

CHICAGO FINALLY CAPTURES LEAD OF NATIONAL LEAGUE

Cubs Oust Robins Despite Loss of Hornsby From Injuries — Cards Also Climb Up.

Athletics, Closely Pressed by Yanks and Senators, Remain at Top of American Pack.

A somewhat crippled Cub team, lacking Rogers Hornsby and occasionally a few other regulars, has been battling its way toward the National League and finally has wrested first place from the Brooklyn Robins. The Cubs have refused to be downed and even losing the first game of their series to the Robins failed to daunt them. They came back to capture the league lead yesterday by beating Brooklyn, 5 to 1.

The Cubs now have won 11 of their last 13 games, starting when they played their last game in New York before returning home. These victories have placed them a full game ahead of the Robins. Their lead is only nine percentage points, due to the fact that they have played four more games than the Robins. In addition they set a record for attendance in the series with Brooklyn, drawing 47,000 fans yesterday to bring the total of 140,000 for the series.

Brooklyn made it a sad celebration of Manager Wilbert Robinson's 66th birthday by getting only seven hits off Charlie Root.

The St. Louis Cardinals and Boston Braves had almost as much cause for rejoicing as the Cubs yesterday.

The Cards picked up two full games on the New York Giants. Winding up only one game out of third place, by winning a pair of close decisions. The scores were 3 to 2 and 5 to 4. Sylvester Johnson and Bill Hallahan held the Giants to a total of eleven hits in the two games.

The Braves likewise won both ends of a double header from the Cincinnati Reds. They took the first 4 to 3 although outlast 15 to 6 and slugged out a 10 to 3 triumph in the second.

American Race Tightens
In the American league, the New York Yankees and St. Louis Browns registered big gains as the Yankees downed the Cleveland Indians, 7 to 6, and St. Louis trounced Washington, 6 to 3. The Yankees, benefiting by the power of Charley Ruffing, gained a tie with Washington for second place and the Browns tied Detroit for fifth, each gaining a game on its rival.

Ruffing finished the game for the Yankees and scored the deciding run himself to make it six straight victories since he came to New York.

The Philadelphia Athletics kept first place safe from assault by taking a single game in Detroit. Tigers, 6 to 5. Jimmy Fox's 22nd home run of the year, which kept him just ahead of Lou Gehrig, was the big feature with the final decision at the plate adding more excitement. The Tigers scored two runs in the ninth and the fans thought they had a third but Umpire Guthrie said out instead of safe when Jimmy Shevlin tried to score.

The league's tall enders, Boston and Chicago, divided a double header. The Red Sox made it eight straight over their Chicago rivals by taking the first, 10 to 6, but the White Sox reversed the decision 2 to 1, in the second game as Ted Lyons, backed Jack Russell to gain his eleventh victory of the season.

Following the wedding the couple left for a trip into northern California by way of the McKenzie pass, Crater lake and Diamond lake. They will make their home at Winston after a week's absence.

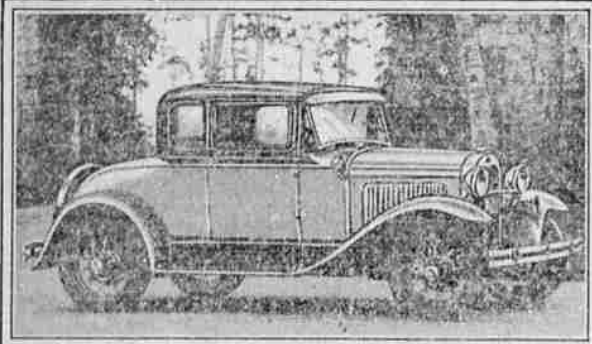

EMPLOYMENT IN OREGON DOESN'T INCREASE IN MAY

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—Employment conditions in Oregon have failed to show the usual seasonal increase for May, the federal reserve bank reported here today.

Employment held practically steady this year from April to May, where as the usual condition over the last 5 years has been a gain of 25 per cent. The food products industries provided an exception. In them there was a substantial increase, due to an earlier canning and packing season.

The number at work in lumber concerns was 12 per cent less than in May 1929. There was an increase from April to May in lumber industries employment this year, but it was less than in most previous years.

On the U. S. bureau of labor statistics index numbers, with July-December monthly average being represented by 100, employment in the United States for May was rated 94.8. Oregon's comparative index number was 91.2 for May.

INSURANCE URGED FOR IDLE WORKERS BY GOV. ROOSEVELT

New Yorker Also Advises Toiling Period Slash, Asserts Production Exceeds Market.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 30.—Unemployment insurance, including old age security, was advanced by Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York in an address before the national governor's conference today, as an economic necessity to meet situations such as he said exists in the United States at the present.

Shorter working days and shorter working weeks, better planning of work to prevent periods of unemployment, increased public works, while they may relieve unemployment will not eliminate it, the New York executive said.

"Unemployment insurance we shall come to in this country as certainly as we have come to workmen's compensation for industrial injury," he said, "just as certainly as we are today in the midst of a national wave of insuring against old age want."

"Ninety per cent of unemployment is wholly without the fault of the worker. Other nations and governments have undertaken various systems which insure their workers when unemployment comes. Why should we, in the 48 states of our union, fear to undertake the task?"

He warned against the possibility of old age insurance "becoming a mere dole," and also against "a natural tendency to pay the cost of unemployment insurance out of current revenues of government."

Unemployment insurance upon an actuarial basis, with the workers themselves contributing to its support, was advocated as necessary to the success of the plan.

New York Points Way
The old age security law passed this year in New York he characterized as "one short step" in the right direction, and said the real solution would create a fund, not contributed by state and county governments alone, as the present act provides, but which would be raised in part by workers and possibly by the employers.

Of the present unemployment situation in the United States government, Roosevelt said: "When between 12 and 15 workers out of every hundred men are out of a job in every many industries, it is neither truthful nor useful to tell them that employment is practically back to normal, or that purely psychological reasons only stand in the way of a 100 per cent output."

"The truth of the matter is that we are in the midst of another turn of the wheel in the economic cycle and that production in most industries has outrun consumption. To this domestic crisis has been added a distinct falling off in our exports."
