JOSEPH STALIN, head of the Russian communist party, boasts that "world capitalism and imperialism are decaying, while the soviet proletarian dictatorship is steadily ascending."

Then he adds: "While there are 20,000,000 unemployed in the principal capitalist countries of the world there is a terrific and unprecedented industrial movement forward in the soviet union."

WHAT he wants us to believe is that the twenty millions are unemployed BECAUSE OF CAPITALISM and that Russia is improving her industrial situation BECAUSE OF SOVIETISM.

Intelligent people know that neither is true.

FRANCE is a capitalistic country, and France has NO UNEMPLOYMENT AT ALL. France is enjoying an industrial revival infinitely greater than Russia's.

Why? Because the French people are working hard and SPENDING LESS THAN THEY EARN.

THAT leads up to this significant question: "What causes industrial depressions and so-called hard times, with their accompanying unemployment?"

Here is as good an answer as any: "People get careless about their work and begin to spend more than they earn."

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NEWS BREVITIES OF OREGON

PORTLAND THIEF NABBED AFTER TAXICAB CHASE
PORTLAND, July 1.—William Ruether, 40, was in jail today charged with robbing a hotel parlor of \$50 and terrorizing a score of pedestrians with gunfire.

Ruether was caught in a thrilling downtown chase by F. W. Duffield, Portland, who leaped on a running taxicab and grappled with Ruether who had commandeered the cab.

Police assisted Duffield in subduing Ruether.

MEDFORD EDITOR WILL RACE SENATOR McNARY
MEDFORD, July 1.—L. A. Banks, Riverside, Cal., and Medford fruit grower, announced through his newspaper here today he would run against Senator Charles L. McNary, Banks said his platform would be "return of constitutional rights and sound farm relief."

A nominating meeting will be held here Tuesday, July 2.

FLAX INDUSTRY REVENUE OUTDOOES WHEAT PROFIT
SALEM, Ore., July 1.—From 5000 acres of flax in the Willamette valley this season will be harvested over 10,000 tons with a cash value of around \$350,000.

Col. W. B. Bartram, superintendent of the state flax industry, told the Oregon City chamber of commerce in an address today: "The average return to 5000 acres of wheat will not reach \$150,000, in reference to the advantage he claimed for the new industry to farmers of the valley."

OLD AUTO LICENSES NOT GOOD AFTER TODAY
SALEM, Ore., July 1.—After today all persons driving automobiles without new license plates will be considered law violators and subject to arrest, according to advice sent by Secretary of State Hoss yesterday to all sheriffs in the state.

The legality of the old license plates expired yesterday. It is estimated that over 85,000 licenses have been issued so far which is several thousand more than at corresponding dates under the old system whereby the plates were due at the first of the year instead of on July 1.

Endurance Plane Still Whirs Aloft

HUNTER BOYS NOW AIM FOR 500-HR. MARK

Determined to Keep Going as Long as Craft Will Function—Flight in 21st Day.

Plan to Change Flight to Drier Airport Given Up Because of Peril to Their Record.

CHICAGO, July 1.—From the cabin of the "City of Chicago," as it whirled towards its 21st day on the wing, John and Kenneth Hunter, new holders of the world's non-stop flight record, broadcast a cheery "hello" to the world today and chatted with the rest of the Hunter family who watched and listened at the airport below.

It was the first time a radio broadcast had been attempted by dropping a microphone from a radio equipped contact plane.

The microphone was sent down on a 100-foot line shortly after the "Big Ben," manned by brothers Walter and Albert Hunter, had taken on gasoline up to the endurance flier in their 176th refueling contact. The fliers broadcast their determination to "hang on as long as possible," and Kenneth, with a "goodbye everybody," added "We'll be seeing you when we get back to that old world."

Then the radio hookup was shifted to the hangar below and sister Irene and the mother of the quintuplets talked to the brothers in the air. Irene, cook for the marathon aviators, spoke a word of caution about eating too much.

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NEW ASSISTANT TO DRY DIRECTOR

4TH OF MARRIAGES RESULT IN DIVORCE

There were 28 per cent as many divorce complaints filed in this county during the first six months of this year as there were marriage licenses. In other words, more than one out of every four marriages prove unsuccessful in this county if the half-year records are a correct criterion.

Marriage licenses for the six months total: January 13, February 18, March 14, April 31, May 17, June 28. Divorces for the same months ran: January 9, February 6, March 5, April 1, May 2, June 6. June, which is the proverbial month of brides, showed a poor total this year in the marriage license register. This year's June showed 28 licenses issued as against 34 for June last year.

The names of William J. Dayton and Maud Elizabeth Thatcher appeared as the last applicants for the month. Both are from Seattle. They took their license right up stairs to Justice of the Peace Charles Hopkins and were married.

BILLY DOVE, FILM ACTRESS, DIVORCED

LOS ANGELES, July 1.—Billy Dove, stage and screen actress, today was granted a divorce from Irvin Willat, picture director, after testifying to his asserted cruelties and beatings. The suit was uncontested.

