ROSEBURG SCHOOL DEBT CUT \$24,425 DURING PAST YEAR

Indebtedness of school district No. 4, which includes all Roseburg schools, was reduced \$24,425.00 during the past year, the annual report of Mrs. A. J. Geddes, school clerk shows. The bonded indebtedness was reduced from \$161,000.00 to \$136,575.00 and the warrant indebtedness from \$97,975.01 to \$73,550.01, the report shows.

The district's bonded indebtedness consists of \$136,575.00 on the junior high school building and \$35,000.00 on the senior high school. The bonds bear five per cent semi-annual interest and are being reduced at the rate of \$11,000.00 a year, the report shows. The junior high bonds will be retired in 1933 and the senior high bonds in 1944.

Total enrollment in all the city schools this year was 1294. Of

this number 635 were boys and 661 girls. The percentage of attendance was 98.1. Five school buildings were in operation, with 55 teachers employed to run them. The district tax, which totaled \$99,378.21, furnished the largest single portion of the operation costs, with high school tuition amounting to \$31,507.25 coming next in line. Total receipts from all sources were \$17,216.44. Warrant issued during the year brought the total to \$234,879.24 which is also the total expenditure inclusive of a balance of \$9,840.73. The high school cafeteria took in \$3,018.75 during the year. Principals' salaries total \$9,472.00 and other teachers received \$96,823.16.

THE WORLD-HERO MEN

An ensign retired by the navy 14 years ago will return to Washington June 29 as the youngest of rear admirals—and with the fame of flights over both ends of the earth.

The day after he steps ashore in the United States and receives New York's welcome Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd will bring his entire Antarctic party to Washington and receive from President Hoover a special medal of honor of the National Geographic society.

TO RECITE ACHIEVEMENTS
Rear Admiral Byrd will give his report of the South Pole expedition to members of the society who furnished \$50,000 for scientific work, and official motion pictures of Little America will be shown for the first time.

As a navy officer who at 41 has conquered by air the Atlantic and two worlds of frozen waste, Byrd also will pay his respects to Secretary of the Navy Adams.

His career of exploration has been carried on during an extended leave from the navy—even though a leg injury caused his removal to the retired list four years after his graduation from Annapolis. That was 14 years ago.

Scarcely a month of retirement had passed, however, before the government recalled him to active duty—a service that has been continuous ever since.—An Associated Press story from Washington, D. C., June 18, 1930.

POULTRY EXPERTS HEARD AT PICNIC IN KIWANIS PARK

Receipts of eggs are 5 percent larger than a year ago, with a 15 percent reduction in consumer demand, resulting in a greatly increased stock of cold storage eggs, J. C. Leedy, county agent and secretary of the Douglas County Poultrymen's association, told members of that group at a picnic in the Kiwanis park yesterday.

Prices of eggs were also compared with former years, the Portland market for extra eggs being quoted at 24 cents per dozen in comparison with 21 cents in 1929, 31 cents in 1928 and 22 cents in 1927.

A large number of members attended the picnic and participated in the instructive program and the basket dinner.

Mr. Leedy also outlined the requirements of a series of contests being conducted among the poultry men this year to stimulate interest and to reward the successful growers for improved production practices.

H. E. Gurney, poultryman of Winchester, and fieldman of the Douglas mills, spoke in an optimistic tone of the poultry situation in Douglas county, stating that the flocks are experiencing a 50% increase during the present year.

Fred Goff, chairman of the agricultural committee of the state senate, brought greetings from the state senate, and pledged the support of the senate in furthering the interests of cooperative marketing associations in Oregon and in carrying out the policies of the federal farm board.

J. H. Clark, president of the county association and Douglas county director of the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers, outlined the aims of the marketing group, and enumerated the events leading up to the establishment of an egg packing plant at Roseburg, which Mr. Clark stated would not be accomplished before the fall months of the present year.

The last speaker on the program was G. W. Bart, one of the pioneer poultrymen of the county, who compared the present day conditions with those met by the producers of commercial eggs ten and fifteen years ago, when, before the organization of the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers, prices ranged from 11c during the periods of high production to 40c per dozen in November and December. According to Mr. Bart, feed prices, with the exception of wheat, were relatively higher in the early days of the poultry industry than at the present time. In the opinion of Mr. Bart, splendid opportunities exist in Douglas county for the producer of quality eggs, even with the prospective decline in prices in the
