for Minnesota and Wisconsin lumber concerns. He returned in 1903 and made his home at Cottage Grove.

Beginning with his 100th birthday in October, 1927, the event has become a statewide observance in Masonic circles.