Miss Dove testified her husband twice had knocked her down in the presence of guests. She said his "fits of uncontrolled temper" often ended in beatings that left bruises on her arms and shoulders for several days.

The couple was married here in October, 1922. Miss Dove testified she frequently left Willat consequent to his abuses, and finally separated from him last September. They have no children.

FOUR STATES NOW BAN HITCH HIKING

Four states have laws to prohibit the hitch-hiker from doing his begging along motor routes. Maine, New Jersey, Minnesota and Wisconsin have enacted statutes making it a misdemeanor to stand in the highway and solicit a ride in an automobile, reports the Oregon State Motor association. The District of Columbia has a similar law. The Minnesota statute is typical of such laws; it provides: "No person shall stand in the traveled portion of a roadway for the purpose of or while soliciting a ride from the driver of any vehicle other than a common carrier."

SIX CARS OF CHERRIES TO BE SHIPPED

Hurst-Root Packing Plant Making Start on First Consignment Since Opening Here.

Pears, Prunes, Apples Will Follow Later and Crew and Equipment Will Be Augmented.

Six carloads of Douglas county cherries will be shipped out this season as the first consignments of the new Hurst-Root plant just established in the old Hunter ice building on North Pine street.

Fred S. Hamilton, well known fruit grower and packer of this city, is in charge of the Hurst-Root operations here and now has a crew of 21 people working on the cherries being received.

One car has already been packed, one is in the process of being shipped and four more are estimated necessary to fill the need of the company. Just now Bluffs are being packed. Later Royal Anna and Lamberts will be prepared for shipment.

With a large crop of all three kinds of cherries available and the fruit of good quality, thousands of pounds of Umpqua valley fruit will go upon the market through this concern this year.

Branches of the company are located at Ashland, Eugene, Salem, Sheridan, McMinnville, The Dalles and Roseburg.

Details of Operation
A series of conveyors have been built in the packing plant. From the time the cherries are delivered until they are placed in the refrigerator car the operations are continuous. The cherries are poured upon an endless moving belt about two feet wide. On each side of the belt is a group of girls and women who sort out and throw away the bad cherries. The good ones are automatically dumped into boxes which contain 15 pounds of fruit. A packer weighs these boxes, sends them down another conveyor to a man who nails on the lids and he is in.

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BLOW FROM AUTO FATAL TO TEACHER

SALEM, Ore., July 1.—Mrs. Ada Grimes of Princeton, 47, died in a physician's office at Monmouth late yesterday, a few minutes after she had been struck by an automobile driven by Wayne Klein, 20, of Corvallis.

Miss Edna Grimes, who shouted a warning to her mother, said she did not consider Klein to blame. The accident happened at a street intersection. Klein was said to have applied the brakes and skidded his wheels about eight feet when he saw the woman ahead of him. Mrs. Grimes was believed to have become confused.

Mrs. Grimes, her daughter and Klein were all summer school students at the state normal school at Monmouth. The two former teachers at Moro, Sherman county, during the school year just ended.

HOT WAVE ADDS TO MISERY OF CHINA

SHANGHAI, July 1.—The Yangtze valley today was in the grip of a heat wave which has caused intense suffering among the poorer classes.

For three days the temperature has ranged from 95 to 100. During the nighttime Shanghai's streets were thronged with the poor, some of them lying on sidewalks and others to escape the heat of their homes.

Within the native sections of the city thousands of half-naked persons seeking relief from the heat gathered in the streets at night. This resulted in an order by Chinese authorities reading as follows: "Half-naked persons appearing in the streets hereafter will be fined \$2, as the act constitutes an offense against public morals. Upon payment of the fine the culprit will be given a shirt."

"Persons sleeping in streets and upon sidewalks, thereby impeding traffic, also will be fined."

OLD, 18, MINUS SECOND TEETH; NAVY SAYS "NO"

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Senator Carter Glass, of Virginia, was attempting today to take some of the teeth out of navy regulations so a constituent of his, Bruce Old, 18-year-old Norfolk boy, might enter the naval academy.

Young Old, described as a fine physical specimen, passed his entrance test by an exceptionally good mark, making 3.5 out of a possible four points, but he was rejected because he had not grown all of his second teeth.

Senator Glass took the matter up with Secretary Adams. The latter made no promises.

Denouncing what he termed the "idiotic regulations," Glass said today:

"Have things so changed in the navy that you now fight battles with your mouths? Do you expect to go out and bite the enemy?"

CRASH KILLS TWO NEAR McMinnville

McMINNVILLE, July 1.—Marie Rogers, 22, Portland and Clifford Ward, 24, Los Angeles, were killed and two men and another woman were injured in an automobile accident, south of here on the west side Pacific highway today.

The injured are: Clinton Carter, Portland, bruises and lacerations.

Max George, Portland, driver of the car, fractured skull.

Miss Helen Johnson, Portland, who physicians said probably would die.

The automobile belonged to Mrs. E. J. D. Penke, Congress hotel, Portland. Ward was her chauffeur.

Carter, the least injured, told McMinnville authorities George was driving the automobile to Portland after a pleasure trip and attempted to make a turn in the road. He said the machine left the highway, turned over and crashed into a tree.

Carter said he leaped from the automobile but the others were caught in the sedan and crushed.

Miss Johnson and George were in a hospital here.

KLAMATH INDIAN KILLED IN FIGHT

CHILOQUIN, July 1.—County authorities today checked up details of an alleged family feud resulting in the death yesterday of Louie Knight, 26, Klamath Indian, and the wounding slightly of Clayton Kirk, 50, another Indian, who is said to have killed Knight.

Authorities said Kirk discovered Knight beating his former wife and attempted to separate the two. Guns flashed and bullets were exchanged between Knight and Kirk.

Kirk reported the shooting at the Klamath agency where he received medical treatment.

TWO BOYS DROWN IN LEWIS RIVER

KEISO, Wash., July 1.—Authorities today dragged the Lewis river for the body of Albert Williams, 11, Bremerton, Wash., one of the two youths drowned in the river yesterday while swimming. The other was Carl Deemer, 11.

Ray Welch, 9, swimming with them, saw Deemer and Williams wade out to beyond their depths. They failed to respond and Welch ran for help. Fred McCalum, the first to reach the river, recovered Deemer's body.

SAYS MATE TRIED TO GIVE BABY LIQUOR

OTTAWA, July 1.—Two persons were killed, another died of a heart attack, and much damage was done by a wind and electrical storm which swept eastern Ontario and Quebec last night and today.

Arthur Morris was killed at Montreal when a high tension electrical wire was blown on him. John Leibel, watchman of the Ontario hospital at Brockville, was killed when he attempted to pick up a fallen electric light wire. Mrs. Mary Ann Harrington, of Ottawa, frightened by a flash of lightning, collapsed and died.

The storm swept around Ottawa Bay at Montreal it blew over chimneys, flooded cellars and disrupted public utility lines.

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FOSTER, AIDES ARRESTED IN LOS ANGELES

Walk Into Detective Trap Following Location of "Wife" of Foster in Apartment.

No Resistance Encountered by Officers; Prisoners Racketeer Members, Chicago Says.

LOS ANGELES, July 1.—Frank Foster, wanted for questioning in the Chicago killing of Jake Linge, Chicago Tribune reporter, is under arrest here today. Police Detective Captain Joe Taylor announced this morning the most hunted man was arrested last night and is being held incommunicado in the city jail.

Blaney Matthews, district attorney's chief investigator, confirmed the announcement.

"A number of gangsters," Matthews added, "also are in custody." He said they are believed to be members of Foster's "gang."

Two Chicago officers have been working under cover here for two weeks, Matthews said, and this was why the authorities were wary about giving out information.

"It was a big job," said Matthews. "We didn't get them all, but every police department in the United States today is looking for the men who slipped away from us."

Murder Charge Booked

Foster was booked at the jail on suspicion of the murder of Linge. The arresting officers said that one of five alleged gangsters captured with Foster is believed to be Red Forsythe, whom Chicago police believe to have been the actual killer of Linge.

Previous to Foster's arrest, detectives arrested a woman tentatively identified as Foster's wife. She and Foster were living at a local apartment house under an assumed name.

Linge was shot to death June 9 in a crowded subway at Michigan boulevard and Randolph streets, Chicago. Police there say the gun used in the slaying, thrown away by the killer as he ran from the scene, was owned by Foster.

No Resistance Made

The gangsters arrested with Foster and his alleged wife are Marion Apler, Frankie Fisher, George Davis and Herman Walters. The arrest of the woman enabled detectives to set a trap for the man. Foster and Apler were surrounded by police detectives with all means of escape cut off, when they came to the young woman's apartment house shortly after midnight. The other three were arrested as they entered an apartment engaged by Walters. This building also had been filled with hiding detectives. The arrests were made without a shot being fired.

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HEAD OF SOLDIERS' HOMES PLEASED AT PASSAGE OF BILL

While this community is anxiously awaiting news of President Hoover signing the national soldiers' home bill, word has been received that General George H. Wood, Dayton, Ohio, president of the board of managers of soldiers' homes, has wired the Oregon delegation in congress congratulating them on getting the bill through both houses.

General Wood is president of the group which will choose the site for the home. He and his fellow board members are said to incline strongly toward Roseburg as the location for the \$2,000,000 home.

His telegram to Senator McNary reads:

"Congratulations. I trust you will get the bill signed, avoiding the danger of a pocket veto."

A pocket veto occurs when the president "pockets" a bill passed by the two houses until after adjournment. Senator McNary's influence, which carried the bill through the senate in rapid time, is relied upon to secure the president's signature.

It was announced last week that the signature or veto of the president would probably be forthcoming the first part of this week.

When signed it will become a law and nothing will remain but the choosing of a site. The Oregon delegation has repeatedly expressed confidence that Roseburg will be the location.
